County Employment Dips, But Picture May Brighten

The number of jobless workers in Klamath County rose 15 percent from January to February this year, the State Department of Employment announced here. But the picture began to brighten this month.

Manager Guy Barker attributed the unemployment increase to temporary layoffs in logging and construction.

Requests for workers also dropped in February, 26 per cent below January requests.

Barker noted, however, that February's figures still show a substantial improvement over figures for February 1959 when unemployment was 16 per cent higher and requests for workers were 34 per cent lower.

Barker said seasonal layoffs have been far below average for the area, and that employment in trade and service industries is higher than normal. This is attributed in part to higher than average payrolls in major industries.

Barker said 1,400 workers, 330 of them women, were registered for work at his office at the end of February. By March 5, the number was reduced to 1,049 workers because some persons who had been laid off were recalled to

work, and because other workers were being placed in new jobs.

"Although work opportunities are increasing," he said "there are more than 1,000 workers still unemployed. Many of these will have difficulty finding steady employment this summer because of competition for jobs."

He said the worker pool represents many skills, although the majority are construction workers, sawmill and logging workers, and unskilled laborers. Women applicants include experienced typists, bookkeepers, stenographers, maids, waitresses and cooks.

Some applicants are young men back from armed forces duty "who have the aptitude to learn many occupations and would appreciate an opportunity to get started."

The usual spring crop of new workers is beginning to arrive. Barker said, providing further competition for available jobs. Barker's office, TU 4-7701, will be glad to select workers for any employer. "Unemployed workers are an expense to the community," he said, "and 99 per cent of them would rather work than be idle."

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Poor Weather Gets Blame For Recent Business Dip

NEW YORK (UPI) — Snow, sleet, rain throughout the nation have taken the blame for all sorts of business quirks in recent weeks.

And that's why businessmen are looking forward to spring which is due in less than a week. Cold, stormy weather over many parts of the nation recently has been blamed for curtailment of automobile production, although there have been voluntary cutbacks too as dealers try to get their inventories into better shape.

The dealers blame the weather for slowing up in auto sales just as department stores blame it for a decline in their business.

Bad driving weather has sent inventories of gasoline to new record highs and brought sharp inroads into supplies of fuel oil.

Construction has suffered from the weather, according to reports, and so have car loadings. Recently some of the railroads got additional piggy-back business because trucks couldn't negotiate the highways.

Some price reductions at retail have been ascribed to the weather as retailers try to get back lost sales by bargain promotions.

Even the money market suffered from the recent storms with business loans down at a time when a seasonal rise was in order.

Not only did demand fall off because of weather but supply was cut in some instances. Farmers couldn't move their livestock

to market and this reduced offerings somewhat with a firming in prices noted.

Cold in Florida was reported to have cut supplies of vegetables there with resultant firming prices.

What wasn't blamed on the weather was attributed to the stock market decline when demand for any item fell off.

Purchases of durable goods were said to have been cut by the steady decline in stock market levels although many business men denied the market had anything to do with their sales.

The stock market break recently carried prices to new lows for more than a year is said to have made for caution among businessmen.

The sensitive point in this caution has been inventories where there has been a tendency to go easy on heavy buildings.

Business men say they pay no attention to the stock market in plotting the course of their business, but they are doing more talking about the market currently than for some time.

Overall curtailment in business hasn't amounted to a great deal. And the experts point out that more of the dips can be attributed to adverse weather than to declining stock market prices.

It is noted, however, that prices have been holding steady in commodities or easing, and this situation is one being watched carefully at the present time for a clue to the future of industry generally.
