

Pattern Workshop

Approximately 300 homemakers participated in a pattern fitting workshop held in the county during February and March. Many of the units are completing meetings this month, according to Ruth G. Dyer, county extension agent.

In this workshop, homemakers have learned how to measure for pattern size, how to determine their figure types, how to check their measurements with those of the pattern, how to fit the pattern on the figure, how to make pattern alterations in the tissue, and how to judge the fit of the pattern on a muslin. There is only one real test when a pattern will fit, and that is in cloth. Each homemaker made a muslin test garment in which she worked with developing a basic garment that would fit her satisfactorily.

Leaders were trained in meetings held one day each week for four weeks at the fairgrounds and Peace Memorial Presbyterian Church. Leaders in turn taught the lesson to their units the same week.
