Finch Defense In Last Plea

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The defense said it would utter its last word at the Finch murder trial today as a parting playboy of the big scene: the death of Barbara J. Finch.

Defense attorney Grant B. Cooper approached the climax of his exhaustive summation Tuesday by arguing:

1. That Mrs. Finch invented stories of being attacked by her doctor husband simply to get the doctor over a barrel—and to get a barrel of money out of the divorce she had pending.

2. That there was no conspiracy to kill Mrs. Finch and even if there had been—what finally happened was an accident.

3. That Marie Anne Lidholm, the Finch housemaid who testified for the prosecution, is a "sweet and wholesome" girl, but not necessarily an entirely credible witness.

At issue in the two-month-old trial is whether Dr. R. Bernard Finch, 42, and his mistress, Carole Tregoff, 23, are guilty of conspiring and murder in the shooting of Mrs. Finch, 36, last July 18.

Santa Fe Train Passenger Gives Account Of Tragedy

Editor's Note: Mrs. Delma Casey and her two children were passengers on the ill-fated Santa Fe passenger train which collided with a truck-trailer rig near Bakerfield, Calif. Tuesday night, killing at least 12 persons. Mrs. Casey and her children were released from a hospital after treatment. Here is her eyewitness account of the tragedy.

By MRS. DELMA CASEY, BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (AP)—We saw flame whip past our seat and then we felt a jolt that knocked us right into the rear of the car.

My children and I were scared to death. They are Jackie—she's 3—and Karen, who is 5. We had been visiting my parents in San Leandro, Calif., and were on our way back to our home in Waco, Texas. My husband is an Air Force sergeant and wasn't with us. He is stationed at James Connely Air Force Base, Waco, Tex.

We were just sitting there eating a sandwich—each of us had one—when suddenly we saw fire whipping past our seat.

Then the train started to twist and jerk and the seats flew through the air. We were in the coach behind the baggage car.

Karen was thrown into a corner, and Jackie landed on top of her. I found myself sprawled on the floor alongside both of my daughters.

We crawled out of a window into an empty field and started walking when all of a sudden men came up to us and led us to a road to wait for an ambulance. There were about 20 of us in

Hedy Faces Payment Loss

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—If actress Hedy LaMarr doesn't show up in court Friday she risks losing \$3,000-a-month temporary support.

Domestic Relations Court Judge Ben Woodall set another pre-trial conference on the divorce suits for 2 p.m. Friday. Miss LaMarr and her husband, oilman W. Howard Lee, have filed suits against each other.

The judge said he would consider motions for termination or reduction of the temporary support if the actress fails to show up for the Friday hearing.

An attorney for Miss LaMarr, J. Edwin Smith, said "as far as I know, she will be here." Illness prevented Miss LaMarr from attending a scheduled Feb. 12 pre-trial conference.

Lee filed his divorce suit Feb. 1959 charging cruelty. He would file a countersuit the next morning claiming Lee failed to live up to a separation agreement providing her \$3,000 a month or one-half of his income whichever was greater.

Ex-Miss America Winner 'Kicked' By Show Business

NEW YORK (AP)—Show business rapped Mary Ann Mobley in her pretty white teeth but she is still game, and smiling the smile that helped her win the 1959 Miss America title.

Her first job—and what seemed a promising start to a Broadway career—was yanked from under her without explanation Friday.

She was told she was through singing on the CBS TV show "Be Our Guest" where she has been appearing Wednesday evening since January. George DeWitt, who met her show, didn't want her, said producer Perry Cross.

Neither DeWitt nor Cross would comment on Miss Mobley's firing. "I was rather surprised," the soft-spoken brown-eyed beauty who put Brandon, Miss., on the map, acknowledged Tuesday. Her \$400 a week contract runs till April, but money is no consolation to a girl whose eyes are fixed on the Great White Way.

Miss Mobley, 23, is the first to admit she's got a lot to learn and a long way to go, but "I'm determined and I'm willing to work."

The scholarship she won with her Miss America title provides dramatic, singing and dancing lessons. She is going to study harder than ever.

She is cheered, too, by an offer from a Columbia, Miss. record company to make a series of records.

Proprietor Foils Thieves

IRVINGTON, N.J. (AP)—Any one who plans to rob Frank Gilfol's liquor store had better think twice and then change his mind.

Gilfol put two bullets into a fleeing bandit who tried to hold up the store Tuesday night. There was a blood-stained trail for police to follow.

Gilfol's store: one bandit killed, two wounded and three disarmed. The 140-pound, bespectacled Gilfol keeps a gun and a club within reach behind the counter. He is 84 years old.

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex. (AP)—Five children found hungry and cold in a shack with the front door nailed shut were declared neglected and dependent and placed in foster homes Tuesday.

Investigating officers said the children, ranging up to 7 years of age, were using newspapers for fuel in a stove. The only food in the house was a few pieces of fried bread and four eggs.

At a hearing the father, Woodward Miller, a Negro farm hand, said that he and the mother had separated and that she had brought the children to Corpus Christi. Mrs. Miller, who was later found in a phone booth, told the court she had been working.

Ag Leader Feels Sorry

MEXICO CITY (AP)—The man who started all the fuss about tainted cranberries says he feels so sorry for the growers "I now drink cranberry juice for breakfast instead of tomato juice."

Dr. B. T. Shaw of the U.S. Agriculture Department disclosed this at a reception Tuesday night where he was honored as guest of honor. Shaw who first noted that parts of the 1959 cranberry crop from Oregon and Washington were contaminated by a weed killer that can produce cancer in rats.

Shaw said there was no doubt the weed killer was being used improperly but he did not believe it was dangerous.

"Tests proved that a person could have to eat 350,000 pounds of cranberries a day to endanger himself to cancer," he said.
