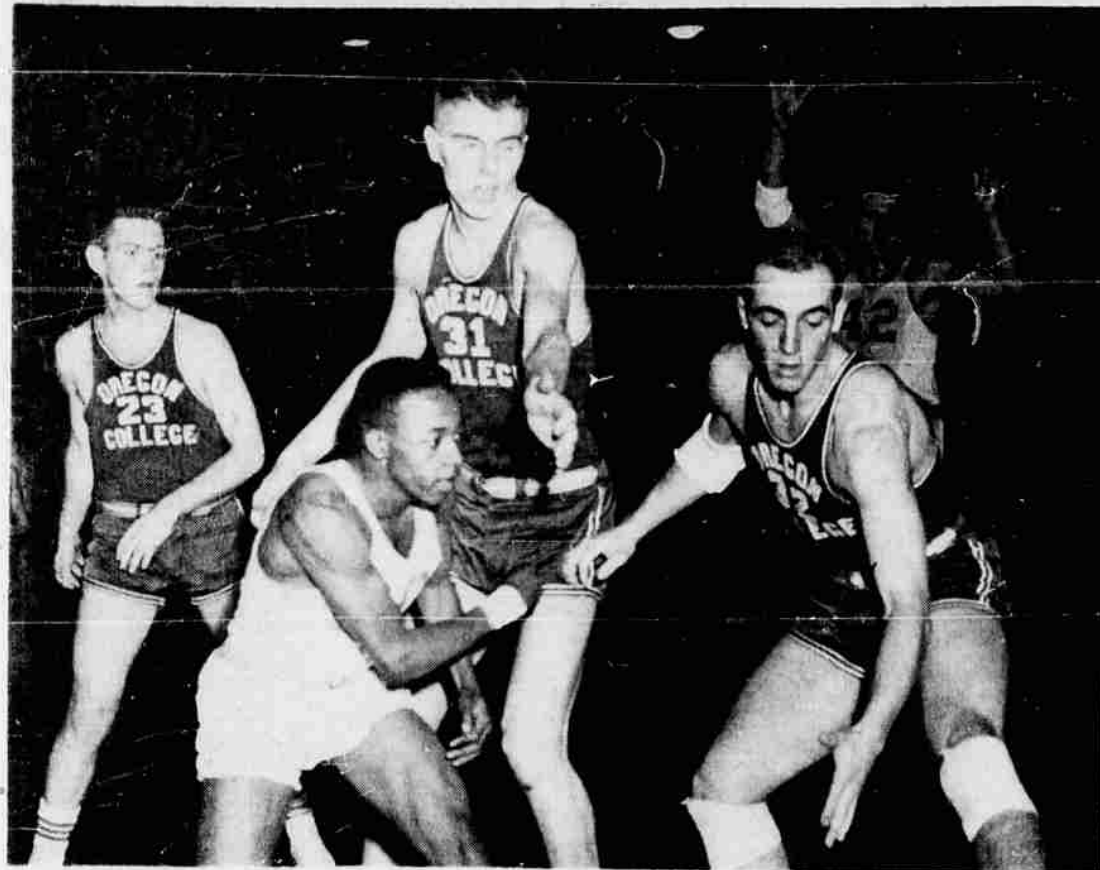

SQUAW VALLEY, Calif. (AP)—David Jenkins, 23, the slight, balding figure skater who brought the United States its second gold medal at the Winter Olympics, will be a doctor in a few years. If he had to pick specialty right now, it would be surgery.

Jenkins—who won his gold medal Friday with a dazzling demonstration of free skating—

Miller's Top Marshfield 5

 Klamath Falls didn't even play Friday night but became the eighth entry in the 16-team Oregon class A-1 high school basketball tournament at Eugene March 15-19.

That was because Medford, No. 1 in the Associated Press poll, beat Crater of Central Point, 74-60, ending any possibility of a second place finisher other than Klamath Falls, the state's No. 5 team, in the Southern Oregon Conference. Medford had clinched a berth earlier.

Others also assured of tourney spots are South Salem, Marshfield of Coos Bay, Hermiston, Pendleton, Sandy and David Douglas of Portland.

The night's results left the hot Portland league race wide open. For the second time this season Jefferson knocked off first-place Cleveland, No. 3 in the poll, 32-47. Franklin, the 1959 state champion, edged second-place Grant, 68-66. Benson defeated Wilson, 51-42.

Cleveland now is 124 in the league. Tied for second, at 115, are Jefferson, Franklin, Grant and Benson. The league schedule ends with two rounds this week, Tuesday and Friday. The league sends two representatives to Eugene.

The biggest shocker of the night was Springfield's 66-63 victory over Marshfield of Coos Bay, ranked No. 2 in the AP poll. It was only the second loss in 20 games for Marshfield, which had clinched a playoff earlier.

Owls Stand Short

Oregon Tech Blows Co-Title Chance

The Oregon Tech Owl hopes for at least a tie for the Oregon Collegiate Conference basketball championship went out the window when the Tech squad blew a 73-65 decision to the last place Oregon College Wolves Friday night on the Mile High Campus.

At the same time Portland State kept itself in the running with a 46-41 triumph over Eastern Oregon at La Grande.

After getting off to a 4-1 deficit in the opening minutes the Owls skittered in and out of the lead eight times in the first half of the contest, then displayed a lackadaisical effort in the second half that allowed the sure-shooting Wolves one of their few victories this season. The haltime count read 36-35

for OCE.

According to coach Bob McCulloch, in his first year at OCE, the Wolves played one of their finest games to date, despite the fact they were forced to go without the services of OCU high scorer Ron Jones, who is sidelined with a fractured wrist.

Taking over admirably for Jones, Dennis Spencer hit 10 of 16 tries from the field and 2-3 from the foul line for the game-high of 22.

The Owls' Dennis McKee and OCE's Al Harter, 6-9, shared number two honors with 14 points each.

The Tech squad managed a 28-24 edge in the rebound department but the Wolves' 536 percentage from the field plus a blistering 11-13 shots from the foul line

more than the Tech quint could overcome in the closing minutes of the important match.

A platoon system used by Owl coach Wally Palmberg seemed enough to stem the Wolf attack in the first stanza but in the second half the Tech cagers bogged down at the 31-50 mark with 10 minutes left to play and from here on, despite a half-hearted full-court press, were never in the ball game.

The Owls had trouble making baskets. They hit only 28 of 61 tries from the floor and were successful on only 13 of 23 tries from the foul line.

Troy Koonz' 10 points was the only other Owl scoring effort to crack the double figures.

Harter, an ex-North Salem prep

star, used his height to good advantage and snared eight rebounds. He also collected 14 points.

Ed Machen Tops Hunter, Wants Ingo

NEW YORK (AP)—Eddie Machen still has Ingemar Johansson on the brain and he's not going to get him off until he gets another crack at the heavyweight championship.

Machen, who ran into Johansson's right back in 1958 and has been trying to get a return ever since, stopped Billy Hunter of Detroit in 2:11 of the ninth of a 10-rounder in Madison Square Garden Friday night, but he was inclined to shrug it off.

"I knew I could outpunch him," Machen shrugged. "I'm glad he pressed me in the early rounds. I now I'd catch up to him one way or another."

This was an important fight for Machen, though, and his stock has risen again in the heavyweight division.

After winning seven in a row last year, he dropped a decision to Zora Foley last month and fell right back down the ladder. He had run up a streak of 25 when he lost to Johansson, Hunter, a sensation from Detroit, had a knockout and a decision over Alex Miteff to his credit.

"I think I've reached my peak now," said Machen. "In the past, I've been too tense. Now I'm more relaxed. I wouldn't take anything away from Johansson. He's a great fighter. But now I think I've got the know-how to beat him."

Machen's manager, Sid Flaherty, wants Johansson, too.

"But," he sighed, "while we're waiting for him, we'll fight any heavyweight in the world."

Phoenix Five Belts Hornets In Playoffs

 PHOENIX—Whatever hopes the Phoenix Hornets may have had for the upcoming District 6 A-2 tournament at Roseburg next March 3-4-5 were shattered when the Phoenix Pirates whipped them in an elimination contest 34-22 here Friday night.

The outcome between the second place Pirates of the Rogue Valley League and the Hornets who gained an at-large berth was

never in doubt after five minutes into the initial quarter.

The victory enables the Phoenix five to meet Glide who finished second in the Umpqua League next March 3 at the Roseburg tourney opener.

Both clubs had trouble hitting the hoop with any success. Numerous fouls caused the teams to slow down their initial pace and play deliberate, conservative basketball.

Henley drew first blood when Bert Albritton dropped in a free shot, but four minutes later Pirate Gerald Sloper tallied two gifts to put the host club in front for the remainder of the game.
