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Wedding Bells, Babies Boom Economy

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Worried about the next decade? Relax. The nation's statisticians and economists have taken out their charts, looked at their mathematical formulas, consulted with the Census Bureau, and come up with this cheering news:

Some 4,000 assorted economists and statisticians met here recently to try out some of their ideas and predictions on each other. These are not the views of all 4,000. Frankly no two men seem to agree precisely on anything. Rather this is a sort of consensus of representative economists, reached

by men who have been studying what's ahead.

Specifically—by 1970: The U.S. will have a population of between 203 million and 220 million.

Employment will be up around 61 million to 82 million. Unemployment will be about 3,400,000.

The average work week will be only 37 hours.

The Gross National Product—the total production of goods and services—will be up about 50 per cent to \$723 billion.

New homes will be built at an average rate of one and a third million a year all during the 1960's, compared with only a million predicted for 1960.

Or in dollars, new homes will be built at the rate of almost \$25 billion a year, compared with \$16 billion expected for 1960. The average home will be a little bigger, and more expensive.

There'll still be recessions in the 60's—around every four years or so. But they'll be mild, more

every year. The average will hit close to 1,300,000 a year in the first half of the '60's—and around 1,500,000 a year between 1965 and 1970.

There will be a growing shortage of industrial managers. White collar workers will gradually greatly outnumber blue collar men.

The trend will be for fewer people to be thrown out of work during recessions.

Farm income will continue to move downward. The migration from the farms to the cities will continue. The rate of migration will increase in the '60's.

There will be a major shift of workers out of manufacturing and mining into the services and professions.

Foreign competition will continue to grow as some key competing countries continue to modernize their factories at a faster rate than American companies.

New products will be developed during the '60's at an even faster rate than in the decade just past. The reason: a whopping increase in industrial research in the next 10 years.

on the order of the 1957-58 recession—or a little more severe.

But don't expect any big boom-busts like that of 1929 and the early 1930's.

Creeping inflation will continue. Even if successive administrations attempt more and more controls, these won't stop it.

Social security will continue to expand. So will company pension plans—also unemployment compensation programs.

A growing surplus of unskilled labor looms for the '60's. There will be more labor unrest and labor turnover—due in part to the flooding of younger people into the labor market as a result of the baby boom that started two decades ago.

At present, about 900,000 men and women enter the labor force

Jury Acquits Leon Pearson

A circuit court jury exonerated Leon Pearson Friday night of a charge of robbery by force and violence, not armed with a dangerous weapon. Deliberation lasted about two hours.

Pearson, 31, of Klamath Falls and Chilquin, had been accused of assaulting Carl W. Tomlinson, July 29 and robbing him of \$100 and a watch.

Wednesday, Mrs. Cleo Williams, 31, Pearson's co-defendant, was found guilty as charged.

Tomlinson, 61, now living in Saratoga, California, had stopped in Chilquin to get something to eat on his way to Portland, met Pearson in a tavern and accepted an invitation to watch the Wednesday night fights on television at Alice Hood's home.

Tomlinson charged that on his way back to his car, after the fights, he was attacked, beaten and robbed of \$120 in cash, \$60 in traveler's checks and a watch.

Judge James Main of Medford gave the case to the jury late Friday.

David R. Vandenberg Jr. and William Bradshaw were defense attorneys.

Deputy District Attorney O. W. Goakley was state's attorney.
