

Despite Further Failures, AF Plans More Shootings

VANDENBERG AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) — Despite another failure, the Air Force will resume its Discoverer satellite series—aimed at teaching man how to enter and return from space.

A 78-foot Discoverer X missile veered off course Friday after launching and headed for nearby seacoast cities. The Air Force destroyed the towering Thor-Agena missile at 20,000 feet, 56 seconds after launching.

A terrific blast rocked this mis-

sile base, then a big orange fireball swelled in the sky. A mushroom of black smoke bloated out the fiery sphere as the sky rained missile fragments the size of automobiles.

Most of the fragments fell in the sea. Despite the deadly shower, there were no injuries or property damage. Cause of the malfunction was not immediately determined.

The missile was another failure in the Air Force's attempt to put a satellite into orbit, then recover its space capsule. Six Discoverers have achieved orbit so far but no capsule has been retrieved.

At Cape Canaveral, Fla., the Air Force announced a nose cone data capsule from a Thor intermediate range missile launched there Dec. 1 has been recovered on a Bahaman island. It may contain the first high-altitude color pictures of the earth.

In Washington, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration said an attempt to loft a 90-pound probe to intersect the orbit of the planet Venus will be made sometime during March. Another major space probe attempt—a shot to the vicinity of the moon—is planned later this summer, probably in August.

Horse Put Out Of Pain

FORT KLAMATH—After the recent severe wind and snowstorm here, a horse on the Daniel G. Brown Sr. ranch was found lying in deep snow and suffering from a badly torn and mangled chest and neck.

Daniel Brown Jr., who had gone to check his parents' ranch during their absence, discovered that the wounded animal and theorized that a cougar had attacked from the tree under which the horse had sought shelter. Evidence bore the earmarks of a cougar's method of attack. Brown was forced to shoot the horse.

Cougars have been seen rarely in the woods around Fort Klamath, but many years ago a similar incident occurred.

The late Billy Crawford, father of Wade Crawford, well known Chiloquin resident, was riding horseback in the timbered hills on the reservation, when a cougar leaped from a tree onto the back of his horse. Frightened by the sudden attack, the horse lunged forward and horse and rider escaped with only two deep gashes on the horse's back.

Awards Given By Foundation

VALLEY FORGE, Pa. (AP)—Sen. John L. McClellan (D-Ark.), Secretary of the Army Wilbur M. Brucker and Maj. Gen. John B. Medaris won top awards today from the Freedom Foundation.

They were among 884 persons, organizations, businesses and schools honored on this 226th birthday of George Washington at this historic site.

The non-profit, independent foundation, in its fifth year, awarded recipients "for the things they have written, said or done that have brought about a better understanding of the American Way of Life and the continued maintenance of the responsibilities inherent with our freedoms." Prizes totaled \$100,000.

McClellan, chairman of the Senate subcommittee which has exposed corruption in labor and business, received the foundation's highest honor, the George Washington Award, at special ceremonies at the Valley Forge Military Academy.

He was cited as "a man of integrity and courage who has assailed the battlements of communism and corruption and laid bare their insidious secrets."

Nine men and women received "special freedom leadership awards." Among them were Brucker, Cmdr. William R. Anderson, Washington, and Lt. Cmdr. Donald M. Hanson, San Diego, Calif.

Others were Hollywood actors Ward Bond and Bob Hope; Armand Penha, Fairhaven, Mass.; former FBI undercover agent; author Ann Hawkes Hutton, Bristol, Pa.; attorney Elwood Fouts, Houston, Tex., and Dr. Ian Stuart, Birmingham, Ala., author and educator.

Experts Plan Mayan Jaunt

MEXICO CITY (AP) — An expedition into the Maya jungles of Chiapas is planned soon to copy murals recently discovered by two young Americans.

The paintings, still showing green and red colors despite centuries of exposure to nature, are described by experts as the most important found in Mexico in 15 years. And a study of the pigments and application may help modern mural painters.

John Milton, Short Hills, N. J., a student of the University of Michigan, and Gene Gerard Durbin, Woonsocket, R. I., of the University of Oregon, found the paintings.

Both are experienced hands in the woods of Canada and Alaska, but they had never been in a tropical rain forest until they tackled the jungles of Chiapas, Mexico's southernmost state. They were coached by Carmen C. de Leonard, noted Mexican anthropologist, and it paid off.

They found the ancient ruins in January and reported them to the Institute of Prehistoric Monuments, which investigated and confirmed their find. Now an expedition to explore the site further will be led by Dr. Cesar Lizardi Ramos. Financing may come in part from a Detroit institute.

"In view of the fact that this is the first Mayan temple in this area that has been encountered with paintings still in visible condition on the exterior of a building, the find is considered of outstanding importance in helping scientists solve the many existing problems in the reconstruction of old Mayan culture," said a spokesman for the Mexican Institute.

Another angle in the study will be to find out the materials used and how they were applied, considering the fact that they have lasted over a thousand years while exposed to the elements.

"This study will be of great help to modern mural painters that find their color going out of their paintings after a few years."

Judge Talks Longer Terms

EUGENE (AP) — Circuit Judge Alfred Goodwin of Lane County said Saturday sentences should be long enough to allow the parole board to release a prisoner at the proper time and keep him under surveillance long enough.

He told an Oregon legislative interim committee short sentences do not give authorities enough chance to rehabilitate offenders. The committee is seeking views and information to shape proposals for possible revision of state criminal laws, court procedures and sentencing practices.

Clarence T. Gladden, Oregon State prison warden, said "laws seem quite satisfactory at the present time."

He told the committee the Oregon penitentiary has fewer repeat offenders than California. Gladden said one-third of Oregon's prisoners serve only one term, one-third come back for a second, and the other third serve more than two.

Bomber Raids Cuban Suburb

HAVANA (AP)—Fidel Castro's army says a twin-engine bomber of World War II vintage raided a Havana suburb where the Cuban prime minister has a villa Sunday and shattered windows of an oil refinery with several bombs.

Government sources said it was doubtful that the Castro villa in the seaside village of Cojima—one of several homes he maintains—was the main target. He seldom stays there.

Guards at Castro's villa reportedly joined in shooting at the plane, which disappeared northward after dropping several bombs.

An army communiqué said the plane flew in from the north but did not attempt to pinpoint its origin.

It was the second air raid on Cuba within four days. The U. S. State Department acknowledged that a plane which crashed last Thursday while attempting to bomb a sugar mill 100 miles east of Havana took off from Florida. Two fliers aboard, apparently the Americans, were killed. The State Department apologized to the Cuban government.

Clark Gets Nod Over NJ Chief

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — Gov. Robert B. Meyner isn't disturbed because more New Jersey teenagers can identify Dick Clark than their own governor.

When told of this on a filmed television program Sunday, Meyner said, "We are interested in the things we are attracted to."

Besides, said Meyner, he's never heard of Dick Clark.

Clark is a television entertainer.

Mom Gets Lost Hunting Youths

SOMERVILLE, N. J. (AP)—Searchers found two missing boys Sunday, but then they had to march back into the woods. The mother of one of them had become lost.

Over 40 state troopers and volunteers looked for almost an hour with Jewel Lunn for her 9-year-old son, Todd, and a playmate, Stewart West. The boys were lost in the woods in nearby Bridgewater Township.

After a trooper spotted the boys, the searchers came out of the woods—except Mrs. Lunn. The men resumed the hunt and just before nightfall found Mrs. Lunn wandering in the woods.

India Arrests Actor, Wife

BOMBAY, India (AP)—Fredrick March and his wife were free on bail today after their arrest in Madras state on charges of violating India's liquor prohibition laws. The veteran actor described the incident as "unfortunate."

Police arrested March, his actress wife, Florence Eldridge, Dr. Burrill Crohn of New York and his wife, and two others Saturday after finding four ounces of liquor in the physician's medicinal case. March pointed out it was normal procedure for doctors to carry small amounts of liquor.

After the liquor was discovered, the group was taken to a magistrate's court 32 miles away. A travel agency representative posted bail of \$16,840 and was authorized to represent the group in future court proceedings. March and his companions went on to Ceylon, continuing a Far Eastern tour.

Prohibition is enforced in many parts of India, but tourists usually are allowed to keep specified amounts brought with them.

The actor said the incident was an unfortunate end to a "very pleasant" month-long tour of India.

Sheriff's Wife Again Gets Bid For Feeding Cons

The county court opened bids today for feeding jail prisoners and supplying gasoline and oil for the county.

Ten oil company representatives crowded into the court chambers for the bid opening. Only one bid was submitted for jail meals.

Mrs. J. M. Britton, wife of the sheriff, bid 50 cents a meal for jail prisoners on a basis of two meals a day.

Mrs. Britton attached a menu for each day of the week that listed, among entrees, meat loaf, salt port, beef stew, Spanish spaghetti and chili beans.

"This menu has been very successful and everyone seems to be contented and happy," she wrote in a letter to the court. "It has caused a feeling of only the highest morale for the prisoners."

The 50-cent per meal bid matched identically Mrs. Britton's bid for the previous year. The bids are to be awarded before March 1, and run for a year from March 1.

The oil company bids were for gasoline, diesel fuel, heating oil, and stove oil. They were being tabulated and checked by the engineer's office for presentation to the court.
