Lousse Kayo Sets Basilio For 'Natural'
NEW YORK (AP) — An Eduardo Lousse-Carmen Basilio midweight "natural" was in the works today following the Argentine's sensational return to the U.S. ring.

The 32-year-old South American champion celebrated his first fight in the United States in four years Friday night by stopping strong Willie Greaves, the Canadian ruler, in 1:33 of the fourth round of a television thriller at Madison Square Garden.

Only a few minutes after Referee Ruby Goldstein intervened to save Greaves from injury, matchmaker Teddy Brenner proposed the Lousse-Basilio match.

"It would draw over \$100,000 off TV," said Brenner to Charley Johnston, Lousse's American co-manager. "It's as good as any title fight."

Lousse was a little rusty and wild at times Friday but he kept swinging away with his potent left hook. One of them finally turned the trick early in the fourth round. The punch caught Willie on the head and staggered him. That was the beginning of the end.

A right and left to the jaw then dropped the husky blond for eight. When he arose on wobbling legs, Lousse let him have it with both barrels. He was about to fall again when Goldstein stopped the bout.

It was the first time Greaves, 24, had been stopped in 45 pro fights. Lousse, who had won 11 of his 13 fights in the United States from 1953 to 1956, racked up his 15th straight victory and his 65th knockout.

Chamberlain charged after the former Holy Cross flash, his fists flailing. They stood toe-to-toe and slugged it out until players of both teams, the officials and police broke it up.

Heinsohn charged that Chamberlain was as guilty of roughing as anyone else in the league.

Friday night's game was the Warriors' first of the way. Except for five lead changes in the first period, and a 41-41 tie in the second quarter, Philadelphia led all the way.

Chamberlain collected 29 points. Heinsohn's 26 was high for the Celtics.

EUGENE (Special) — A sophomore, two juniors and three seniors came within inches of knocking the state number two-ranked prep basketball team right out of contention for the title Friday night. The Klamath Union Pelicans had to be satisfied with a game for third place Saturday night after dropping a heart-breaking 57-55 decision to the powerful Marshfield Pirates who feature the toughest prep basketball player in the state in the person of Mel Counts, 6-10.

A last second layup by the man whom Counts termed "the best I've played against since Jerry Bergstrom (Franklin) in the championship game" last year, Pelican junior center Bruce Brickner, 6-6, put the Pelicans within two points of a championship berth Saturday night.

Brickner, who checked Counts throughout the game, scored 12 points and snatched 14 rebounds out of the hands of the big man. Counts nabbed 24 markers and pulled down 25 rebounds before fouling out with 4:04 left.

A pair of Pirates, Dick Stanley and Bob Burles, took over after Counts was benched and finished up for the Marshfielders in fine fashion.

Neither club shot well from the field. Marshfield notched a .286 and the Pels only a .297. At the foul line, however, the Pirates, paced by Counts' 6 for 6, hit 21 for 27, as compared to the Whitebirds' 17-26.

Three of the KU squad hit in double figures. Paul Bishop collected 20 off 8-26 from outside and 4-4 from the charity line. Brickner hit 12 and Dean Dunson collected 10. Sophomore Gary Patzke had tough luck from the field notching a 0-5, but at the foul line he collected seven in 12 tries. Captain Bob Lewis scored four points and junior guard Wally Palmberg, who saw action during most of the game, collected two.

Burles notched 11 for the Pirates and Stanley added 10 to go with Counts' total.

At the quarter rests the Pels trailed 15-13, 29-28 and 41-40.

In the faithful fourth, Counts, Burles, Stanley and Burke served up eight points while the Pelicans got only two, a jumper by Dunson. With the score 49-42 and 4:04 left to play, Counts collected his fifth foul.

Here the Pels went to work in earnest. Dunson jumped one in, then passed for another to Brickner and Bishop scored on a layup on a pass from Patzke who stole the ball at midcourt.

With 2:22 left, Bishop sank a pair of free tosses and the score was 50-41. The KU future looked bright, but not for long.

Burles scored a layup on a defensive lapse, then added a free throw when he was fouled by Palmberg.

With 1:59 left, Patzke sank one of two free tosses to make the score 53-51 for Marshfield, but at this point Mr. Stanley re-entered the picture.

He scored a jumper and followed with two free throws when fouled by Dunson, the clock showing 1:50. When 54 seconds remained Dunson missed a free toss with the count 57-51. After losing the ball once and watching three Pelican shots miss the bucket, Dunson scored a jump shot with 17 seconds to go, making the count 57-53.

Big Brickner got his hands on the ball with one second to go and

scored a beautiful, but last two points as the final horn sounded.

Bishop broke the scoring ice with a long jumper just 20 seconds into the game even though Marshfield had nabbed the tipoff. Counts rebounded for two a few seconds later and then picked up two consecutive free tosses after being fouled twice by Dunson.

Bishop hit another jumper to tie the count 4-all and the count was tied for the last time in the first period at 3-all as Dunson and Counts exchanged successful free throws.

The Pirates jumped out to a 13-8 lead as Karl Coke, Burke and Burles each got into the act.

In the last 45 seconds of the first stanza, Gary Patzke and Bob Lewis each collected a pair of free tosses to end the period on the short end of a 15-13 count.

Big Counts' first quarter total of seven points was matched by Bishop.

At the opening of the second quarter, Counts hit a pair of jumpers and two free throws to give the Pirates a 21-15 lead and Coke jumped one up to give them a 23-15 lead at which time Lewis, Bishop and Brickner collaborated to cut the bulge down to 29-28 at the half. Counts had registered 15 points by the intermission.

In the third, the Pels took a momentary one-point lead when Brickner tipped one back in. Coke tied it up again on a free toss, but Dunson countered with a jumper and for the next three and one-half minutes the Pelicans were out front, 36-32 at one point. Counts dunked two in a row to tie the score 36-36 and then the Pirates went ahead on Stanley's jump shot.

Bishop hit for two from outside and the score was again tied, the last time the Whitebirds were to be so close until they tied it at 50-41 with 2:22 left to play in the contest. The third frame ended 41-40 for Marshfield.

Led by some highly accurate shooting on the parts of little forward Rod Young, who amassed a total of 21 for the test, and Rog Paul, also a forward and not much bigger, who hit for 15, plus some snappy ball-stealing and handling by Ron Simonson, 5-7, the Lakers completely befuddled the Indians in the first quarter and sped out front 21-8 by the close of the first stanza.

They stuttered in the second period, however, when Indian high pointers Warren Newell and Larry Bruun began to get the feel. Cleveland closed the gap, 31-23, by halftime but in the third frame the Lakers got back in the groove.

Suffering from the same ailment that bothered them in their loss to the powerful Medford Black Tornado Thursday, a chilly field
