

Malin Nabs District 5B Crown

County Kings Cinch State Tourney Spot

ASHLAND (Special) — The Malin basketball team gained the right to represent District 5B at the State B Tournament which begins March 10 in Baker by besting St. Mary's 37-36 on the Southern Oregon College court Friday night.

The Mustangs defeated the Medford five 44-40 in the first game of the best two of three series Thursday night.

Both games were similar in that they were seesaw battles, all the way. The lead changed hands on numerous occasions. For the second consecutive evening the Malin

quint won the ball game from the free throw line. Malin hit nine of 18 attempts from the foul line as compared to St. Mary's 6-15. The losing quint hit 15 field goals while the Mustangs collected only 14.

St. Mary's nearly drove the Mustangs wild with frustration with their ball controlling offensive weave which they operated to near perfection.

Friday night the game was filled with thrills from the initial jump. With two minutes and 50 seconds remaining in the final quarter and the Crusaders ahead 34-31, the Mustangs finally pulled themselves together when Rick Illian and Larry Rick hit on successive jumpers to put the Malin five out front 35-34.

However, it was Malin's Randy Miller who provided the winning points when he calmly got off a pair of free tosses with :57 left to ice the contest.

Miller's 12 points were high for the night. He hit five from the floor and the fateful two for three from the charity stripe. Sophomore Rick followed Miller with 11.

A couple of brothers, Bob and Dick Evans, gained scoring honors for the Crusaders with 10 and 11 points respectively.

A couple of fouls by Illian and a tip-in by Dick Evans put the Crusaders out front 5-0 after five minutes of the opening frame were gone. Two jump shots by Rick and one by Illian helped the Mustangs to shorten the Jackson County champs' lead to 7-6 at the end of the first quarter.

The victors went out front for the first time with 6:18 left in the second stanza when Dave DeMerritt dropped in a free throw to make the 10-9 for Malin. The half ended with Malin ahead 16-15.

Malin maintained its one-point spread at the end of the third canto but it took a magnificent shooting display by Randy Miller who connected on four out of five jump shots to place the Mustangs in front 29-28.

Big Ten Directors Rebel, Fight Is On

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — The 64-year-old Western Conference was embroiled in a free-for-all family fight — a scrap which may end with the powerful football confining all sports to its own back yard.

Rebellious athletic directors of the explosion Friday.

Shorn of Pasadena's pomp, pageantry and prestige — plus a \$300,000 annual payoff — by faculty votes which Friday killed the 14-year-old Rose Bowl pact, the sports chiefs struck back.

They came up with a startling resolution urging that postseason events in all sports be banned — not just in football. Faculty representatives immediately approved it.

The conference rules, on such major registration, provide a 24-hour "cooling-off" period before it becomes effective. Thus a new vote is practically assured at the May 18-21 session in East Lansing, Mich., after the faculty men get new instructions from their universities.

An objection to the postseason ban must be made by one of the members within the 60-day period to force a vote, but conference officials said such an objection was practically automatic. A majority vote at East Lansing is necessary to formally approve the action.

But if the members split 5-5 as they did in outlawing the Rose Bowl pact, then out the window goes postseason participation in NCAA basketball tournaments, AAU meets, and late tennis, baseball, golf, wrestling, swimming and other competitions.

Big Ten athletes would lose away their uniforms the day their regular schedule ends. Lone exception is Olympic tryouts, once every four years.

Although the Rose Bowl pact is dead, the proposal that a member could go on an invitational basis is still breathing lightly. It is possible, Asst. Commissioner Bill Reed said, that it could come up for another vote at the East Lansing session.

Carly led all scorers with 15, followed by Oregon's Chuck Rask, a senior from Portland, who sank 13. The game, rough throughout and ragged in the final minutes, was played before 6,178 persons.

Oregon State had a 56-36 edge in rebounds and sank 17 of 51 field goal tries for a 33 per cent average compared to Oregon, which hit 16 of 58 for 28 per cent.

All but one of the 16 entries are set for the 16-team Oregon class A-1 high school basketball tournament at Eugene March 15-19.

Cleveland of Portland, Jesuit of Portland and South Eugene clinched places in the meet with victories Friday night.

Cleveland won the Portland League championship with a 52-44 victory over Franklin, last year's state champion.

Jesuit clinched second place in the Willamette-Columbia Valley League when it downed Reynolds of Troutdale, 42-35.

South Eugene beat Springfield, 48-44, in a playoff for the Midwestern League's second tournament spot.

Jefferson and Benson wound up a tie for second place in the Portland League. Jefferson beat Washington, 60-44, and Benson dropped Lincoln, 46-40. Jefferson and Benson will meet Tuesday for the league's second tourney spot.

The lineup for the first round of the tournament at Eugene: Tuesday night, March 15: David Douglas of Portland vs. Marshfield; Cleveland vs. Albany. Wednesday, March 16: Lake Oswego vs. La Grande; Sandy vs. Klamath Falls; Beaverton vs. South Eugene; Benson or Jefferson vs. South Salem; St. Helens vs. Hermiston, and Jesuit vs. Medford.

Nine of the 10 top teams in the final Associated Press poll are in the tournament. Favorites probably will be the No. 1-2 teams, Medford and Marshfield of Coos Bay. Medford walloped Grants Pass Friday night, 74-43, for its 19th straight win. The victory in 39 games.

Others of the 10 in the meet are Hermiston, No. 3; La Grande, No. 8; and Cleveland and David Douglas, tied for No. 9.

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — "That man is the greatest. He is a real sportsman."

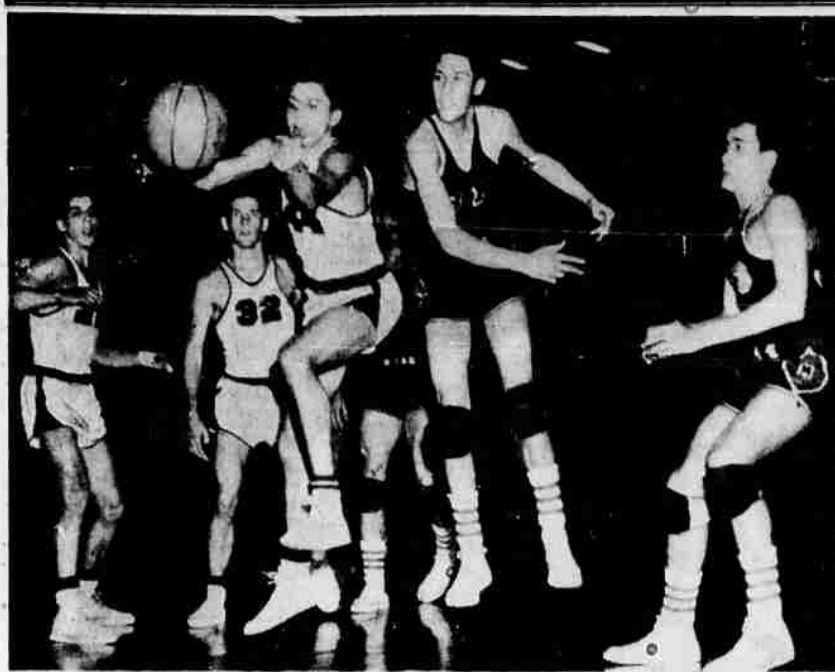

Friday night the Pelicans halfheartedly warmed up for their Saturday finale with the Cavemen by whipping the Ashland Grizzlies 66-39 in a game on the Ashland senior high court. Both the Whitebirds and the Ashlanders utilized every player in a varsity suit.

In the Friday prelim the Klamath Union Jayvees closed out their 1960 season with a 58-37 triumph over the Grizzly juniors.

Guard Paul Bishop led the var-

sity point production with 14 points, two more than the 12 collected by Ashland's Phil Tucker. Pelican Dean Dunson was next with 11 while Gary Patzke added nine, Bob Lewis, seven, and Bruce Bricker rounded out the starting five's total with six.

The Pelican boss, Dean White, started his player parade after five minutes of the second period had elapsed with Steve Binney, Don Eastman and Wayne Dennis. The score read 25-16 at this point.

The Pels ended the first canto out front 14-10 after coming from behind. By halftime they had stretched the lead to 29-21, and from here on there was little doubt.

In the third period KU slapped the stopper on the valley five, allowing only five points, while they got a semi-fast break going that netted 14, and brought the third period to a close at 43-26.

In the hectic fourth period both clubs relaxed their defenses and the Grizzlies netted 13 while the Pelicans hit for 23.

Bricker with 13, and Patzke and Eastman, each of whom pulled down 11, led the KU quint to a 75-32 edge in the rebounding department. Jim Stewart and Tucker led the Ashland rebounders with eight and six respectively.

From the field the Pels connected on 27 of 71 tries while the best the Grizzlies could muster was 15 for 57 attempts. Neither club set any marks from the foul line, KU hitting 12-25 while Ashland netted 9-16.

The only KP player who failed to crack the score column was Kent Hunsaker, but the youngster played only the final 17 seconds of the game.

In the Jayvee victory guard Bob Lapsley led the Pel scorers with 14. Hunsaker was next with 10 and Wally Palmberg was third with nine. The balance of the KU scoring saw everyone on the bench get on the board. Ray Taylor hit six, Dennis, Rich Depew and Earl Yeoman each hit for four, Sherm Allen collected five and Ron Briskin notched two.
