Health Service Solves Problem Of Foam Water

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Public Health Service has solved the case of the foaming water, but isn't sure what can be done about it.

The service says it is household detergents that sometimes cause a glass of tap water to collect a foaming head like a schooner of beer. It says the situation is not now regarded as dangerous, discouraging though it may be.

The foaming water has turned up in households that have their own wells, and it usually indicates detergents are seeping into the well from septic tanks. In times of drought some streams used for public water supplies also have

contained enough detergent to cause foam. The service says synthetic detergents — which have burgeoned phenomenally in the past two decades—resist conventional sewage treatment and conventional water treatment.

While it says there is no present danger, it warns that foaming water should be taken as a warning to check the water supply for other more dangerous pollution.

Polaris Sub Underwater Shot Slated

WASHINGTON (AP) — Adm. Arleigh A. Burke says the first Polaris submarine is scheduled to make its first complete underwater test shot in later spring or summer this year.

By the end of the year, the chief of naval operations says, two of these atom-powered submarines, each armed with 16 Polaris ballistic missiles, will be on duty at sea.

Burke's secret testimony before the Senate Space and Preparedness subcommittee was made public Friday in censored form.

Asked if the first underwater test shot "will be a full-range shot, or less than 1,200 miles," Burke said:

"It will be instrumented. When you instrument it, you put weight in these missiles, and so it will be a 1,200-mile capable missile. But with the additional weight in the missile it will not go so far."

Pressed as to just how far, he said "approximately 900 miles, maybe less. What you want to test there is your launching capability."

Burke, as he has done previously in open hearings, said he was

pressing for funds to add six more Polaris submarines to current construction plans. That would bring the total to 21.

Much of Burke's timetable for putting Polaris subs into actual operation was deleted as classified military information. But in a previous public hearing he said the Navy plans to put three Polaris

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Allot Fraud; Woman Jailed

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Mary M. Cardwell, 37, was sentenced to three years in prison after pleading guilty to illegally receiving \$26,800 in dependency allotments from three servicemen husbands.

Her attorney said she had shared the money with parents and children of the husbands.

"You might be a sort of Robin Hood," Judge Bryan Simpson told Mrs. Cardwell, "but the fact that you were generous with this money doesn't change the fact that you defrauded the government."

The judge also sentenced her to a year for thefts of cash from the Navy Exchange at Jacksonville Naval Air Station, where she worked.
