

Health Chief Gives Talk To CD Group

"The Role of Public Health in a Civil Defense Emergency" was the subject of a talk by Dr. S. M. Kerron, Klamath County health officer, at last week's meeting of the Klamath County Women's Civil Defense Committee.

Dr. Kerron reviewed a report made by Chief Surgeon John D. Porterfield of the Public Health Service at the Medical Civil Defense conference held in San Francisco, sponsored by the American Medical Association.

Health workers would be largely concerned with aid to casualties during an emergency, Dr. Kerron said. Also, they would be separated from their colleagues and would need to rely heavily on lay helpers. Because facilities would have to be improvised, the problems of control of communicable disease, waste disposal and other health problems would be aggravated, he added.

"A number of important steps should be taken in advance of, rather than after, an emergency," Dr. Kerron stated. "Public health should work toward development of a healthy population, able to survive extreme post-attack conditions," he said. "The aim should be toward raising standards of air and water pollution control. Mass immunization should be brought up to date and include other citizens in the program. There should be a thorough advance scrutiny of possible relocation sites (after evacuation), food and water supplies, waste disposal and manpower facilities. Supply depots would be most important for health workers," he added.

Other reports made to the meeting covered housing in evacuation and rural civil defense.

The next meeting of the committee will be early in March with time and place to be announced, according to Mrs. Natalia Reichert, chairman.

Candidates Listed

SALEM (AP) — The names of candidates to be placed on Oregon's May 20 presidential primary ballot will be announced next Wednesday morning, Secretary of State Howell Spring Jr. said Friday.

Under a new law, applicants are directed to enter the names of all nationally recognized presidential candidates. These candidates then can withdraw if they sign affidavits that they are not candidates and do not intend to be.

At the same time, he will announce which names he will enter on the vice presidential ballot. Candidates also can be entered by petitions containing 1,000 names. Sen. Wayne Morse was entered in this way in the Democratic presidential contest several days ago. Candidates entered by this method can not withdraw.

"Normally," Spring said, "we would make such an announcement on March 11, the deadline for filing of candidates. However, since the law permits only three days following March 11 during which one chosen may withdraw, we feel that it is in the interests of the candidates we should give at least tentative notice now so as to permit them ample time to have their names withdrawn if they so wish."

Span Walkway To Be Closed

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Directors of the Golden Gate Bridge have voted to close the pedestrian walkways on the span between sunset and sunrise.

Toll Mounts In Tragedy

SHANNON AIRPORT, Ireland (AP)—A Shannon Airport official told an inquest jury Saturday night he desperately tried to avert the crash of an Italian airliner that plunged into a nearby cemetery with the loss of 30 lives.

The crash death toll mounted from 29 to 30 Saturday night with the death in a Liverpool hospital of Mrs. Longina Lisi, about 23. Alitalia Airline officials had said previously she was married a year ago in Italy and was flying to join her husband, John Lisi, of 375 E. 160th St., the Bronx, New York City. Her husband was at her bedside when she died.

The disclosure by the airport official that he tried to avert the crash came a few hours after one of the survivors said in a TV interview he saw a fire in a port engine just before the big DC7C airliner dived to destruction.

Tulelake Red Cross Branch Sets 1960 Goal At \$1,800

TULELAKE — The 1960 membership campaign goal for the Tulalake Branch of the Klamath Basin Red Cross Chapter has been set at \$1,800. Kickoff for the campaign is planned for 8 p.m. Monday, February 29, in the home economics building at the Fairgrounds.

The goal includes funds necessary to maintain the Red Cross program in Tulalake. Largest item in the local budget is \$435 allocated to cover cost of the annual "learn to swim" program. The Tulalake branch provides free transportation to some 400 children of this area each year, chaperons and participants in the instructor program at the Malin pool.

Service and assistance to members of the armed forces, veterans and emergency needs of civilians, participation in the blood program, and free training in first aid classes will be financed in Tulalake by the March campaign. Lewis Baker, a Malin resident of the community, has been active in various community activities and has been a worker in past Red Cross campaigns. He is employed by the Floyd A. Boyd Company.

Assisting him will be James A. Starch, manager of the Western Starch Company, who will head the business division. Mrs. Kenneth Baggett is residential chairman for the city of Tulalake, and George Smith Jr. is chairman of rural workers.

Baker urges all campaign workers to attend the kickoff meeting for instructions and to pick up supplies for the solicitation to begin March 1.
