Oregon Tech Wrestling Squad In Ashland For Season Finale With Southern Oregon

The Oregon Tech wrestling team closes out its short but successful season this year against Southern Oregon College in a rematch at the SOC gymnasium.

The Techmen opened their season with a 20-8 victory over the Red Raiders last January 29 on the Owl floor. Since that time Coach George Miller's squad has dropped only one match to a rugged and experienced Portland State Vikings team earlier this month.

The first grappling squad at OTI in a number of years, the Owl matmen have fared very well. After its initial win over Southern Oregon, the team defeated Clark Junior College 21-11, and Humboldt State twice, 15-13 and 23-5. The Viking encounter was lost 27-3.

Tech's Dave Kubesh is the only undefeated man on the squad having picked up a pin in the second Lumberjack meet, and decisions

in his other four outings. The 137-pound Tiger outpointed George Olson of the Raiders in their first meeting.

In the 167-pound division Wendell Winterbottom, who was the Oregon prep champ in his division in 1959, picked up his greatest victory in the recent match with Humboldt. Spotting his opponent 10 pounds, Winterbottom de-

cisioned the ex-California champ, Allen Hagerstrand, 5-1. The 167-pound mauler suffered an earlier loss to Hagerstrand in the initial match with the Lumberjacks and also to Portland's Bill Anderson. Winterbottom decided Raider Dave Parkshurt 6-2 in their earlier encounter.

OTI's John Weaver will attempt to repeat his decision over Ron Fader of SOC in the 123 weights. Weaver's only loss of the year came in Portland when Viking Jim Berguvin decided the Tech lightweight 5-2.

Dave Shamion who wrestles in the 130 division has also been charged only one loss this year. Shamion won by forfeit in the previous encounter with SOC. This time he is scheduled to meet Raider Charlie Vandergaw.

Tech's Hal McUine has won only two matches this year, both against Humboldt. The 147-pounder didn't wrestle in the previous engagement with the Raiders.

In the 157 and 167-pound divisions, OTI's Hank Williams has earned three wins this year, one against his SOC opponent Bill Johnson who was outpointed 5-1.

A test of strength will come to the Owl's Lyle Fowler in the heavyweight bout if he meets Raider Pedro Colley again. Colley breaks the scales at 300 pounds. Fowler decided Colley in their first match, but since that time the Oregon Tech muscle-bender has grabbed only one other victory, that coming in the Clark JC tussle.

Pelican Matmen Set For Home Stands

A pair of rough competitors, Redmond, the state champs, and the Bend Lava Bears, provide the last regular season action for the Klamath Union High wrestling team this weekend.

The Redmond squad, which boasts a pair of Oregon prep champions, will tangle with the Whitebirds beginning at 7 p.m. on Pelican Court Friday, while Bend will appear here Saturday afternoon at 1:30.

Admission charges to either event are 75 cents for adults and 25 cents for students. Jayvee matches are slated both days, in

addition to the varsity competition.

The Pelicans have met and defeated both the visiting clubs earlier in the season. They topped the Redmond club 23-21 and stopped Bend 34-16. This weekend, however, the Pels will again work minus the service of their own state champion, heavyweight John Hancock, who is still recuperating from an operation. Coach DeLance Duncan said he planned to skip the heavyweight bouts this week.

Dave Ladro, a 115-pounder, and Clarence Seal, 148, are the Redmond title bearers. Another threat

to be reckoned with is Joe Ricci, also a 115-pounder.

Although the Pels have not yet cleared the 106, 123 or 148-pound classifications, the balance of the varsity weekend berths were filled in Wednesday intersquad wrestle-offs.

Milo Crumrine will handle the 98-pound class; Dave Vetkos or Gary Head, the 106 class; Gary Leavitt has the 115-pound assignment; Sherd Duncan or Fred Tracy will get the nod in the 123 weight; co-captain Trenton Douglas will go in the 130 division; Dan Ross, also co-captain, has the

job in the 136 weight; Dave Gonzales, 141; Larry Wishart and Steve Shults will battle it out for the 148-pound slot; Billy O'Neil is set for the 157 job; Art Mills, the 168, and Joe Cox will wind up the card for the KU team in the 178-pound division.

This is the last chance prep wrestling fans will have to see the KU squad in action prior to their entrance in the all-important district tournament set for Medford next weekend.

District winners will then go on to compete for the state titles in bouts to be held in Corvallis March 11 and 12.
