

Family Of 8 Found Dead; Victims Of Asphyxiation

THOMSON, Ill. (AP)—An auto dealer trudged through heavy snow along the banks of the Mississippi River to reach the secluded house of an employee Sunday and found him and seven other members of his family dead.

The frozen bodies of Leroy C. Hensel, 59, his wife, Dora, 53, and their six children were discovered by Eddie Shuler, for whom Hensel worked as a mechanic. The Hensel children, four daughters and two sons, ranged in age from 7 to 17 years.

Dr. L. B. Hussey, Carroll County deputy coroner, said the

eight apparently died of asphyxiation a week ago in the four-room house the family was building. An oil burner in the house was extinguished and the oil tanks were empty.

Shuler said he decided to drive to the Hensel home to see if Hensel was sick as he had not been to work at Shuler's garage in nearby Morrison since Feb. 9.

Shuler said Hensel had told him not to worry if he didn't show up for work. Sometimes because of severe snowstorms it took him two or three days to dig out. The house is a mile southwest of Ebner, a small railroad switching station south of Thomson in northwestern Illinois.

"But I decided to take a look and see if he was back," Shuler said.

His car became stuck in a snow drift as he drove near Thomson. But Shuler, leaving his wife, their daughter and his son-in-law in the car, started to trample through the heavy snow to the little Hensel house.

He was greeted by a barking dog.

He said there was no response to his knocks on the one door or to his shouts. So he pulled the door off the hook.

"When I opened the door I was shocked," Shuler said. He found Hensel and his wife dead, holding each other in the living room.

Shuler said he left the house but returned in a few minutes to see if any of the children were alive. He found them all dead. They were Judy 17, Billy 14, Leroy 12, Susan 10, Patricia 7 and Jane 7.

Shuler notified Sheriff Harry Miller, Civil Defense Corps amphibious duck got stuck in the snow but a power wagon finally broke through to the little house. The bodies were moved to a funeral home in nearby Savanna for an inquest.

Sailor Dennison Achieves Ambitions As NATO Head

WASHINGTON (AP)—"Bob Dennison, sailor" achieves a big ambition today as he runs up his four-star flag in Norfolk, Va., as chief of the U.S. and NATO naval forces in the Atlantic.

The sailor is Adm. Robert Lee Dennison, 59. The self-composed identification of sailor appears on a sign that has hung for years behind his desk. He was born in Warren, Pa.

The new commander in chief of the Atlantic Fleet and "Supreme Allied Commander, Atlantic" is aptly described by former shipmates as a "smart gent," an "astute citizen" who has not lost his sense of humor in the 37 years since he was graduated from the Naval Academy.

Murder Trial End In Sight

BOSTON (AP)—After 14 days of testimony, the end is in sight for the first-degree murder trial of Dutch radio operator Willem van Rie.

The trial, before a 14-man jury, resumes today in Suffolk County Superior Court.

Defense counsel Walter Powers Jr. said he may complete his case today. However, there are expected to be several rebuttal witnesses for the prosecution.

Courthouse officials estimate the case will go to the jury by Wednesday.

The 14 men have been locked up since Feb. 10. Before the jurors retire to deliberate, two of the 14 will be withdrawn. These are alternates available in case any of the jurors become incapacitated.

Van Rie, 31, testifying last week, vehemently denied he beat pretty Lynn Kauffman, 23, a Chicago divorcee, in her shipboard cabin aboard the Dutch freighter Utrecht last Sept. 18, then dropped her into Boston harbor to drown.

The defense contended Miss Kauffman's injuries could have been caused by a 40-foot fall from the ship.

Prexie Pushes Development Of Intellectuals

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—American youngsters are proud of their muscles, but they seem ashamed of their brains. And that, a college president said today, is a situation that must be changed.

What this country needs, said Dr. Lee A. DuBridge of the California Institute of Technology, is "open, honest intellectual competition throughout our high schools and colleges."

"We have always been perfectly frank about athletic competition about a boy's ability to make the football or basketball team," he said. But we have been reticent to talk about differences in intellectual ability."

In a speech prepared for the National Assn. of Secondary School Principals, DuBridge said the nation's high schools must create an atmosphere in which intellectual achievement is recognized, admired and rewarded.

By 1970, DuBridge said, at least 65 per cent of the high school graduates will be going on to college or university. The competition for admission is going to be so rough, he added, that the prestige schools, both public and private, will have to raise their standards and accept only the very best.

Students, said DuBridge, must be encouraged to pursue intellectual achievement. The high schools must:

Experts See Costs Stable

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congressional economic experts of both parties agreed today that the cost of living will hold fairly steady in the year ahead.

But this was one of the few points on which Democrats and Republicans on the Senate Finance Committee reached agreement in their annual pulse-taking to determine the pulse of the nation's economy.

Filing reports and sharply disagreeing on many points, the Democrats and Republicans even disagreed on the meaning of the projected stability in the level of prices.

Even Democratic members, including Chairman Paul H. Douglas (D-Ill.), cited as evidence that the administration has been unduly concerned with inflation. They said administration policies have held back economic growth and produced a "higher" than necessary rate of unemployment.

On the contrary, the six Republican members said the outlook for continued price stability demonstrated the wisdom of the administration's economic policies. They said Democrats should give the administration credit for "guarding against inflation."

The reports — which sounded like election-year campaign documents — simply rehashed the partisan arguments which emerged from the committee four weeks ago at the end of its nine-month study of employment, growth and price levels.

Other congressional reports: Defense: Sen. John F. Kennedy (Mass.) urged increased defense spending — "fueled by higher taxes 'if necessary'" to avoid what he termed the administration's election-year "gamble with our survival." In a speech prepared for Senate delivery, the presidential hopeful called for an "emergency" program for an airborne bomber alert, stepped-up missile spending and needed modernization of the Army and Marines.

Morse Plans Primary Fight

PENDLETON (AP)—Sen. Wayne L. Morse (D-Ore.) said he is ready for a head-on fight with Sen. Kennedy (D-Mass.) and Sen. Hubert Humphrey (D-Minn.) in Oregon's July presidential primary.

Both Kennedy and Humphrey have campaigned in this state despite passing up others where there are favorite sons.

Morse's name has been placed on the Democratic presidential ballot by petition.

Morse told local Democrats the reason he did not get into the Wisconsin primary is that he lacked sufficient finances and time to organize the right kind of campaign.

He said that in Wisconsin Kennedy will spend about \$300,000 and Humphrey about \$100,000, and "I don't have that kind of money."

Morse emphasized his remarks were not meant to be personal attacks and said that outside of politics, he and Kennedy are friends.

Early Oregon senator said at a news conference the United States and Russia must end their arms race "before they lead mankind to the brink of destruction."

"The time has come," he told newsmen, "for the United Nations to call the U. S. and Russia before the special assembly and lay down the moral law."
