State Labor Commissioner Raps Job Discrimination

Discriminating hiring and firing in the state and nation is breeding serious repercussions, said Norman O. Nilson, state labor commissioner, during a public hearing in Klamath Falls Wednesday.

The state is trying to do something about it with new legislation popularly called the "Senior Worker Law."

It provides that hiring and firing must be based on worker ability and productivity. It attempts to end arbitrary age limits. Every employer with six or more employees and every corresponding employee 25 to 65 is affected.

No person employed by a par-

ent, spouse or child is included. No nonprofit social club, fraternal, charitable, educational or religious association or corporation is affected.

The law also attacks employment discrimination due to race, religion, color or national origin. Both employers and employees have the right to file complaints. Discrimination based on race, religion, color and nationality apparently has been a lesser problem than arbitrary age-setting.

Nilson juggled statistics to show that baseless age limits are crippling industry, the work force and welfare programs.

While the aging population increases rapidly, a worker's productive years are dwindling because jobs are hard to find after 40—many times earlier—and because retirement is forced so soon.

The cult of youth in industry is a mistake, said he. Studies show that the more mature are more reliable, less accident-prone, more experienced and have better judgment. They also are more apt to stick to the job longer than younger hands.

Plenty of exceptions are allowed in the law, says Nilson. An employer would have ample reason to discharge an employee or refuse to hire him because of ill health or incompetence, for instance. Employers also have the right to complain formally to the bureau when an employee hinders compliance with the law.

Discriminatory practices are a boosting welfare costs, said Nilson. People are living longer and thus drawing more social security and other pensions. Allowed to work, many probably would spurn social security or county welfare.

The practices are also depriving industry of a wide work force selection.

He urged all employers to review employment practices that tend to automatically exclude from employment any individual between 25 and 65 because of age, and any such policy that affects automatic discharge, dismissal, suspension, reduction or demotion because of age.

Seniors Vie For Awards

LAKEVIEW — Two seniors at Lakeview High School have been named finalists in the 1959-60 competition of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation Program and have been awarded certificates of merit, according to Del Milholland, school principal.

Robert Ackerman and Donald McPherson were presented with the certificates at a student assembly, Friday, February 19.

The seniors distinguished themselves by their high scores on two college aptitude tests used in the NMS competition. About six-tenths of one per cent of the seniors in each state received the awards, which means that the students qualifying are in the top half of one per cent of all seniors in the United States.

Over 550,000 students were tested in the competition which began last April. These have been pared down to the 10,000 finalists from whom the merit scholars will be selected and announcements made about April 27, 1960. They, and the colleges they have chosen, will share in several million dollars in funds to be offered by over 110 different organizations and individuals and by the corporation itself.

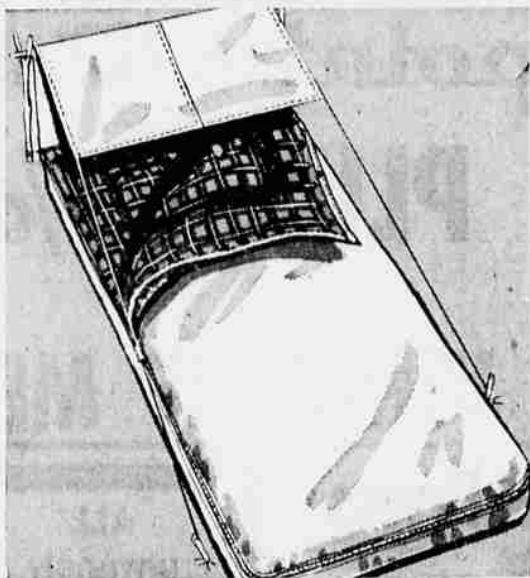
Japan Delegate To Show Slides

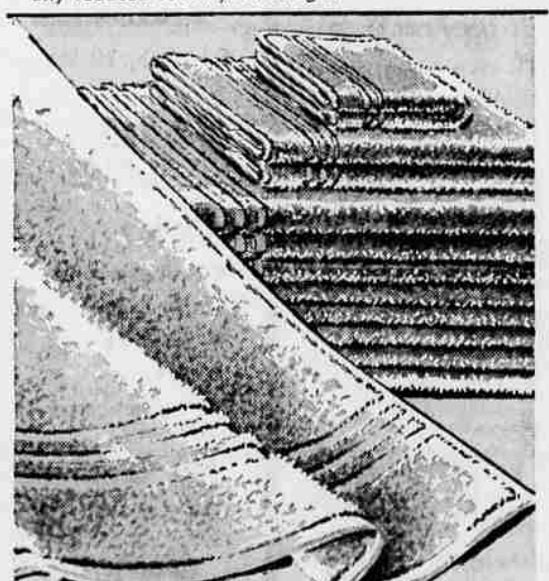

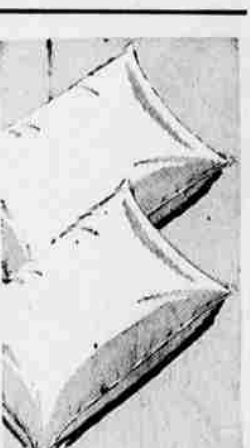
