

### KF Quintets, Caveman '5's Share Action

GRANTS PASS (Special)—Basketball for the 1960 season ended on both a low and a high note for a pair of Klamath Union High clubs as the sophomore Wildcats topped the Cave Babes 56-52 and the KU Freshmen bowed 50-44 to the Cave Babes here Saturday afternoon.

The Wildcats, paced by a 23 point effort by guard Sherm Allen, had to resort to press tactics in the first half of their win to overcome a Grants Pass 13-12 first quarter edge. The KU sophomores found the range in the second stanza and were out front 36-36 by halftime and were never headed. After leading 44-39 at the close of the third, however, the Wildcats got in hot water as the young Cavemen moved to within one point with 45 seconds left in the final period.

Dave Stippich saved the day by stealing the ball and going for a layin. He collected a foul en route and sank both free tosses to give the KU five its win.

Allen hit 11 field goals, all from outside, and had a 1-1 at the foul line for his total. Bob Dearing was next for Van Kouten with 12 points.

Vic Van Kouten, with 17 points and Dick McSwain, with 13, were the top producers for the Cavemen and primarily responsible for the last ditch stand of the host club. The win gave the Wildcats an 8-won, 12-lost record for the season.

In the Fresh game everything was just the opposite for the KF quint. Grover Dahn had high point honors with 13, and the Fresh led 15-14 at the end of the first frame and were out front 30-24 at half-time.

They soured out in the third stanza though and trailed 37-36 going into the final frame. They couldn't get up the hill as Cave Babe Gary Reddick, who scored 11 points, inspired his mates to their win.

The defeat meant the Fresh finished their season with an 11-won, 10-lost record.

### Riley Wins Score Title

PORTLAND (AP)—Linfield scoring ace Dick Riley, only 5-foot-8, tossed out Ed Grossbacher of Willamette and won his fourth consecutive Northwest Conference basketball scoring title. Riley tallied 320 points in 15 conference games for an average of 21.3 points a game. He bested the total of 316 by Grossbacher, whose average was 21.1.

Next in line were Larry Lynn, Willamette, 258, 17.2 points a game; Bob Fox, Lewis and Clark, 228, 15.2 per game; and Bill Wilfert, Willamette, 220, 14.7.

Grossbacher, who led Willamette to the conference championship, proved most accurate at the free throw line. He sank 50 of 71 for an .845 mark.

Linfield's Gene Carlsoo displayed top accuracy on field goals hitting 46 of 85 for a .541 clip. Bob Fox of Lewis and Clark led rebounding with 257 or 17.1 per game.

Willamette's 76.7 and Linfield's 76.1 were the highest team average point totals per game. Linfield was best on defense, allowing only 63.2 points a game. Whitman was second, permitting only 63.9 points each game.

Linfield's team shooting mark of .432 was best in field goals. Willamette's .735 mark for free throws led in that department. Lewis and Clark led in rebounds with 886.

College of Idaho committed the least fouls, only 226.

### South Suburb LL Meet Set

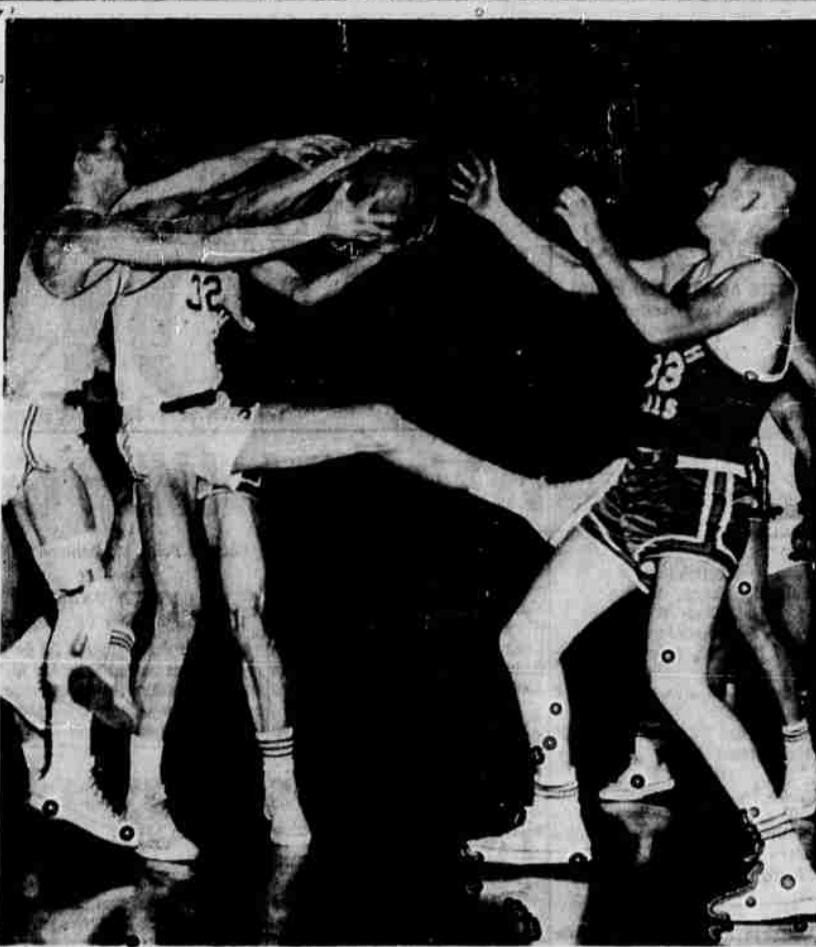

# Cincinnati Clinches MVC Crown

DES MOINES (AP)—Cincinnati clinched the baseball championship of the Missouri Valley conference Saturday night by overcoming a stubborn Drake team 71-56. But in the process the Bearcats' Oscar Robertson was held to 23 points.

Drake's Gus Guydon also pumped in 23 points to share scoring honors of the game with the big "O" as the Bulldogs fought Cincinnati's No. 1 nationally ranked outfit on seven terms through the first period. They were tied 30-30 at the half.

The Bearcats, however, took command after the intermission and quickly moved to a 40-36, although Robertson, far below his usual stride, fired only once and missed during the first four minutes.

But after Cincinnati increased its margin to 46-36 Oscar got busy and scored on jump shots and tries from the corner.

Cincinnati needed the victory to avoid having to share the Missouri Valley title with Bradley and it gave the Bearcats an overall 24-1 record this season.

### Buckeyes Victor

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Joe Roberts' scoring in the second half revived Ohio State's faltering Big Ten champions and brought them a 75-66 basketball victory over Minnesota Saturday night.

Firing jump shots, hooks and driving up layups, the husky 6-foot-5 Buckeye senior hit 11 of his team's 13 points over a decisive six-minute stretch early in

the second half when the game hung in the balance.

It was Ohio State's 13th conference victory against a lone defeat — to Indiana — and marked the Buckeyes' final tuneup for the NCAA playoffs.

Minnesota ended the season 8-6 and landed in a tie with Illinois and Northwestern for third place.

### Billikens Beaten

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Bradley's fourth-ranked Braves, paced by Chet (The Jet) Walker and Al Saunders, raced past the bigger but slower St. Louis Billikens 81-71 Saturday night but had to settle for second place in the Missouri Valley Conference.

Walker pumped in 27 points and grabbed 11 rebounds. Saunders

was the difference with 22 points and 10 rebounds, helping the Braves to an unexpected 47-39 edge in rebounds.

The Braves broke a 23-23 tie late in the first half and raced ahead 37-27 with Saunders expert screening and hot shooting a big help. It was 40-33 at halftime and St. Louis never could mount a serious threat in the last half despite the urgings of a capacity crowd of 10,158.

Bob Nordmann, the Bills 6-foot-10, 270-pound pivot, finished with 23 points and 13 rebounds, thanks to a late spurge after Bradley had grabbed a 15-point lead. St. Louis, already picked for a spot in the regional invitation tourney, finished 9-5 in the Valley and stands 18-7 with one game left. Bradley finished 24-2.

# Austrians Dominate Harriman Slalom

SUN VALLEY, Idaho (AP)—Austria dominated the Harriman Cup Slalom Saturday but there was grumbling, especially from France.

Austria's Hias Leitner won the men's slalom in 68.2 seconds, Peip Stiegler was second in 68.4 and Ernest Oberaigner third in 68.8.

In the women's slalom, Austria's 16-year-old Traudl Hecher won with times of 47 and 46.8 seconds—93.8 total—for two runs through the 38-gate course. Her countrywoman, Marianne Olahn, was second in 94.8.

Beverly Anderson of Mullan,

Idaho, made the best showing for the United States—third in the women's slalom in 99.2 seconds. Betsy Snite of Norwich, Vt., was ninth in 115.5 even though she fell on both her runs.

Palmer took the lead Friday with his second 71 on the 6,600-yard Baton Rouge Country Club course. His latest round gave him a 21 total for 54 holes.

Doug Sande, Miami, Fla., trailed in second with a 215 and a poor 77 the first round but made an amazing recovery.

Jay Hebert, Lafayette, La., shot his third straight par 72 for a 216 and a strong third place.

Doug Ford, Orlando, Fla., Alen Geiberg, Studio City, Calif., and Dave Ragan, Orlando, Fla., were tied for fourth at 217.

Palmer had two under par 34 on the front side and one under 35 on the back. His 69 tied the previous low for 18 holes in the tournament.

The defending champion, Howie Long of Mendocino, Calif., fell way back in the pack of 66 remaining professionals with a 228. The playing appeared better than in the two previous days although the temperature hovered between 31 degrees early and 42 late in the day.
