## Tiny Sealed Packet Carries War-By-Mistake Insurance

VANDENBERG AFB (UPI) — A tiny sealed packet—worn like a dog tag—is the Air Force's insurance against starting a war-by-mistake with its intercontinental ballistic missiles.

The launch control officer in the operational Atlas blockhouses—there's always a crew on duty—wears the packet around his neck.

That packet, two red telephones and a voice automatic are the launch control officer's tools of his trade.

Should the United States ever have to fire its ICBMs in anger, the word would come to the blockhouse by one of the telephones—it rings like a claxon horn—from Strategic Air Command headquarters in Omaha, Neb.

The other telephone—both are "hot" lines—connects the blockhouse with the base command post. In case of a "commit" order, the launch control officer would verify the order with the command post.

Then, to make double sure that the order was legitimate, he would open the packet and read its coded message.

The capsule contains coded information which would tell the officer instantly whether the orders were correctly given. Other than that the Air Force says nothing, except that the code in the packet is its best kept secret.

The existence of the capsule came to light when the Air Force opened this sprawling 64,000-acre home of its first operational Atlas missiles over the weekend for the first time.

Newsmen got a look at—among other things:—Two monumental holes in the ground for storing the Titan and

Atlas missiles designed to protect them from attack. The Titan silo is 165 feet deep, concrete lined and has two doors weighing 200 tons each.

—The inside of the operational blockhouse for the three operational Atlas pads. Four other pads—the horizontal type—soon will be completed and used for training. They could be used in anger, too, if necessary.
