# U.S. Players Upset Favored Canada; Time Running Out On Medal Seekers

## Soviets Expecting New Gold

SQUAW VALLEY, Calif. (AP)—Uncle Sam's nieces and nephews went prospecting for gold medals today with time running short in the 1960 Winter Olympic games and Carol Heiss this nation's only winter to date.

The surprising U.S. hockey team that upset favored Canada 2-1 to grab the lead in the round-robin competition got the day off.

The Soviet Union, with six gold medals and 137 unofficial points credited, was expected to pick up more in both the women's 15 kilometer (9.3 miles) relay and the men's 1,500 meter speed skating. The United States had its biggest chances in the other two events.

Penny Pitou, with two silver medals, took her final shot at a gold one in the women's slalom ski race already virtually assured of winning the world combined title of the International Ski Federation (FIS).

The pony-tailed blonde from Gilford, N.H., leads the U.S. girls' team that so far hasn't come up to the pre-Olympic predictions.

Dave Jenkins, 23, the Western Reserve Univ. medical student, goes out for the free-skating wrap-up of the men's figure skating championships trailing Czechoslovakia's Karel Divin after the compulsory figures competition.

It was in figure skating that Miss Heiss, of Ozone Park, N.Y., won her crown.

Jenkins scored 77.5 in compulsory figures that count 60 per cent toward the final score. Divin had 79.7 and France's Alain Gilette 76.7. Don Jackson of Canada scored 75.4 and Tim Brown of Sacramento, Calif., 74.8.

In the unofficial team scores, Germany held second place with 32 1/2 with the United States at 44 and Sweden 42.

Thursday's biggest surprise came when the underdog Yankee hockey team stood off the Canadians as goalie Jack McCartan, former University of Minnesota star, came up with 39 stops. Teammates Bob Cleary and Paul Johnson scored for the winners and Jim Connelly for the Canadians.

The victory gave the United States a 3-0 record while the Soviet Union, tied on Wednesday by Sweden, swamped Germany 7-1 for a 2-0-1 record. That sets up Saturday's meeting—between the challenging United States and the Soviet's defending Olympic champions.

Finland's 35-year-old veteran Velikko Hakulinen rallied on the anchor lap of the four-man, 40-kilometer cross-country relay to nip Norway's Hakon Brusveen by eight tenths of a second in a total time of 2 hours, 18 minutes, 45.6 seconds in the 24.8 mile distance. The Soviet Union took the bronze medal for third place with the United States last in the 11-team field.

The Soviet's Viktor Kosichkin captured the 5,000-meter men's speed skating race in 7 minutes 51.3 seconds. Knut Johannesson of Norway came in second in 8:00.9 and Holland's Jan Pesman was third in 8:05.1. Best for a United States racer was a 14th place by Arnold Uhrlass of Yonkers, N.Y.

# Yankees, Russians Vie Next

SQUAW VALLEY, Calif. (AP)—"Imagine me getting kissed by the Russian coach," said Jack Riley, whose U.S. hockey team zoomed to the top of the Olympic hockey tournament by upsetting Canada 2-1.

Russian Coach Anatoli Tarasov of the once-tied, second-place Soviets hugged and kissed Riley in the bedlam that followed the Americans' stunning conquest of the high-powered Canadians Thursday in the Winter Games hockey tourney.

Riley, whose Yanks now hold undisputed first place, promised that the Slavic affection won't be reciprocated on the ice Saturday when the United States plays with Russia in the game that may decide the gold medalist.

"We won't let down against the Russians," said the 39-year-old ex-Dartmouth star who coaches at Army.

Riley has made no secret that he wants his lads to be the first American Olympic team to beat the Russians in Hockey. But few experts gave him much of a chance until the Americans' fiercely fought victory over the favored Canadians.

The defeat dropped Canada to third place in the tournament.

### U.S. Hockey Hero Likes Third Base

SQUAW VALLEY (UPI) — Big Jack McCartan, the ice hockey hero of the Winter Olympic Games, thinks he's even a better third baseman than he is a goal tender.

And as a goal tender those who saw the U.S. score a sensational upset by beating Canada 2-1 think he is a combination Pie Traynor, Home Run Baker and Red Rolfe.

Maybe he can't hit, although he batted .438 at the University of Minnesota and is sought by several professional ball clubs, but those who saw his dramatics in the championship hockey round will tell you that the lanky black-haired kid from St. Paul sure can field.

He made Luis Aparicio look like a guy with two left hands. He did splits that would have made a sensation at Carnegie Hall. And he stuffed those hot shots in his pocket with the aplomb of Miss America at an old maid's tea.

"Shucks," he grinned with a big smile, "I was lucky. Believe me, it's true. Because there are so many shots you miss and lots of things go by the net that you can't even see."

Only one did Thursday night. Those Canadians, skating like a Great Dane on a polished hardwood floor, were whistling that puck at him so fast that big Jack must have thought somebody was using a machine gun. Only one got through as he made 39 saves,

most of them in the eye-popping category.

Jack, a 200-pounder who stands 6 feet, 1 inch tall, is in the Army as a specialist fourth class at Ft. Carson, Colo. He has been in since he graduated from Minnesota in June of 1958 and is on the draft list of the New York Rangers in the National Hockey League.

"Sure, I've thought of turning professional," he admitted. "But if I did I wouldn't be able to play in such things as this Olympics. That means a lot more to me."
