How Much Do You Know About Europe Royalty?

Birth of a royal baby . . . betrothal of a royal princess . . . crowning of a royal head . . .

In a world tuned to the threat of nuclear war, these are matters that retain the flavor of bygone days and bring glimmer to hum-drum modern times.

European royalty has had its ebb and flow of popularity over the years. But any doubts as to public interest in monarchy were dispelled by the general rejoicing at the recent betrothal of Great Britain's Princess Margaret and the birth of a second son to her older sister, Queen Elizabeth.

Europe's seven reigning monarchs and their families may not always receive whole-hearted approval of their activities. But they are accustomed—as are the rulers of the Continent's two tiny principalities and one grand duchy—to the constant scrutiny of a man-and-woman-in-the-street who are highly responsive to royal doings.

Who are these monarchs? Their faces, countries and names are shown on the accompanying illustration. How many can you match up properly?

The answers will be given at the end of this story. Giving yourself five points for each correctly filled-in blank, you have a spectacular knowledge of royalty if you score 90 to 100, you're very superior if you score in the 80s, superior in the 70s, very good in the 60s, good in the 50s, fair in the 40s and better bone up on royalty if your score is lower than that.

To smooth your path, here are thumbnail sketches of each of the crowned heads:

Baudoin I, 29-year-old bachelor king, is one ruler who benefited at home from a popular reception abroad. His subjects were delighted last year when their solemn monarch, nicknamed Baudoin the Silent, danced with Hollywood stars on a U.S. tour and otherwise let his royal hair down, Baudoin became king in 1951 following the postwar abdication of his father, Leopold III.

Queen Elizabeth II is the ruler most familiar to Americans. The eldest daughter of King George VI, she succeeded to her throne eight years ago. She is the great-granddaughter of Queen Victoria. Her to the crown is her first-born, 11-year-old Prince Charles.

Frederik IX, 61, became king 13 years ago on the death of his father, King Christian X. The 6-foot-3 monarch is an excellent yachtsman and amateur musician who occasionally conducts public symphony concerts. He and his wife, Queen Ingrid, will visit the United States in October. They have three daughters.

King Paul I ascended his throne in 1947 after the death of his brother, George II. He is an outdoor enthusiast and during wartime exile, worked as a factory hand for Vickers in England. He and Queen Frederika have two daughters and a son, 20-year-old Crown Prince Constantine.

Franz Joseph II was crowned reigning prince of a tiny hereditary monarchy of 63 square miles in 1938. The country is virtually taxless because of fees paid by international corporations with headquarters there.

The 74-year-old Grand Duchess Charlotte commemorated Europe's longest reign a year ago on the 40th anniversary of her accession as ruler of a grand duchy. Her to the throne is Prince Jean, 39. There are also another son and four daughters in the royal family.

Prince Rainier III succeeded his grandfather Prince Louis II as ruler of an independent principality in 1949. Rainier is married to former American movie star Grace Kelly. Their children are 3-year-old Princess Caroline and the heir apparent, 2-year-old Prince Albert. Queen Juliana, 51, became sov-

reign in 1948 following the abdication of her mother, Queen Wilhelmina. In 1956 there were rumors of friction between the Queen and her consort, Prince Bernhard, over the alleged influence of a woman faith healer whom the queen subsequently dismissed. Queen Juliana shuns pomp and has sent her four daughters to progressive schools.

Olav V became king in 1957 on the death of his father, Haakon VII, and is the most recently crowned of Europe's monarchs. Known for his informal ways, the sportsman ruler, 57, is an outstanding athlete and won a gold medal for yachting in the 1928 Olympics. Heir to the throne is Crown Prince Harald, 23.

Gustav VI Adolf was 67 when he became king in 1950—the oldest to assume a European throne. His father, tennis playing Gustav V, had ruled 43 years and died at 92. Europe's oldest reigning monarch, Gustav is an amateur archeologist and sports enthusiast. His daughter is Queen Ingrid of Denmark.

Korea Mulls Unification

SEOUL, Korea (AP) — Vice President-elect Lee Ki-poong said Saturday South Koreans are determined to unite Korea again, even if they have to use force against the Communist North.

"We would rather die by marching north than live this way," the 63-year-old Lee told newsmen.

"Unification by force is not an ideal goal at all," he admitted, "but the present divided situation is so miserable that to escape from our misery, we think of unification by force."

Lee, hand-picked running mate of President Syngman Rhee on the Liberal ticket, swamped his Democratic opponent, incumbent Vice President John M. Chang, in Tuesday's violence-spattered election.

Rhee, unopposed as a result of the death of Democratic presidential candidate Chough Pyong-ok, was swept into a fourth term.

Chang claimed the Liberals conducted a terror campaign against his supporters and rigged the balloting.

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Captain Tells Of Sub Scare

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Navy Capt. Ray M. Pitts, the American who knows most about Argentina's submarine scare, thinks there actually was a foreign submarine prowling around in that country's Golfo Nuevo.

Pitts told United Press International, however, he did not have the faintest idea where the submarine came from, why it was there, or what it could have hoped to accomplish.

The Navy captain described his impressions in an interview after returning to the Pentagon from Argentina. He headed an ill-fated, 13-man U.S. expedition sent to help the Argentines in the submarine hunt.

Census Form Being Mailed

WASHINGTON (AP)—The postman gives a lift to the census taker this week, delivering advance questionnaires for the 1960 census to every occupied dwelling in the land.

Sixty million copies of the four-page form have been delivered to 35,000 post offices. The Census Bureau is paying the Post Office Department about 2 cents to handle each piece, a total of \$1,200,000.

The forms are to go into the mail next Friday and Saturday. Every household should get a copy by next Monday. Each postman will get a stack of the undressed forms, enough to leave one at every dwelling on his route.

Each family is to fill out the form before the arrival of the census taker. The census begins April 1, and will continue through the month. Most families will be visited during the first two weeks of April.

The census taker will copy on forms of his own the information given on the advance form. The idea behind the advance questionnaire is to give everyone time to ponder the questions and provide accurate information.

Some post offices jumped the gun and delivered the forms last week. This was a mistake but census officials say no damage was done.

On the first page of the form is a message from Census Director Robert W. Burgess asking cooperation with the census. Burgess also points out that the information collected is kept confidential by law and "cannot be used for purposes of taxation, investigation or regulation."

The next two pages ask about all residents of the dwelling plus anyone who stayed overnight on Thursday, March 31. The questions, name, relationship to head of household, sex, race, month and year of birth, and marital status.

Page four asks about housing facilities. There are questions about kitchen equipment, water supply, flush toilets, bath tubs and showers. Each householder also is asked to value his dwelling, if he owns it, or otherwise list his monthly rent.
