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Audience Thrills To Artistry Of Soprano

One of the most beautiful voices on the concert stage today is that of Leontyne Price who gave a superb concert Friday evening, February 26, in Mills Auditorium. From the first moment of her appearance on stage in glamorous red satin, Miss Price held the packed house spellbound with the artistry of her dramatic soprano voice and her warm, charming manner.

Her well-chosen program demonstrated her unusual ability to communicate with her audience, whether in the medium of sacred, romantic, operatic or spiritual selections. Her versatility of style was exemplified in the delicate shimmering tones of "Night and Dreams" by Schubert, as contrasted with the powerful vibrant singing of "The Omnipotence."

She is essentially an operatic artist and the two seldom heard Arias of Cilea were truly thrilling. Of the Samuel Barber modern group, the "Nuvoletti" was perhaps the most intriguing. The spirituals were sung as they were meant to be sung and so were very moving.

The audience gave enthusiastic expression of delight when she announced her first encore, the well known "Summertime" lullaby from Porgy and Bess. Due to a bad throat condition she gave but one additional encore, a lovely operatic aria by Puccini, which was a perfect ending to an inspiring evening.

She was ably supported at the piano by the beautiful sensitive accompaniments of David Garvey. Surely many years of stellar stardom lie ahead for this beautiful artist who has zoomed to the very top so early in life. As the famous Washington, D.C. critic, Walter Hume, appraised her: "They come no greater, few anywhere near so great." We are grateful to have had the opportunity of hearing her at this fascinating stage in a great career, and in our own hometown.

This was the final concert in an exceptionally well received Community Concert season.
