

Recruit Exceptional Pupil, Says Ex-Harvard President

PORTLAND (AP) — An ex-coach uses on an outstanding president of Harvard University emphasized, however, that no student should be required to take the enthusiasm that a high school Tuesday. The famous educator, a former

of all students, just as no athlete should be required to play football or basketball.

"It's a job for the counselor or guidance officer," he said in an interview.

"The academically talented student should be urged to take all the elective mathematics and science courses possible during his high school years.

"But since this is only advice, allowance can be made for the very exceptional student who has truly creative, artistic ability and who might well be advised to go on to a conservatory or an art school," he said.

Conant, in an address prepared for the annual convention of the National Assn. of Secondary-School Principals, told nearly 4,000 delegates:

"If a basketball coach sees a boy well over six feet tall with good coordination he will urge the boy to try out for the basketball team for his own good and for the welfare of the team and school."

"The same reasoning should hold true for a boy or girl with talent in mathematics and science. His or her own welfare and that of the nation call for the development of this talent. I would also make the same statement about students with talent for foreign languages."

Conant told a reporter that in some areas, particularly the well-to-do suburbs, the problem is not so much to encourage the able student as it is to dissuade the overly ambitious parent.

Some of these parents, he said, "are determined that their children are going on to college and become doctors or lawyers, without taking into consideration that their children just don't have the capabilities."

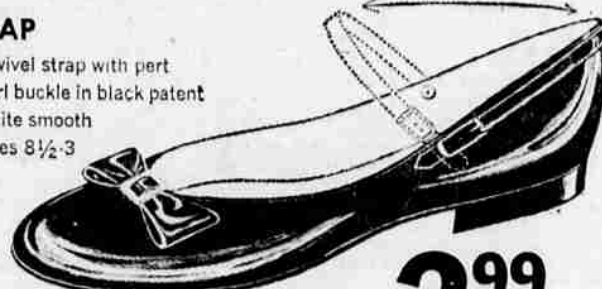

TULELAKE—The annual Tulelake Fire Department's ball, open to the public, will be held Saturday, March 5, in the home economics building at the Tulelake-Butte Valley Fairgrounds.

Music will be by the Rhythm-aires of Cedarville. Dancing will be from 10 p.m. to 2 a.m.

Funds from the dance go for needs of the volunteer fire crew, to be used for cleaning of uniforms and payment of \$2.50 per member per fire and other incidentals. The department now maintains a roster of 30 firemen, 24 in Tulelake and six in Newell, plus six inactive members sometimes called in an emergency.

Scared Children Perish In Fire

FILLMORE, Calif. (AP) — Five children apparently too scared to run died in a fire that destroyed their tiny wooden home Wednesday.

Investigators said the children of ranch worker Louis Juarez and his wife Minnie had locked themselves in the two-room home while their parents were working. They were found huddled in a bedroom.

Killed were Irene Juarez, 12; David, 10; Della, 8; Bobby, 5, and an unidentified boy, aged 6 months. The parents were put under medical sedation.

Investigators believe the blaze started in a couch.
