Speaker Warns Americans To Assume Tougher Stand

For the second time this season, members of the Klamath Knife and Fork Club heard predictions of doom unless the U.S. takes a tougher stand against communism.

This one came from Baron Hans DeMeiss-Touffin (pronounced De Mice Toyfen), an adventurer of good Swiss birth, who spoke Monday night at the Willard Hotel.

He spoke with particular reference to Africa, his adopted continent. The danger is great that we, in our fumbling benevolence, may sell all Africa out to the Reds. The same, said he, goes for colonial powers in Africa.

We are gift-wrapping Africa for Russia through too much kindness. We should again begin to use the "big stick" policy.

The baron was almost embarrassingly apologetic about making such statements. For, he said, we are not likely to take kindly to a foreigner telling us how to run our affairs.

But he was actually relaying messages given him for delivery here by various heads of African states he has met on his travels.

A big stake in the free world has a big stake in our foreign policy, too. The Swiss are involved, also. They have developed an immense, successful capitalist system.

We should not be so free with our foreign aid, the baron said. The people of underdeveloped countries, though they need the money, are resentful when it is given more as a gift than an investment.

They like to haggle about such things and be made to feel they have driven a sharp bargain. They do not want to feel as though they are welfare cases.

DeMeiss-Touffin also warned against allowing too much freedom to soon. Some African nations recently freed from colonial domination are falling into dictatorship, though the little governments were sincere at first in desire to govern well.

Some heads of state have since become power-crazed. Revolt threatens. If it breaks out, the Reds will march in with their subversive advance platoons. These countries could turn Communist at the snap of a finger. They are not ready for democracy yet, the baron said. They do not realize that democracy must be coupled with responsibility. Two or three generations will pass before some of these peoples will be educated enough to accept those responsibilities, for their cultures are simply not oriented to our system of things.

"You can't export your democracy as though it were produce." The baron was relaying a statement made to him by the chief of a Middle Eastern country.

But we try. And that has led to some overwhelming misunderstandings of the U.S., even in Europe.

Our information programs and

foreign aid are very necessary. Aid, especially, has helped stem communism. But both programs should be handled more shrewdly.

Mainly, we should attempt to improve skills, particularly agricultural skills. We should also let foreign countries see us as we really are, as depicted in Hollywood films.

Finally, we should take a stand against men like Fidel Castro in Cuba. We now have the seeds of communism just 80 miles away from Miami.

Foreigners wonder if we actually are strong enough to accept world leadership. "Has Uncle Sam lost his teeth?" they say.

We must wake up to the fact that we are at war, said the baron, and the last "gentleman's war" was fought a century ago. The baron owns a plantation in the Congo, 36,000 acres of it—that cost him a penny an acre. He had to build 60 miles of road to get to it, however.

He spent five years as heir to a family banking business, and traveled to Germany, France and England learning the banking business in those countries. He speaks eloquently in flawless English with a curious inflection of German, French and British accents. He also speaks Arabic and other languages.

He put to sea alone in a 14-foot sailboat at 21 years of age and since has sailed the Atlantic and Indian oceans alone in his larger sailing yawl.

He made a round diving for pearls in the Indian Ocean. He has mined copper; has contracted to shoot three dimensional African scenes for the View Master Corporation.

He has had hair-raising experiences as a counterspy. He has worked off and on for the major press wire services.

He has never regretted revolting against the quiet life of high finance. "It was like a prison," he said.

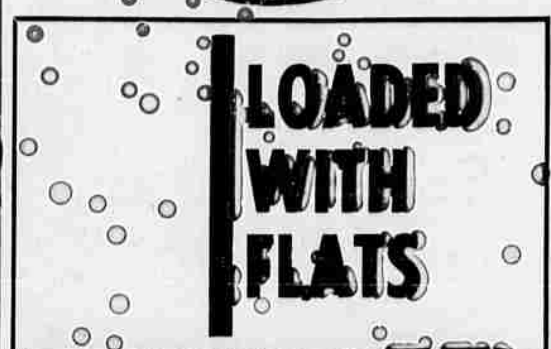
Lenten Services Start Thursday
