Contest Set By Jaycees

The annual Junior Chamber of Commerce script writing and speaking contest for high school seniors is about ready to get underway locally.

That word was made public by Les Snively, president of the local club, today.

The top three national winners get scholarships of \$2,000, \$1,000 and \$750, respectively. Finals will be conducted in Washington, D.C., sometime in June. Finalists will get expense-paid trips there.

To qualify, seniors from various high schools in the county must write a theme called "My True Security — the American Way." In it, they must explain why they think initiative and self reliance are a sound basis for personal security.

The theme should measure about five minutes long when delivered orally. Entries will be judged on content, originality and spoken delivery.

Each high school will sponsor a winner, and those will go to a state contest sometime during spring. The state winner will receive a \$200 scholarship.

Information concerning the contest will soon be available at all participating high schools.

No date for the local contest has been set. On the contest committee are Jaycees Fred Fredell, Eldon Edwards, Harold Berry and Jack Bailey.

Five File From Dorris For Posts

DORRIS — Five Dorris men have filed for three seats on the city council at the April 12 election. The entries were made just before noon deadline Thursday. Unopposed on the ballot will be City Clerk Virginia Hamilton and City Treasurer Daisy Selberg, seeking second terms.

Filing for a four-year term on the council is Robert H. Edgar, mayor, who had previously announced his decision not to run for reelection. Edgar said he had so many phone calls urging him to run again that he changed his mind. He said he will start building a home this spring on farm property he has purchased west of town and when it is completed he will have to resign. Edgar has been a Dorris resident since 1950, purchased and improved the Dorris telephone system and cut over to the dial system December 18, 1954. Edgar, president of the Dorris telephone system, says it now serves more than 500 square miles. The Edgars have three children.

Arnold S. Skoog, incumbent councilman, filing for another term, has resided in Dorris the past 12 years. He is a native of Minnesota. He married a local girl, Mary Barnett. They have two children. Skoog is a butcher in the M & M Market and is street commissioner.

Robert E. Carnini, an employee of the Associated Lumber and Box Company, also filing, has lived in Dorris for many years. He is a past commander of the Butte Valley Veterans of Foreign Wars, Post 5044, active in civic affairs, and is the father of three children. He said he would never have run for the city council, but so many people had urged him to do so.

Beryl G. Smith, the fourth candidate, a resident for the past 14 months, came to Dorris with his wife, Maxine, and two children from San Diego. He is the son of Mrs. Katherine Smith, proprietor of the Dorris Variety Store, and brother of Mrs. Archie Ivimier who, with her constable husband, operates the Truck Stop. Smith has purchased a new home and said that since he expects to open and operate a new manufacturing plant he is very much interested in the town and would like to help "keep Dorris a town that is a good place in which to raise his children."

W. H. (Cy) Cramer, manager of the Mountain Valley Moulding Company and fifth candidate, has been a Dorris resident for several years. He is interested in civic affairs, is an officer in the Dorris Lions Club and has given many hours of labor on the Dorris Youth Center, a Lions project. He also donated much of the lumber to the project. He is married, but has no children of school age.

Preliminary Hearing Set

DORRIS — Robert James Schallow, 20, Macdoel, Robert Lee Matthews, 26, Shafter, and a 17-year-old Dorris girl appeared before Judge Les Chase in Dorris Judicial Court, Friday, for arraignment on a charge of burglary in Macdoel last November 3.

Judge Chase set February 29 as tentative date for a preliminary hearing. The trio is in the Siskiyou County Jail.

The three were arrested by Albuquerque police January 3 on a bulletin from the Siskiyou County Sheriff's Office after the burglary of an automobile near Macdoel in which clothing, cameras and electronic equipment were reported stolen.

Some of the stolen items were recovered from hotels, stores and pawn shops in Arizona and New Mexico and some of the stolen articles were found in the possession of the suspects, Sheriff Al Cottar said.

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UC Criminology Professor New Chicago Police Boss

CHICAGO (AP) — Orlando W. Wilson, a mild-looking professor and newly named head of Chicago's scandal-riddled police department, says he will try to make the city's men-in-blue the best in the world.

But, cautioned the 59-year-old University of California dean after his selection Monday by Mayor Richard J. Daley, the job cannot be done overnight or by one man.

"Moves will have to proceed slowly and after due deliberations to avoid capricious or unwise actions," he told the small army of newsmen who jammed into the mayor's office.

The special five-man committee which proposed Wilson's name to Daley—Wilson had been chairman of the group until prevailed upon to take the post himself—also called for a sweeping revision of the department organization. Daley immediately released a proposed ordinance dealing with some of the suggestions.

In accepting the commissioner post, the slender, gray-haired Wilson said he would need the support of both the police department and the city of Chicago. Daley promised him a free rein.

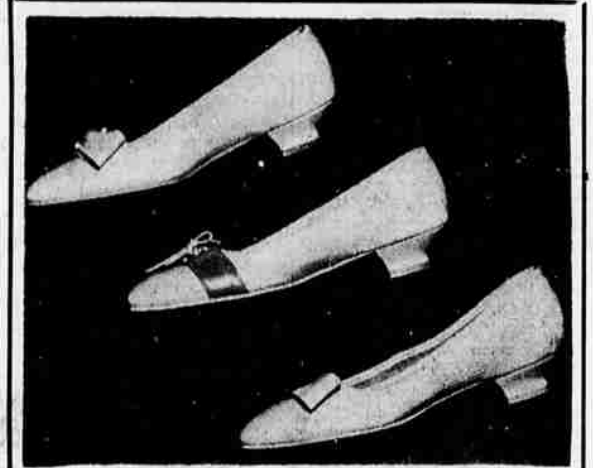
The new commissioner, a surprise choice, is dean of the School of Criminology of the University of California in Berkeley. An expert in police administration, he has served as consultant to police departments in six big cities.

His selection ended nearly a month of intensive searching for a successor to Timothy J. O'Connor, who resigned Jan. 23 in the wake of accusations there was collusion between policemen and burglars.

Wilson will be named acting police commissioner March 2 at the same time Daley proposes to submit to the city council an ordinance revising the set-up of the police department. Upon the expected passage of the ordinance, Wilson would be named superintendent of police with a salary of \$30,000 a year. This is \$7,500 more than O'Connor got and \$13,300 more than Wilson's salary at the university.
