

Women Of KF To Gather For Prayers

Women of Klamath Falls will gather March 4 at the First Presbyterian Church at 1:30 p.m. to worship during World Day of Prayer.

The world-wide prayer day dates back to 1887 when Mrs. Darrah R. James gathered a few women together to pray for Home Missions. Emphasis since then has been placed on prayer on the First Friday in Lent, a day now called the World Day of Prayer.

Those early days the women were concerned about how they could help the thousands of European and Oriental immigrants coming into the United States.

Christian women of today are still interested in helping those in need, and each year use their offerings for inter-denominational projects in home and foreign missions.

At a World Day of Prayer observance last year, a religious work director at Haskell Institute brought a year-old Apache student named Dorothy. Dorothy wore her Indian costume proudly because it had been handed down from mother to daughter for several generations. The buckskin was discolored, the fringe worn and the bead work hung loose. "It is very old," she explained. "It belonged to my great-grandmother. Her husband was Geronimo. Did you ever hear of him?"

Time was suddenly telescoped by that worn buckskin dress, an item that the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D.C., would have been glad to have.

Here was the great-granddaughter of the famous Apache chief, Geronimo, who terrorized New Mexico and Arizona back in the 1880s. The words of the past never seemed so real nor the healing touch of the Christian faith so near as when Geronimo's young descendant joined in the bond of faith, brotherhood, and love then encircling the world.

Traffic Toll Shows Hike

CHICAGO (AP)—The nation's traffic deaths rose 4 per cent in January compared to January 1959, the National Safety Council reports.

The increase, from 2,760 to 2,870, centered in six populous states, the council said Tuesday, that collectively accounted for 192 more deaths in January this year.

The six states are Michigan, Illinois, Ohio, Missouri, New Jersey, and South Carolina.

"We can only hope that this increase will sound an alarm to drivers, pedestrians and traffic enforcement agencies for extra effort to hold down the toll," said Howard Pyle, council president.

\$2,000 Paid For Top Bull

ELLENSBURG (AP)—A Prosser rancher paid \$2,000 Monday for WB Zato Heir 33d, grand champion bull of the 16th annual North Pacific Hereford Breeders Assn. show and sale.

The animal was bought by the Wade Hereford Ranch from A.V. Harrel & Son of Ellensburg. The show's top price of \$2,025 was paid for WB Zato Heir 27th, also a Harrel bull, by E. B. Cole and Sons of Moses Lake.

In all, 60 bulls were sold for a total of \$54,015, slightly less than \$614 an animal.

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Snowdrifts Plague Crews

WINDOW ROCK, Ariz. (AP)—Rescue crews using bulldozers battled through six-foot snowdrifts today to reach 30 Navajo Indian families reported trapped near Ft. Defiance.

A spokesman for the Navajo Tribal Council said 15 families are stranded near Crystal on the western slopes of the Choiska Mountains, about 20 miles north of Ft. Defiance. The others are in the sawmill area, about 25 miles west.

The spokesman said some have been marooned more than a week. All were reported low on food. Their sheep and cattle were said to be suffering.

Up to 30 inches of snow are reported on the ground in most areas of the 16-million-acre reservation.

Atlas Test Postponed By Air Force

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Air Force has canceled plans to shoot a Super-Atlas nearly 9,000 miles from Cape Canaveral past the tip of Africa over the Indian Ocean.

One unconfirmed report was that President Eisenhower personally turned down the idea.

The Air Force has had the beefed-up Atlas missile on a launching pad at Canaveral for days. Actual firing times were set several times and then postponed because of weather conditions.

When these plans became known in high Washington circles, the State Department reportedly raised the point that no public notice had been given so ships could avoid the impact area. Air Force officials argued this wasn't necessary because the rocket was intended to burn up in the atmosphere at the end of the trip and so would pose no danger.

The unconfirmed report said the matter was brought to the President's attention during his current South American tour, and he turned thumbs down, at least for the present.

The long shot, if it had gone off as planned, would have traveled more than 2,000 miles further than any previous U.S. missile. It also would have outdistanced recent Soviet missile shots from central Asia into the Pacific Ocean. The Soviet Union claimed a range of 7,760 miles for one of these shots and said the missile landed within 1 1/4 miles of its target.

No reasons were learned for the top-level cancellation, but speculation centered on these ideas:

1. Such a military demonstration might stir a jarring note during the President's Latin American goodwill tour.

2. The President noted at a Jan. 13 news conference that the United States has always given advance warning of missile tests over international waters. The Soviets gave advance notice on their Pacific shots, and outlined the target area.

3. Such a long-range Atlas flight might be viewed abroad as a propaganda stunt, going to outdo the Soviets in a distance race. The Atlas already is operational in small quantities at Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif. Normally its range is about 6,000 miles. The longest announced shot has been 6,325 miles.

Bank Robbery Foiled By Lad
MELROSE, N.M. (AP)—The curiosity of a boy broke up a bank burglary Tuesday.

The boy, walking home in the early morning darkness, saw a light flickering in the First National Bank.

He looked through a window. One of two burglars threw a crowbar at him.

The boy, undeterred at the request of the FBI, fled, bleeding from glass cuts. He ran home and called police. The burglars left without any loot.

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
