Student Council representatives met briefly after school Thursday and settled right down to work with the old business of whether the "Star Spangled Banner" should be played before the basketball games.

After some debate, the council, made up of students for every first class period, voted unanimously to request the Pep Band to play the national anthem.

Mart McBeth, chairman, stated that about 800 copies have been sold.

The council will meet this Wednesday to begin ratifying the new constitution.

The assembly featured a skit on Sadie Hawkins Day with all of Al Capp's famous Dog Patch characters brought to life. The basketball team was honored during the program and players of all the school teams were introduced.

### KF Workers At Sears Share Profits

The 48 local members of the Sears, Roebuck and Company profit sharing pension fund learned last week that they have 6,921 shares of Sears stock and other securities amounting to \$117,795 credited to their accounts as of last December 31.

The local employee members are among 144,000 men and women who are members of the Savings and Profit Sharing Pension Fund of Sears, Roebuck and Company employees. The total number of employees is an increase of more than 4,000 from the previous year and includes more than 11,000 employees of Allstate Insurance Company, a wholly owned subsidiary which each year contributes to Sears' profits.

C. E. (Chuck) Burman, local manager, pointed out that the value of the accounts of individual employees showed a marked increase in 1959. Also, the total assets of the fund rose over \$250 million for a total of \$1,321,725,000 as of December 31, 1959, the end of the fund's fiscal year.

This gain was the result of a larger company contribution from last year's profits, Burman said, plus increased investment income and appreciation in the value of the fund's stock holdings.

The employees' fund is Sears' largest stockholder, Burman said. At the end of last year, the fund held almost 27 per cent of the company's common stock. In addition, the fund's assets are also invested in the stock of over 100 diversified companies and miscellaneous securities.

Created in 1916, the fund is designed to encourage regular savings, enable Sears' employees to share in company profits and aid members in establishing a financial reserve for retirement. The company who have completed one year of service are eligible to join the fund.

Employee members of the fund deposit five per cent of their wages and salaries, up to a maximum of \$500 a year. The company contributes a portion of its net income before deductions for federal income taxes and dividends. The company's contribution is credited to members' accounts on a formula based on their age, length of service and deposits, Burman explained.

**PRaise RED ARMY**  
BERLIN (UPI) — The Soviet Red Army was hailed as "undefeatable" in mass meetings throughout Communist East Germany Monday night, the East German news service ADN reported.

The demonstrations were in honor of the Red Army's 42nd birthday.
