

Fire Hoses, Police Threat Cool Tempers

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (AP)—Fire hoses and the threat of police billy clubs cooled tempers of thousands of racially tense Negroes and whites who stormed Chattanooga's downtown area for the second straight day.

Twenty persons — eleven Negroes and nine whites — were arrested Wednesday. Police said pistols were taken from three of them.

The mass of humanity was several times larger but the day's violence did not match the bitter fighting that flared Tuesday when gangs of belligerent white youths challenged Negro demonstrators for integrated lunch counter service.

Elsewhere in the South the situation was relatively quiet on the sidewalk front that spread from a demonstration in Greensboro, N.C., more than two weeks ago. In Charlotte, N.C., a Negro boy and girl were served lunch at a department store counter reserved for whites. A store official said the couple's light skin apparently caused them to be mistaken for white because the store's segregated counter policy was unchanged.

Both houses of the Virginia Legislature quickly passed three trespass bills. The emergency measures were proposed by Gov. J. Lindsay Almond Jr. to thwart lunch counter sit-down by Negroes.

Tennessee already has a law on its books forbidding integrated service in restaurants.

Chattanooga officials conferred after Wednesday's disorder and announced new plans for handling the situation here.

Police Commissioner H. P. Dunlap announced that his department would not permit any large assemblies of persons to parade or congregate in the downtown area today.

Since the crowds have consisted mostly of teen-agers, gathering after classes were dismissed for the day, school Supt. John W. Letson offered to keep schools in session until 6 p.m. School now dismisses at 3:30 p.m. Letson's suggestion was not put into immediate effect.

KETTERING, Ohio (UPI)—When the police found 12-year-old George Ray Marshall late Tuesday night, they bagged the kidnaper, the kidnaped and the ransom demander all in one.

George left for school Tuesday at 8 a.m. At 9:37 a.m. his mother, Mrs. Charlotte Marshall, answered the telephone and heard a voice growl, "If you want to see your son again, well, you'll have to pay 500 dollars." The caller hung up abruptly.

Mrs. Marshall called Beaver Town School and learned with horror that her son had not arrived there. She called the police.

The police brought in the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and a 12-hour hunt began.

Screwdriver Saves Life

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP)—J. D. McBride, 56, probably owes his life to a screwdriver, a pair of glasses and a ballpoint pen he was carrying in his shirt pocket.

A .22-caliber slug fired point-blank from a distance of six feet struck the articles and fell harmlessly in McBride's pocket. The bullet passed through the glasses case and the pen, then flattened itself against the screwdriver.

Police Inspector W. W. Wilkinson said the bullet was fired Tuesday by McBride's sister-in-law, Ruby Fay Blankenship, 40. She was charged with assault to murder and carrying a pistol.

Wilkinson said no motive for the shooting had been established.

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
