Legal Chief To Run Again

SALEM (AP)—Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton announced today he will seek reelection to a third four-year term. Thornton, a former Tillamook County legislator, is the first Democrat ever to be state attorney general. He has been a controversial figure, mainly because of differences with Gov. Mark Hatfield and former Gov. Robert D. Holmes, both of whom hired their own legal counsel. Thornton said today that the "attorney general is the people's lawyer, not merely the governor's personal lawyer." Thornton headed the Multnomah County vice investigation. His opponents took him to task because few convictions resulted. Thornton promised to continue his program of law enforcement and clean government. He was an Army intelligence officer in World War II. His principal opponent is expected to be state Sen. Carl Francis (R-Dayton), whom Thornton defeated four years ago.

Witness Testifies

William Jones, a Medford man who claimed he was beaten and robbed of nearly \$100 by Leonard Thomas Powers, was the first witness in Powers' trial Thursday. The trial on a charge of assault and robbery while armed with a dangerous weapon was being heard before Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg. More than the usual number of spectators was present in the courtroom. Some were witnesses before the grand jury, convening in the regular jury room. Powers, 25, was accused of beating and robbing Jones and forcing Jones from his car near the Merrill gravel pit last December 28. Jones said he had withdrawn \$100 from his savings account in the U.S. National Bank at Medford before the two men left together for Tulelake and Merrill. Defense Attorney Richard Smith objected to admission of the savings withdrawal slip into evidence. Judge Vandenberg withheld ruling at the time. The state's case was presented by District Attorney Arthur Beddoe. Jurors selected were Guy Ferguson of Gilchrist, C. R. Rush of Midland, and Joyce Utley, Edna Hansen, Lenore Owens, Audrey Beals, Thomas Wasson, Paul Kincaid, Mark Carman, Norman Wilson, and Lester Wells, all of Klamath Falls.

County Jury Reconvenes

The Klamath County Grand Jury convened today after a one-day delay because one of its members was absent. Deputy District Attorney O. W. Goakey began presentation of six open cases before the seven-member jury. The district attorney's office said several secret cases also would be presented to the jury. The jury was to have convened Wednesday, but one member was absent. It developed that Willard Noble, left for a misunderstanding, had left for a Florida vacation thinking the jury would not be called while he was gone. The name of J. F. Lee, a member of the current circuit jury panel, was drawn to complete the grand jury panel.

Road Cleared For New Paper

PORTLAND (AP)—The way was cleared today for the proposed new daily newspaper, the Portland Examiner, to sell stock. Three sponsors set capitalization at three million dollars in articles of incorporation approved by state officials at Salem today. William B. Murray, attorney for the Examiner, said the backers do not intend to go ahead, however, until they have subscription pledges from 100,000 persons for the new daily. He said that once the 100,000 signed, underwriters will advance three million dollars. The sale of stock will follow. He said the sale will be confined to Oregon. Murray would make no estimate of when publication could begin.

Stockman Files For Commission

NEW PINE CREEK—James Snider, stockman has filed for county commissioner on the Democratic ticket. Having an acute feeling for the taxpayer dollar, and believing that the taxpayer is not getting a maximum return, Snider said, "If one is to be critical about how things are run, rather than just stand on the sidelines and howl, they should be willing to dig in and try to do something about it." Standing on a platform of more efficiency in the management of county affairs to achieve more economy and greater vigilance in seeing that the tax dollar is spent most wisely, he says, is his prime purpose if elected.

Court Okays Water Safety Regulations

The county court accepted revised water safety regulations proposed Wednesday by a group of Lake of the Woods homeowners. The regulations were revised at a public hearing attended by about 20 persons in the court chambers. The proposals will be presented to the State Marine Board with a recommendation from the county court for adoption. Robert Kent, president of the Lake of the Woods Recreational Association, said the proposals as accepted were similar to those Kent had presented to the court two weeks ago. One exception was in recommended distances between boats on the lake. The original proposals would establish a speed limit of 10 miles an hour for any boat within 200 feet of shore, docks, or any other boat. This was revised into two rules: (1) a 10 m.p.h. speed limit within 100 feet of shore or dock, and (2) a regulation that no boat "shall approach within 200 feet of any other boat in a reckless or negligent manner so as to endanger person or property." The other proposals were approved as presented. They would: Impose a 20 m.p.h. speed limit in 200 feet of shore except for launching and landing, prohibit swimming beyond 200 feet of shore, and require observers in water skiing tow boats on Sunday and holidays. State Police Sgt. Bruce Lattin said his department does have jurisdiction on such matters, but he expressed the opinion most enforcement would be the responsibility of the county sheriff's office. The court's recommendations will be presented to the State Marine Board, created by the 1959 Legislature, which must call another public hearing before the regulations can be adopted into law.

More Bodies Found

BERLIN (AP)—Four more bodies were recovered today from the fire-filled Karl Marx Coal Mine in East Germany. Almost no hope was held for 75 miners still trapped. A gas explosion touched off a fire Monday while 172 men were working 3,520 feet underground. Fifty-one miners were dragged out alive, but two of these died later. The known dead total 48.

Youths Hurt In Accident

Two Klamath Falls youths, on their way home from a dance in Dorris, were injured early today when their car slammed into a guard rail on the north side of Dorris Hill. California Highway Patrol Officer Virgil Winkelman identified the victims as Modesto Jimenez Jimenez, 22, 1621 Halsay Street, and Glenn John Taylor, 21, 1324 Wilford Avenue. Attendants at Klamath Valley Hospital said both victims may have received fractures, but neither was considered to be in serious condition. X-rays were taken to determine whether Jimenez had fractured ribs and Taylor had a fractured clavicle. Officer Winkelman said cause of the accident was not yet determined. He said the accident occurred about 2:20 a.m. in a light, spitting snowstorm. The car, badly damaged, was held by the guard rail from plunging over a rock-strewn embankment about 50 feet deep, he said. Jimenez was thrown from the car and may have been thrown part way down the embankment. He was near the guard rail when Winkelman and Peace Ambulance arrived. Taylor still was in the car. Winkelman climbed down the embankment to search for other possible victims, but he said he thought only the two youths were in the car. The accident occurred about two miles south of the Oregon-California border, Winkelman said. One of the victims said they had been to a dance at the Red Barn that evening.

Three Girls Save Home

The quick thinking of a 12-year-old girl and her two younger sisters is credited with saving their home from total destruction by fire Tuesday night. They are the daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Johnson, 3713 Emerald St. Their mother was attending evening church services and their father, employee of the Herald and News, was at work when the children smelled smoke. They were in bed in an upstairs room. They went to the first floor, found their parents' bedroom ablaze, called the Stewart-Lenox Fire Department, giving location of the fire, then left the burning home for a neighbor's house. The girls are Brenda, 12, Drusella, 9 and Mary, 5. The fire originated, according to firemen in a brooder outside a bedroom wall where an extension cord from the bedroom to a light bulb in the brooder apparently shorted.
