

## Annual Winter Carnival At Crater Lake National Park Held Big Success

The second Annual Winter Carnival was held at Park Headquarters, Crater Lake National Park recently. The snow depth was 80 inches and the weather was ideal for this type of activity.

The event sponsored by the Sitz Mark Ski Club was managed by Slim Mabery. Judges were Mrs. Herbert Gerald and Mrs. Otto M. Brown. Officials included Jackie Pool and Supt. Otto M. Brown.

Prizes were donated by employees of Crater Lake National Park, Don Divens of the Tomahawk Ski Bowl, Klamath Falls, and Bill Brooks, Rogue River Ski Shop, Medford.

Forty contestants of all ages competed in various events which included a snowman building contest, flying saucer race, cross country snowshoe race, obstacle ski race and a sled race. Winners were judged for each event and an award was made for high point winners in various age groups in all events for the day.

In the Junior Event, Tommie Broadbent, 13, was first; Kenny Mabery, 9, second, and Judy Fulton, 11, third. The children's competition was won by Reggie Bowdler, 7, first; Dennis Mabery, 7, and Jay Bowdler, 8, tied for second, and Joyce Fulton, 8, placed third. The women's event was won by Patty Trulove, first; Elizabeth Novak, second, and Gladys Gerald, third.

Prizes were also awarded to contestants whose excellence was impeded by hard luck, such as nose dives on snowshoes, run away flying saucers or ending up head first in steep snow banks. The award of excellence was won by Steve Trulove for his spectacular contortions which hampered his otherwise competent performance in the various events, one of which was a double somersault when his rapidly moving sled became stuck in

the deep snow.

Refreshments were served by the Sitz Mark Ski Club which included a campfire wiener roast, and hot chocolate and coffee served at the site of the various events. The event was well attended and will probably become a traditional annual event at Crater Lake National Park.

## Fish Get To 'Hospital'

MIAMI, Fla. (UPI)—A bonefish got in a fight with a barracuda at the Miami Seaquarium and had to go to the "hospital."

Divers hand-fed the bonefish for a month. Its food contained vitamins and antibiotics. Today, the fish is back in perfect health.

The unique hospital at the Seaquarium is credited with saving thousands of fish in the past five years. Handlers doubling as nurses are ready for anything.

When a big fish bit off the tail of a pompano, the victim was hospitalized until it grew a new tail. A snake eel with a big chunk bitten out of its back hid in the rocks where no one could reach it. Liquid medication was added to the water, and in a few weeks the eel emerged hale and hearty.

Treating diseased or injured fish is a routine job at the Seaquarium. It has the largest collection of tropical fish in captivity — over 10,000—in its tanks.
