TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) — The way was cleared today for President Chiang Kai-shek to gain a third six-year term without changing Nationalist China's constitution.

The screening committee of the National Assembly voted 355-33 to suspend the constitutional two-term limit on the presidency during the "national crisis," which is as long as the Communist hold the China mainland.

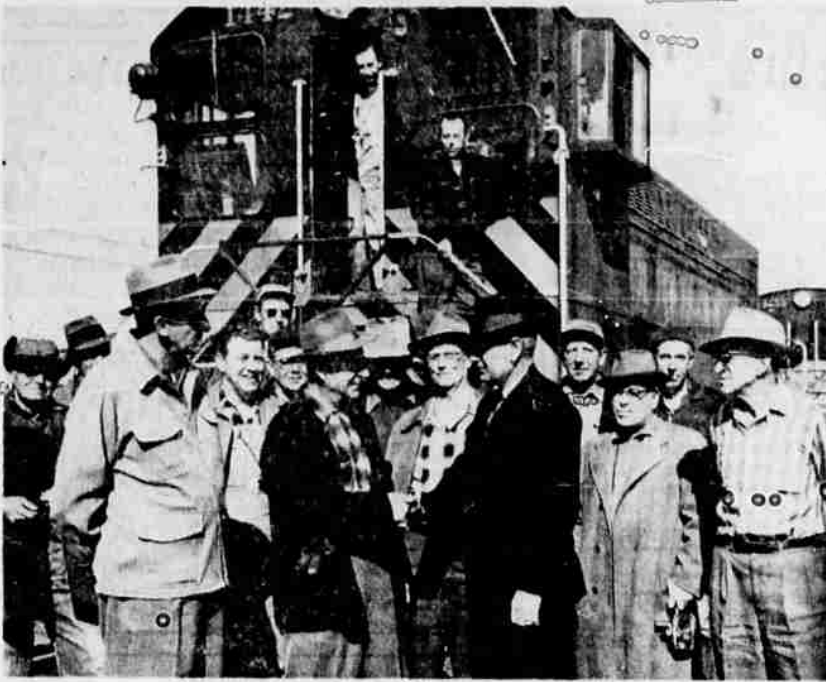

General opening of the new operation under a new name is planned by May 15.

Barley Slate Meeting Set

TULELAKE — Tulelake cereal farmers will meet with University of California scientists and barley buyers Friday, March 11, at 1:30 p.m. in the Tulelake-Butte Valley Fairgrounds. The purpose of the school is to bring farmers up-to-date on the University of California's wheat and barley program. All new varieties of cereals are tested locally at the Tulelake Field Station, Burt Hoyle, station superintendent, reports that several new two-rowed malting varieties show promise of being outstanding. These new varieties will be described in detail by plant breeders.

Considerable work is being done in Tulelake on barley and cereal fertilization and the fertilizer effect on barley malting quality and durum semolina. Each year several field tests are carried out by the university in cooperation with local farmers. These tests have been valuable in determining fertilizer recommendations for different areas of the basin, according to Ken Baggett, Tulelake farm adviser.
