Land Owners, Ranchers Discuss Law

More than 40 ranchers and land owners from the vast Dairy Precinct crowded into the county court hearing room Friday to discuss a proposed herd law.

A petition requesting that such a proposal be put on precinct ballots was signed by 26 Dairy community residents and presented to the court January 28.

A petition opposing a herd law was filed with the court before the public hearing began this morning. It was signed by 35 persons.

Should a herd law be approved by voters, it would establish a livestock district in the precinct. This would mean cattle, horses, and other livestock would not be permitted to roam at large. A natural consequence would be construction of a great many fences.

The hearing crowd filled the court's chambers and overflowed into the outer office. Spokesmen on both sides were vocal.

Don Rite, a Dairy store owner, said he had circulated a petition for a livestock district (herd law). He said on one night three cattle had been killed at the Dairy-Hildebrand highway junction.

Mrs. Joe Viera of near Hildebrand presented the opposition petition to the court this morning. She maintained establishment of a livestock district over the entire precinct would work an unnecessary hardship on many ranchers in little-traveled areas.

Her contention was backed by Bill Marshall of Pige Valley, who said signers of the opposition petition represented owners of 50 per cent of the applicable land involved.

Judge Bob Walker explained that the petition for a vote on a herd law was proper, and that such a question would appear on precinct ballots. County Clerk Charley DeLap expressed an informal opinion that the petition could not be withdrawn after today's hearing.

Commissioner Frank Ganong said the petition, as presented, would form a livestock district over the entire precinct, if approved. The proposal will go before voters regardless of hearing results, but the court may adjust boundaries of the proposed livestock district.

The Dairy Precinct is an enormous political subdivision almost three times the area of Upper Klamath Lake. It contains 160,000 acres.

Marshall said 124,000 acres are in private ownership, the rest are in government hands. A livestock district must have a minimum of 2,000 acres, but it need not include the entire precinct.

That was the question discussed in the public hearing. The court has not reached a decision on what boundaries will appear before voters.
