

## U.S. Troops Airlifted To Caribbean Vicinity

FT. CAMPBELL, Ky. (AP)—Red-nosed military transport planes were transporting shivering, red-nosed troops from snow-covered United States bases today to weeks of maneuvers in balmy Puerto Rico.

The split-second airlift schedule, which will last throughout the exercises, will get 700 soldiers and hundreds of tons of equipment to the Caribbean common-

wealth by midnight. Before the operation ends, 18,000 soldiers and 11,000 tons of equipment will be sent to Puerto Rico and returned.

Eight thousand of the men are 101st Airborne Division paratroopers from Ft. Campbell, where the temperature was 25 degrees. Nine hours after departure, the men will be in Puerto Rico where the temperature is expected to reach the 80s.

Exercise Big Slam-Puerto Pine is one of the largest airlifts of men and equipment ever undertaken in peacetime and is designed to flex the muscles of this nation's missile-age defenses. Its chief purpose is to see how quickly the Military Transport Service can speed battle-ready troops to the world's hot spots.

Those taking part in the joint Army-Air Force exercise include Utah National Guardsmen and Pennsylvania Reservists.

Others will come from such widely separated points as the Pacific Northwest and New England.

The first planes took off at 12:30 a.m. and the schedule called for similar flights, each carrying 10 men with battle equipment, every half hour during most of the next two weeks. Most of the men will stay in Puerto Rico only two or three days.

The initial flights will be loaded primarily with equipment. The big lift of manpower will be Saturday.

Similar flights took off simultaneously from Ft. Bragg, N.C.; McGuire Air Force Base, N.J., and eleven other departure points.

Fate of the men who were trapped six days ago remains as shrouded as the smoke and gas-clogged air. However, rescuers believe they had time to barricade themselves off with heavy canvas.

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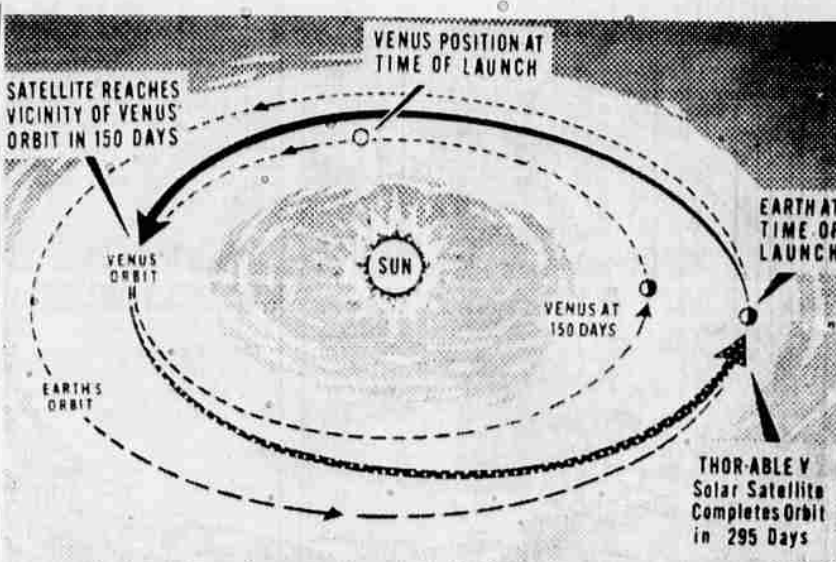

## Nikita Felled By Influenza; Tour Delayed

MOSCOW (AP)—Nikita Khrushchev is expected to be laid up the rest of the week with influenza, which forced a last-minute postponement of his tour of France.

Diplomats here scoffed at the idea that the Soviet premier, who was scheduled to fly to Paris Tuesday, might be pleading "an illness of convenience." They said he was eagerly looking forward to pre-summit talks with French President Charles de Gaulle.

There were some Western suggestions that Khrushchev had decided it would not be discreet to follow up his recent Southeast Asian tour, in which he denounced colonialism, with a formal visit to a country many Asians and Africans consider the worst colonial offender.

If the Kremlin had ever worried about this, diplomats here said, Khrushchev would never have arranged the French tour in the first place.

The Communist party newspaper Pravda said this morning a new date for Khrushchev's visit "will be fixed by the two governments promptly."

There is a possibility that his French tour, originally planned for two weeks, may be shortened because of De Gaulle's busy traveling program in the weeks before the East-West talks open in Paris May 16.

The French president is going to London April 5 for three days and in mid-April he starts a two-week trip to Canada, the United States and French possessions in the West Indies.

Khrushchev is understood to be resting comfortably at his country home outside Moscow with the nation's top doctors in attendance. His wife and family are with him.

If Soviet tradition is followed, there will be no regular bulletins on the progress of the illness.

The premier apparently has stricken suddenly—possibly Friday, Soviet newspapers and other officials were caught by surprise.

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## Satellite Deep In Space; Radio Operating Well

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The U.S. Pioneer V sun satellite approached the half-million-mile post today on its trek through space still sending back radio signals to earth.

The 94.8-pound satellite Sunday set a distance record for deep space communications when its radio transmitter—the most powerful ever sent into space—was monitored from 412,000 miles away.

The South Point Tracking Station on the island of Hawaii reported it began a 20-minute reading at 2 a.m. e.s.t. today and other attempts were scheduled later in the day, elsewhere in the world.

At 8 a.m. e.s.t., three days after the beachball satellite was launched from Cape Canaveral, Fla., officials estimated it would be 480,475 miles away, moving at 5,920 miles an hour.

Working Beautifully  
At that rate, Pioneer V would reach the 500,000-mile mark about 2 p.m. e.s.t.

Scientists expected to receive communications from the solar-charged Pioneer radio until it reaches about 50 million miles from earth, 100 times farther away than it would be today.

They said the satellite's instruments were working "beautifully," transmitting signals on command from ground stations.

The old distance record was held by Pioneer IV, which sent back its last signal from 407,000 miles out March 3, 1959. Russia's Lunik I stopped transmitting after it had traveled 395,000 miles.

The satellite's signals demonstrated the feasibility of long range space communications, a feat that will be invaluable on the day man himself ventures into deep space.

Spaceman Goal Doubtful  
As scientists celebrated the new satellite's communications victory, some doubt was raised that the United States will meet its goal of placing a man in space next year.

Dr. T. Keith Glennan, head of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, was asked Sunday whether he thought Project Mercury, the man-in-space program, would realize its 1961 goal.

Glennan replied: "We think it will meet its goal in 1961. I would just say to you it will meet its goal and I hope it is 1961."

Asked whether the United States would beat Russia in the man-in-space race, Glennan said the matter was one "over which we have no control."

The United States moved a large military force into the Caribbean area today in a training exercise. The Air Force and the Army joined forces in hauling 18,000 troops from throughout the U.S. to Puerto Rico in a few hours.

The defense department says the exercise was designed to test the mobility of the Strategic Army Corps, our combat force maintained "at the ready" for sudden need. It was also a test of our military air transport service to airlift troops and equipment on a large scale to an overseas area.

Also—  
It just could be a demonstration of the power of the United States to STRIKE QUICKLY anywhere in the world if it HAS to.

In the rough, wild days of the Old Wild West, the man who was known to be able to get in the FIRST SHOT in the pinches was pretty generally respected.

In these rough, wild days of cold war throughout the world, that same principle probably holds good for nations.

From Moscow:  
The Kremlin announces that Premier Nikita Khrushchev (generally touted as an iron man) is ILL WITH THE FLU—or "grippe," as the Russians call it. The brief announcement said only that he is under the care of doctors and will be "laid up" for seven to ten days.

Most diplomats in the Soviet capital saw it as a case of a seemingly tireless leader finally being felled, like any other 65-year-old, by the fatigue of overwork and travel.

That is to say:  
Mr. K ISN'T a superman.

Comparisons are odious, but let's make one:

Ike has been traveling over the world, making friends and influencing people. He has been doing such a good job that Mr. K decided he'd better hit the trail also, so he packed his grip and took off. After traveling about half as far and seeing less than half as many people, Mr. Khrushchev, the highly touted iron man, had to take to his bed.

Ike is still going strong.

Let's change the subject, and get closer home.

Rescue Missions Reach Families  
WEST JEFFERSON, N.C. (AP)—Air and ground mercy missions to snowbound mountain families in North Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia were expected to be all but completed today.

North Carolina Gov. Luther Hodges flew over the stricken area Sunday and told reporters: "I think you can say to the whole world that the situation is in hand."

The Red Cross said it expected to reach the last of 1,500 snow-bound families today.

At least two weather-connected deaths were reported.

A break in the weather Sunday sent rescue teams throughout the area carrying Red Cross food packets, bagged coal and medical supplies.

## Jury Reports Near Violence In Deadlock

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Wrangling by jurors in the Finch murder trial almost erupted into violence as the seven women and five men deliberated to a bitter, exhausting deadlock.

This was the report today of two members of the panel—one a woman who said that at one point a male juror threatened to throw her out a window of the locked jury room.

The jury was dismissed Saturday after failing to agree whether Dr. R. Bernard Finch, 42, and his mistress, Carole Tregoff, 23, had plotted and killed with a bullet-in-the-back the doctor's estranged wife, Barbara Jean Finch.

The wealthy surgeon and his onetime receptionist broke into sobs when the jurors announced they were deadlocked. They face another trial. A date will be set Thursday.

While all seemed outwardly serene during the eight days of deliberations, reports of shouts, insults and near-violence came from two jurors—Louis Werner and Genevieve Lang.

Mrs. Lang, 34, a secretary, said a male juror turned the locked jury room into a panic Friday when he shouted at her: "I'm going to pick you up and throw you out the window."

She said the juror, whom she did not identify, started "to pick up the jury table—he started to take off his coat—I was scared."

"One woman ran for the buzzer and buzzed for the bailiffs. Another screamed hysterically at the door. It was terrifying to realize we were locked in that way."

After bailiffs quieted the dispute, Mrs. Lang said: "I want off the jury." However, she stayed on the panel and the next day they announced the deadlock—10 to 2 to convict the balding surgeon of second-degree murder and 8-4 to acquit his pretty mistress.

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## Rebels Claim Talks Broken

TUNIS, Tunisia (UPI)—The Algerian rebel high command charged today that French President Charles de Gaulle had "closed the door" to negotiations and peace in Algeria.

A communique released by the Muslim "provisional government of the Algerian republic" said the rebels would continue their five-year struggle against the French until Algeria achieved independence.

The statement, coupled with De Gaulle's own recent pronouncements, indicated that peace in Algeria was farther away than at any time since De Gaulle last year declared in favor of a liberal Algerian policy leading eventually to self-determination.

The communique said the rebel government had "fully demonstrated" it would make every effort to put an end to the bloody war.

"It was our duty to neglect nothing in order to arrive at a peaceful and negotiated settlement of the Algerian problem," it said.

But, it added, De Gaulle's recent declarations following his visit to Algeria two weeks ago contained no signs of peace.

"They were the old colonial concepts which reappeared," the communique said. "In brief, the French chief of state has closed the door to negotiation and to peace."

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## German Chief Lauds Nation

NEW YORK (AP)—West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer says his nation today is a practicing democracy, and he blames recent anti-Semitic incidents there on a "minute minority of neo-Nazis."

"Be convinced," said Adenauer Sunday, "that this Germany is a democratic Germany and that none of its Jewish citizens will suffer any harm or damage."

Adenauer said: "Behind everything that is being said here and there against Germany, there is the concerted will of the Soviet Union. The Soviet Union wants to drive a wedge between the German and American people in order to shift the political balance of the world in favor of the Soviet Union."

"I assure you that the spirit of Germany today is far from being anti-Semitic or Nazi."

The 84-year-old German leader had a busy Sunday. He spoke at a luncheon of the American Council on Germany. Earlier, he had breakfast with Francis Cardinal Spellman after mass, and visited the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Sunday night he attended a private dinner.

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## Vacation Stunt Brings Victory In Giant Hike

LAND'S END, England, (AP)—A little glass packer went back to work today after winning an 891-mile foot race on a diet of cigarettes, candy and snacks.

"It fitted nicely into my two-week vacation," 5-foot-3 Jimmy Musgrave, 38, told newsmen as he jogged into town Sunday after covering the length of Britain in 15 days, 14 hours, 32 minutes. He beat a field of nearly 700 and won \$2,800.

"None of my pals thought I could do it," the Yorkshireman said. "It will be nice to get back to work at 6 o'clock tomorrow morning and tell them at the factory that the joke's on them."

Musgrave finished 90 minutes ahead of John Grundy, 26, a marathon runner who came in with a bad limp and collected \$1,400.

A small army of contestants set out from John o' Groat's, on Scotland's northern tip, Feb. 27. The field had narrowed to less than 200 as the stragglers began trailing into Land's End. The contest was sponsored by vacation camp tycoon Billy Butlin.

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## Prime Minister Returns Home

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Harold Macmillan was back home today after weekend talks with French President Charles de Gaulle on disarmament, the German problem, European and African questions and Algeria.

A British spokesman described the talks as "useful" but declined to go into details. A spokesman for De Gaulle said they served to lighten the close tradition ties between the two countries.

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
