Quota Club Selects Woman of the Year

Quota Club's achievement award for 1960's "Woman of the Year" was presented Friday evening, February 26, to Patsy Fredrickson of Gilchrist at a dinner meeting in the Pelican party room. Guest speaker for this occasion was Dr. Leonard Mayfield, superintendent of the Medford schools.

When Cardula Eels named Mrs. Fredrickson as the Woman of Achievement she reviewed the many unsold hours she has given to the Gilchrist community in the past seven years. Because Gilchrist, like many small isolated towns, lacks agencies and service clubs, Mrs. Fredrickson has volunteered her services to health and welfare committees of the PTA, immunization clinics, pre-school physical examinations and has read high school tests for tuberculosis. She is responsible for distribution of health literature, also. Because of her registered nurse background she is called on for help in all types of emergencies and disasters.

In addition to her concern for the community health, Mrs. Fredrickson is also interested in its recreation needs. A community newspaper is mimeographed every week and distributed to residents free of charge. She cuts the stencils and with the help of her family runs off the copies.

Her most important job, however, remains in her home where she cares for the many needs of three lively grade school children and her husband, who is a state policeman.

In conclusion Mrs. Eels presented the award certificate and an orchid corsage to this year's Woman of Achievement.

The meeting was opened with the invocation by Natalia Reichenberg, followed by a greeting from Dottie Poole, president of the club. A tribute to Quota was presented by Vera Chase in observance of Quota's 41st birthday anniversary.

Many guests were present and introduced. Among them were Mary Bothwell, president of Soroptimist Club, and Ni Patterson, president of AAUW. Also introduced were Mr. and Mrs. Vern Rocheke and David Fredrickson of Gilchrist, and Mrs. Leonard Mayfield, wife of the guest speaker.

Decorations for the banquet, done by Virginia Wayburn, followed the theme, "A Star is Born." White snowflake stars hanging on either side of a multi-color star on the end wall, matched those along the tables. Streamers of gold and silver and a charming floral arrangement on the head table completed the decor.

His talk, although sprinkled with humor, was thought provoking as he told of conditions in the Soviet in education, economics and particularly in the status of women. Of interest to the group were posters, medals and text books with which he illustrated his speech.

The meeting closed with the group repeating the Quota collect.
