Solons Propose Memorial To Honor Sen. Neuberger

WASHINGTON (AP)—Two senators Wednesday proposed creation of a seashore memorial in Oregon in honor of the late Sen. Richard Neuberger (D-Ore.).

A bill to create the Richard L. Neuberger National Seashore Area was introduced by Sens. Mike Mansfield (D-Mont.) and Thomas Kuchel (R-Calif.).

Mansfield proposed last week that a wilderness area be named for Neuberger, Wednesday, in a speech prepared for the Senate, he said.

Probe Slated By Canada

OTTAWA (AP)—Canada is taking its first close look at its forgotten border—the 1,500-mile shore between Alaska and Greenland, facing the Soviet Union across Arctic Ocean ice.

Some 55 to 60 scientists will work there during the next six months, probing under the ice in the area.

The project, while chiefly scientific, also has the effect of actively asserting Canada's claim to a maze of islands along the fringes of the coastline.

There has been some anxiety in recent years over the security of Canada's claim, particularly with reports of extensive Soviet exploration there.

"This had some effect" in the decision to undertake the current exploration. But it was not the whole reason, says Dr. E. F. Roots, coordinator of the project.

The initial project group is converging at Isachsen on Elles Ringnes Island, about 2,000 miles north of the Montana-Canada border.

Camp was set up and preliminary studies made last summer by a group of 19 led by Dr. Roots. This summer detailed studies will be made in an area 200 miles wide and extending some 400 miles out on the ocean ice. Other areas will be covered in future years.

Divorce Granted To Man, 91

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP)—A 91-year-old man has been granted a divorce from his 82-year-old wife on ground of desertion.

Reuben Henson Boone said Wednesday he married Mrs. Boone in 1927 and they separated in 1943. The divorce was not contested.

Cut Med, Nurse Home Cost Welfare Group Requested

SALEM (AP)—Gov. Mark Hatfield Wednesday urged the state Welfare Commission to reduce its medical and nursing home costs, and to be more vigorous in forcing more persons to take care of their relatives.

The commission said it already is taking steps to achieve those objectives.

The governor praised the commission for practicing economy, but said more is needed.

The commission's spending in the last half of 1959 totaled \$17,409,340, a decrease of \$1,293,353 from the last six months of 1958.

Miss Jeanne Jewett, state welfare administrator, said the worst problem is mounting nursing home costs—much higher in the last half of 1959.

The commission, which met with Hatfield Wednesday, said it is making a study of nursing home

costs. This study, not yet complete, probably will show that about one-third of the nursing home inmates could be handled just as well in homes for the aged.

Miss Jewett said courts now are putting more geriatric patients into nursing homes and fewer in the state hospitals.

The governor also said he soon would call a conference of all county public welfare commissions in order to get all the counties to be more economical in welfare administration.

He said "our major objective is the care of the needs of unfortunate citizens, but the other side of the coin is that every dollar saved by better administration

and elimination of chiselers makes more money available for those who need it."

The governor also asked the commission to prepare to move its headquarters from Portland to Salem.

Miss Jewett said that about half of the welfare employees in Portland have indicated they will not move to Salem.

Hatfield said the commission could have space in the labor and industries building, now under construction on the Capitol Mall.

He said the needs and location of all state agencies now are under thorough study, and that other agencies also will be moved from Portland to Salem.

The controversial question of sterilization of unwed mothers was not mentioned at the Welfare Commission meeting.

New Budget For County Hits \$13,000

NEW PINE CREEK — County School Superintendent Anne Sprague met with the Kelly Creek School Board and members of the budget committee last Wednesday evening at the schoolhouse. Making up the budget proved more complicated this year due to a variety of changes brought about by the new reorganization law voted in at a special election held a few weeks ago.

A minimum budget was compiled after about two hours, with a net figure of \$13,656.85 for total expenditures. This figure includes the purchase of the local bus from the non-high school district board, provided satisfactory terms of reimbursement costs per child transportation per month can be agreed upon.

The question of whether to buy the used bus or buy transportation from District No. 7 came up. Since it required more thought and figuring, the meeting adjourned after setting Friday night as an appropriate time to reconvene for further deliberation on the bus issue.

It was then that the figure of \$10 per child per month was computed and set as a minimum to come out on bus, driver and maintenance costs.

Twenty-six pupils who live in District 7 are now riding the bus and 17 from District No. 1. Finality of this decision rests upon two factors: whether or not the budget is accepted and if the bus proposal is accepted by District No. 7.

It was also brought out at the meeting that for the educational and financial welfare of District 1, which is a distressed district, it becomes necessary for every voter in the district to vote in favor of exceeding the six per cent limitation clause when the measure shows on the ballot at the May 2 election.

Those present Wednesday evening from the school board were Kelson Butler, chairman, Mary Millsap, clerk, Darvin Robnett and Buna Faris. Members present from the budget committee were Raymond Fisher, Marle Leemann, Alvin Butler, Layton Gentry and Irvin Faris.
