

Milwaukee's New Boss Has No Problem In Spahn

Charley Dessen, the new Milwaukee manager, has to iron out a few problems before the Braves open the National League baseball season next month. But there's one fellow he has little to worry about—Warren Spahn.

Spahn will be 39 next month. Yet, he shows no sign of slipping. He has won 267 big league games. He joined Sam Jones of San Francisco, Early Wynn of the Chicago White Sox and teammate Lew Burdette in the 20-game bracket in 1959.

Negotiations Set For Scoreboard

Jim Johnson, athletic coordinator at Klamath Union High School, was authorized this week by the school board to negotiate for a replacement for the battered scoreboard on Modoc Field.

Johnson asked for authority months ago, but ran into objection by board members regarding advertising on the clock face.

The members, however, apparently ironed out their objections in the meantime.

Their authorization stipulates the scoreboard must be secured free from merchants and that any advertising on its face must be approved by the board of education.

Spahn shared the star roles with Pittsburgh pitchers Bennie Daniels and Jim Umbricht in Wednesday's exhibition action. He hurled five scoreless innings as the Braves handed the White Sox their first setback 4-2.

Daniels and Umbricht, both right-handers, combined for a no-hitter in Pittsburgh's 3-0 victory over Detroit. Daniels worked five innings and Umbricht four.

In other games, the New York Yankees downed Washington 1-0. Kansas City walloped Baltimore 8-1. San Francisco edged the Chicago Cubs 7-6 on Hobie Landrith's 11th inning homer and the Boston Red Sox, led by Frank Malzone, whipped Cleveland 8-2. The Los Angeles-Cincinnati and St. Louis-Philadelphia games were cancelled because of bad weather.

Red Schoendienst, who Dessen hopes will solve his second base problem, got his first hit of the spring for Milwaukee. It came during a three-run second inning off Barry Latman.

The Yanks-Senators game was called after eight innings because of rain. Two walks and an error by third baseman Harmon Killebrew enabled the Yanks to pick up their run in the second. Johnny James, up from Richmond of the International League, struck out seven in four innings.

Kansas City got some neat pitching from Ned Garver, Bud Daley and Dick Hall who combined to hold Baltimore to seven hits.

Landrith got his game-winning homer off Jim Brewer, who had just come on in the 11th. The Cubs scored three times off Ramon Monzon in the first, but the Braves rebounded to tie the score in the eighth when Bob Anderson's wild pitch sent Felipe Alou home.

Malzone batted in four runs with three hits in three at bats as Boston won its fourth in a row. Tom Sturdivant, Frank Sullivan and Ted Bowsfield combined to hold Cleveland to nine hits.

All the team will be present and everyone will have an opportunity to offer personal congratulations.

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SF Giants Negotiate For TV

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The San Francisco Giants are negotiating to televise some of their out-of-town baseball games into the Bay Area, it was learned Wednesday.

President Horace Stoneham of the National League club, speaking from the spring training camp at Phoenix, Ariz., said the plan calls for the "Game of the Week" to be televised into San Francisco.

He emphasized that the deal definitely has not been signed, but that "negotiations are in progress."

"Due to the heavy expenses the club has run into, I feel we must go along with the regular TV procedures for the time being," said Stoneham.

In the past the club president has refused to allow any television of the Giants' games into the Bay Area because of a deal reportedly set with a pay-TV company that involved millions of dollars.

However, the American Broadcasting Company reported that it plans to televise all the Giants' Saturday afternoon away-from-home games — a total of 13 — into the area this year.

The report is that the return to the Giants will be about \$30,000 per game — or about \$400,000 for the season.
