Plans Told For Lectures

Leaders of First Christian Church have announced plans for a series of lectures on the Bible to be presented during the week of March 20 through 25, featuring Guy J. Wright, well known authority on the Holy Land, collector of unusual Bibles and professor of Bible and Hebrew at Northwest Christian College in Eugene.

Dr. Wright will speak on such topics as the story of the writing of the Bible, the inspiration of the scriptures, the transmission of the Bible, its preservation, and

the purpose of the Bible today. He is authoritatively considered most capable of discussing these topics both interestingly and with authority. He received the B. A. degree from Eureka College, the M. A. and B. D. degrees from Drake University, and the Ph. D. degree from the University of Chicago. He served as a chaplain in the armed forces and has many years of pastoral service.

Dr. Wright will speak at the morning and evening services on Sunday, March 20, and at 7:30 Monday through Friday evenings. An added feature will be a pot-luck fellowship dinner at 1:30 p.m. Sunday, March 20, when Wright will display his extensive collection of scriptures dating from as early as A. D. 1551.

The meetings are to be open to the public and all interested persons are urged to attend.

The workshop is designed to help the church enlist and train more people who are willing to serve. Classes may be chosen by those assisting. Nightly attendance is urged.

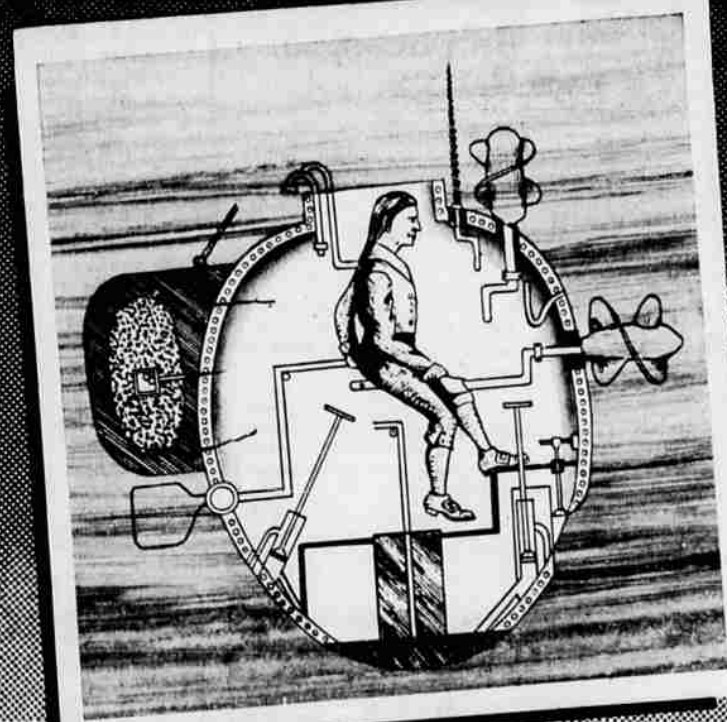

Move Over, Davy Jones

DAVID BUSHNELL, a student at Yale College in 1776, solved a problem that had occupied some of the world's best minds for centuries. He built a hand-propelled submarine that actually worked. It was called the **TURTLE**. Bushnell invented it as a carrier for attaching an underwater bomb—another of his inventions—to enemy ship bottoms.

Later, the first practical engine-propelled submarine, the **U.S.S. HOLLAND**, was designed by John Philip Holland for the U. S. Navy in 1900. Today, atomic submarines travel in Jules Verne style more than "Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Sea".
