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quake—was ordered. Thousands poured into the surrounding fields for the night.

Mass graves were being dug for the victims. There still was no accurate count of the dead and injured.

So far no American dead were reported. A number of Americans apparently were in the resort. Rear Adm. Frank Akers, commander of the U.S. Fleet air arm in the Eastern Mediterranean and Mediterranean, said after touring Adair a number of Americans were among the injured. Many, he said, had spent up to 12 hours trapped in the ruins.

A giant airlift of French and American military planes flew more than 1,000 injured to hospitals and emergency receiving stations in Casablanca, Rabat and other cities. As yet it was impossible to determine accurately who survived and who had died.

Hundreds of French and American troops and civilian rescue workers toiled through the night, clawing at the mounds of rubble in the search for dead and wounded. Troops cordoned off the city to prevent looting. Demolition teams moved through the European sector, demolishing shattered buildings to prevent unexpected collapses.

Days of survivors searched for missing relatives. Others picked through the ruins of their homes. Smashed American and European automobiles with foreign license plates lined the wreckage of fashionable hotels.

Three-fourths of the European quarter was destroyed. The vast substantially built new Casablanca was virtually demolished. Casablanca Airport, 265 miles to the northeast, was jammed with anxious relatives of persons living in Adair.

A massive international rescue effort was in operation. American, French, Spanish and Italian naval forces and Red Cross experts converged on the scene. A contingent of U.S. Marines and Navy construction workers flew to Adair Tuesday night. The heavy cruiser Newport News was ordered from Sicily to the disaster area to furnish hospital facilities, helicopters, fresh water and other equipment.

U.S. Navy aircraft were called in from Italy, Turkey and England.

The French air force kept 30 planes shuttling survivors out of the stricken city. Fifteen ships of France's Mediterranean fleet were ordered to the disaster area. Spain dispatched the frigate Albatros to Adair with medicines.

Pair Nabbed For Rustling

EVERETT (AP) — Two men were arrested Monday night in connection with a cattle-rustling spree that has harassed Northwest Washington farmers for two months.

Snohomish County Sheriff's officers arrested David Cutcher, Everett, and Gary Aschbacher of Snohomish, both 21, and held two others — one a 14-year-old school boy — for questioning. A fifth person was being sought in Seattle, officers said.

For more than six weeks vigilante committees, the State Patrol and police officers of Stanwood, East Stanwood, Monroe, Snohomish and Arlington have been attempting to catch the rustlers.

Officers said the 14-year-old had sold school mates of taking part in the cattle thefts.

Allies Plan Task Force

PARIS (UPI) — U.S. Air Force Gen. Lauris Norstad, Allied commander in Europe, said today the Allies have decided to establish a mobile task force to deal with any military emergency confronting them.

The NATO commander told a news conference the first three battalions would be American, British and French.

He said the governments of those countries already have given their tacit agreement to set up a NATO "fire brigade."

Norstad said the three battalions, organized as a brigade group, will be established "in the course of the next war."

He said that later it might be increased to divisional strength of eight battalions, each of different nationality but integrated under a single command.

Norstad declined to specify what other nations would supply the battalions but said he hoped they would come from both the north and the south of the NATO area.

He said half-jokingly he would hope the commander of the mobile task force would not be an American.

He said it would have to be equipped both with conventional and nuclear weapons in order to deal with a great range of contingencies.

Ex-Mechanic Visits Field

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — A retired lieutenant colonel, who 50 years ago was the mechanic for the Army's first airplane flight, today visits the marker on a one-time drill field to commemorate the event.

Lt. Col. Vernon L. Barge, still alert and active, is one of the four survivors of the Army team that helped Lt. Benjamin D. Foulois get a Wright brothers plane into the air here March 2, 1910.

The flight has been credited by many as the real start of U.S. military aviation.

Risteau plaintively told the attorneys he hopes they wind up today because "I don't have room for Thursday."

The audience mostly consists of FDA specialists. They seem to know what's going on.

Two housewives have been among the regulars, sitting in on behalf of a new organization here "Federation of Homemakers."

They listen as witnesses drone through data on nine FDA color tests.

Now that the 10-day-old hearings are coming to a close, one strange feature stands out:

Little has been heard from those most affected — the women, and the rats.
