George Price, parks and recreation director, spawned the idea after viewing one of the Sacramento Recreation Department's play areas based on the same theme.

Anyone who is familiar with children will tell you that it takes very little to set a child's imagination aflame. With the drawings that have been made up of the proposed structures which will go into the fairyland, it might be safe to say that even a few adults might become enthusiastic.

Price hasn't as yet enlisted the aid of anyone in assisting with this project. This is not an idle pipe dream; it has all the earmarks of a basically sound plan and, as a consequence, he feels that many in the community might wish to assist in this venture.

With each succeeding year more and more youngsters are graduating from these leagues with the result that, if a town team was re-established, Klamath Falls might possibly vie with Drain a few years hence for the right to represent Oregon in the NBA finals.

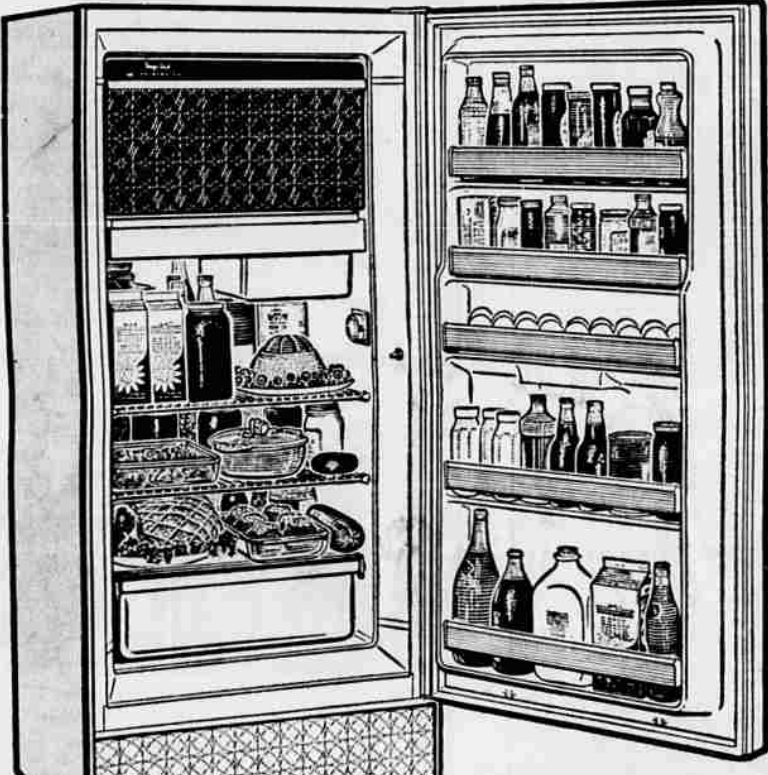
