**Alturas Woman Honored At Meet**

ALTURAS — Mrs. Lee James, a vice president of the Conference of California Historical Societies, was singularly honored while attending the second annual symposium of the Southern California Historical Society on February 5 and 6 in Los Angeles. Mrs. James had traveled the greatest distance of the 150 delegates to the conclave. She accompanied Dr. Richard Coke Wood and his daughter from Stockton. Dr. Wood is executive secretary of the conference.

The Rev. Fr. Maynard Gieger was the keynote speaker Friday, using as his subject, "California Missions Today." He is the author of the recently published biographical study of the Rev. Fr. Junipero Serra. He is also considered an authority on California mission history.

Preservation of historical sites was the symposium theme.

Dr. Wood, who is also author of six historical books and professor of history at both Stockton College and the College of the Pacific in Stockton, addressed the assemblage. He spoke on the purpose and objectives of local historical societies.

The 1961 symposium will be held in San Bernardino with Burr Belden heading the committee on arrangements.

The Southern California symposium is the counterpart of the Northern California symposium which has been meeting for the past nine years. Its last meeting was held at Klamath Falls in October, 1959. Sacramento will be the host city at its next gathering to be held in October, 1960.

Mrs. James not only represented the Northern California section of the assemblage but also the Modoc County Historical Society, which she organized three years ago.
