Contract awards for heavy engineering construction in the Pacific Northwest climbed to a \$79,822,665 total for February, an increase of \$37.1 million over the same period a year ago, according to Pacific Builder & Engineer . . . primarily responsible for the unusually high dollar volume were two major contracts, one for a Titan launching site near Mountain Home AFB, Idaho, awarded to Kaiser Engineers, Raymond International, Macco Corp., and Puget Sound Bridge & Drydock Co. by the Corps of Engineers for \$28.3 million . . . and the City of Tacoma's Mayfield Dam on the Cowlitz River which went to Perini Corp. on a low bid of \$9.9 million . . . Oregon's total for the month was \$12.5 million compared with \$3.7 million last year . . . the increase of \$8.7 million was due mainly to an award to Hood Construction Co. by the El Paso Natural Gas Co. for the major share of a pipeline from Camas, Wash., to Salem, estimated at \$3 million . . . and an award by the state to Roy L. Houck, Inc., for \$1.3 million for paving 30 miles on the Pacific Highway east of Eugene.

TULELAKE—A series of meetings for the study of possible changes in the 1960 premium book for the Tulelake-Butte Valley Fair will be held Monday, March 7, in the fair office.

Fair dates this year are September 10-11-12.

Department Cancels Call

The Department of the Interior stressed in a release Thursday that there will be no readvertisement of bids for the three other units on the Klamath Reservation for which bids will be opened April 1, and for four other units for which the bid opening has been set for August 1.

The department had ordered the immediate readvertisement of bids for the sale of three timber units valued at \$21,235,030 when the bid opening on January 20 failed to produce qualified bids.

The three units are Modoc Point (56,389 acres with a realization value of \$3,784,618; North Marsh with 45,895 acres and a realization value of \$11,047,376; and Sykan with 61,611 acres and \$6,403,030 realization value.

A requirement in the readvertisement is that management plans for prospective buyers be received by the regional forester not later than next September 1. Forest Service consideration of those plans will be concluded and the results mailed to the potential bidders not later than November 15.
