Drunk Charge Cites Youth

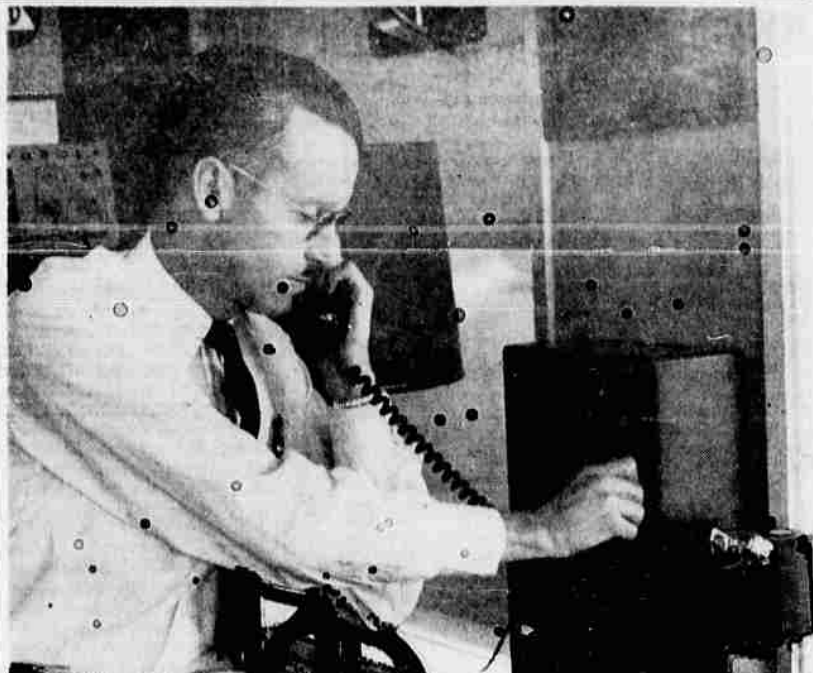

City juvenile officers also are investigating a report by Gertrude Talbot, 433 North Ninth Street, that vandals slashed the plastic window in the rear of her convertible auto as it was parked recently at home.

Warn System Sharpened

The civil defense warning arrangement in the Klamath area has been sharpened considerably as a result of new equipment installed at CD headquarters in the suburban fire station.

Before installation, alerts had to be phoned from Medford. Now, they come directly from the national warning center in Colorado Springs.

The warning system is tested every day at 11:30 a.m. One or two other unscheduled tests also are conducted every day at odd hours.

The process takes about two minutes. During that time area warning points covering several states check in as roll is called at the national center. Area centers take roll call of states. State centers take over and check out district warning points. Klamath Falls is one. Oregon has seven. The U.S. has 290.

The entire network is hooked to the nation's early warning network, including Alaskan, Canadian and Pacific radar.

Bus Driver Dies In Crash

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — A Continental Trailways bus and an empty auto transport truck collided on a snow-covered bridge near here Monday night, killing the bus driver.

The truck driver and the four passengers aboard the bus en route to Dallas, Tex., were injured. Only Oscar Mack of Chicago, a bus passenger, was hurt badly enough to be hospitalized. Police said the bus burst into flames. Driver O. H. Hinman, Kansas City, Kan., was pinned beneath the burning wreckage.

The accident occurred on U.S. highway 60 in suburban Johnson County, Kan.

Secretaries Wanted By Yanks

LONDON (UPI) — The manager of a London employment agency said today he had returned from a trip to the United States with orders to send back 500 English secretaries for American businessmen who crave "status symbols."

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UF Board OKs Request By Salvation Army

The United Fund board of directors approved a request by Member Agency Salvation Army to conduct a supplementary drive for funds soon, but the approval carried some reservation.

The letter to be sent to about 500 "select" residents must be approved by a committee to be set up by the UF board, meeting with a Salvation Army committee.

The Army needs to raise \$3,500. "We just have to have it," said Maj. Lewis Kendall. He said the Army has been running in the red locally for several years because United Fund receipts are not sufficient to cover the traffic the agency serves.

This year, the problem became acute, said Major Kendall. He and other officers want to solicit the funds from persons known to be sympathetic to the agency cause and from others.

Kendall explained that money collected during the Christmas season by street solicitors is used during the Christmas season and at no other time and for no other reason than the Army's "Christmas Cheer" program.

Some board members were reluctant to okay the request on grounds that to do so would give other agencies "carte blanche" for supplementary drives.

Others pointed out that most other agencies have supplementary drives of some sort because for several years UF collections have been short of the total need of agencies.

All members were reconciled, or at least did not vote against the Army proposal, when they were assured that the letter to be sent out will outline the problem and the UF position clearly.

Major Kendall said he doubted whether such a supplementary drive will be needed in the future. That faith is based on confidence UF will be able to supply the Army's needs hereafter, he said.

The board learned of the resignation of four members, too. They are Deb Addison, the Rev. Dr. E. M. Causey, Chet Clark and Fred Holmes. The latter two are moving.

The UF Nominating Committee will meet soon to pick replacements.

The board also passed a Girl Scouts' request to conduct a Cook

sale for camp maintenance funds beginning March 25. Members congratulated the Camp Fire Girls for exceeding last year's total proceeds with their recent candy sale.



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
