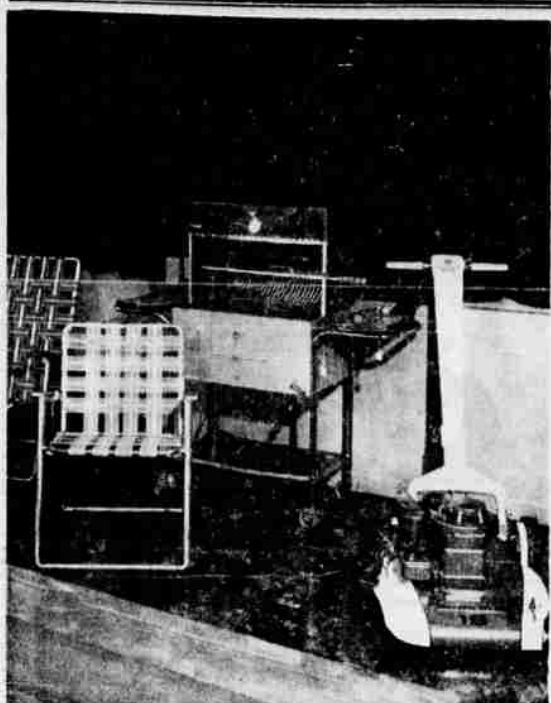


Home Show

Storybook Styling For The Small Fry

For infants and toddlers spring 1960 is the time for Sunday best, for party sheers, for Easter egg colors, for neatly tailored coats refreshed with white, for bright sturdy clothes which play hard and wash easily, for new whitewashed shades of gold, green and brown, for sun fashions which romp and swim.

In summarizing trends for the coming spring, Women's Wear Daily finds that dresses for little girls fall into two categories — the girlish and the party dress, and the almost classic, almost tailored right — for — any occasion dress.

Party dresses are sheer delights. These favor the storybook silhouette — twirly skirts and sashed waists. They are most often interpreted in sheer cotton lawn, batiste or organdie, Dacron batiste, nylon sheer and blends of nylon, Dacron and cotton. The colors are pale pink, blue, yellow, mauve and mint. Embroidery and laces, in abundance, are dainty and carefully applied.

The more tailored dresses most often portrayed in cotton broadcloth look freshest in white-washed gold, greens and browns. The accent for collars, cuffs, aprons and pinafores is almost universally white — white which lightens and contrasts with new muted tones.

SARDINE "HERO"

The little folks will really go for this Lenten luncheon treat. Cut the whole loaf of French bread lengthwise. Spread mayonnaise generously on each half. Line one half with crisp romaine lettuce leaves. Form a layer of sliced tomatoes over lettuce and top with well drained Norway sardines. Sprinkle over a few drops of lemon juice. Press second half of bread firmly on top and cut in half. It's a meal in itself.

BROILED FISH

When you broil fish, try sprinkling chopped pickles over the top before you slide it under the broiler.

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APPLE DUMPLINGS

Apple dumplings are old-fashioned, but only if good eating is out of date.

Somehow, one's grandmother always made the best apple dumplings. A recipe came down from mother to daughter in our family which we would like to pass along to the readers of this section.

Make biscuit dough from scratch or use a mix. Add 1 tablespoon of sugar extra for each cup of flour used and roll the dough out a little thinner than for biscuits. One cup of mix should make four apple dumplings.

Peel a Snoboy Winesap apple, quarter and core. If it is a big one (and have you noticed how very big the Snoboy Winesaps are this year?) one apple will make four dumplings.

Place a quarter of apple on each of the four squares you cut from the dough. Add a dab of butter, a teaspoon of sugar and dash of cinnamon and fold the dough over the apple and seal. Place the dumplings in a deep sided pan, such as glass bread pan or the pan you make a meatloaf in. Add cold water until the water comes halfway up on the dumplings. Sprinkle a quarter of a cup of sugar over all. Add a couple of good dashes of cinnamon and nutmeg if you wish and dabs of butter.

Cook in preheated oven (375 to 400 degrees) until the apples are done. It will take about 40 to 50 minutes. Serve hot or cold.

We liked also the long-handled barbecue tools equipped with leather things for convenient hanging.

GOOD SOUP

Leftover roast pork in the refrigerator? Cut it into matchstick size pieces and add it to consommé with a halved peeled garlic clove, heat. Throw in some sprigs of watercress and continue just long enough to wilt the cress. Remove the garlic and serve this good soup as the first course for a Chinese supper menu.

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
