Spanish Hero Says Bull Has A Chance

NEW YORK (UPI)—It isn't often you get a chance to meet a matador in Manhattan so it seems like news of some kind today to give you the scoop on Manolo Segura, Spain's newest torero terrifico.

Manolo hasn't let it be said right off, changed my mind about bull fighting. I still think the bull has as much chance as Shirley Temple against Jack the Ripper.

But you can take it straight from Manolo, the bull gets in a few ticks here and there.

"Twice he almost finished me off," said the dark-haired man.

2 Amateurs Seek Berths

NEW YORK (AP)—Olympic Sam may have a couple of Olympic boxing champions in Cassius Clay, a sleek 175-pounder from Louisville, and Vince Simon, a stiff-punching lightweight from New York.

They still have a long way to go to even make the U.S. team. But if they show the form they displayed in the Intercity Golden Gloves Championships Monday night they should be a cinch to get on the squad.

"Clay and Simon are the stick-outs," said both Fred Casario, head coach of the Chicago-West team, and Vic Dillipio, head coach of the New York-East squad today.

Clay, 18, who was outwitted by 45 pounds, won the intercity heavyweight crown by stopping 220-pound Gary Jawish of Chevy Chase, Md., in 1:39 of the third round.

That triumph climaxed Chicago's 12-1 rout of New York in the 33rd annual intercity competition at Madison Square Garden.

Simon, 20, the Pan-American lightweight champion, retained his title in the 135-pound class by plastering Brian O'Shea of Chicago.

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who suddenly has bounced into the Spanish bull-fighting forefront along with Luis Dominguin and Antonio Ordóñez. "In 1936, February, I take a horn in the right leg. In 1938, August, I take a bad horn under the arm near the heart. I am off a long time."

Not as long as the bulls. Somebody else went in and finished off both of them.

Fighters Retire Wealthy

This is not to imply that bull fighting doesn't take a high brand of courage. Manolo, who is 28, stands only 5 feet, 8 inches and weighs a mere 130 pounds. Naturally he wouldn't stand a chance head-on against a couple of tons of galloping beefsteak.

Fast footwork, bleeding of the bull and the coup de grace with a king-sized stiletto makes it possible eventually for most bull fighters to retire with a tidy fortune.

There are very few retired bulls. As example, last year in Spain there were 323 corridos, big-time pro fights, in which 1,933 bulls were slain. There also were 416 novillados, kind of a Golden Gloves competition for semi-pros in which toto bit the dust 2,496 times. That's 4,434 dead bulls.

One Matador Killed

One matador was killed, one died of a fractured skull training against cows and a newspaperman was killed by a bull which ignored arena ethics and jumped the barrier. Which comes out 4, 434 to three or makes the odds 1,474 to one in favor of the matador. Even better, if you ignore the newspaperman.

Most of the Spaniards I know are rascals, boxers or barbers. Manolo looks like one of the latter but, he said as he sipped the Jerez sherry which replaced our morning orange juice, he never wanted to be anything but a matador.

"My father was a baker in Malaga and so was my grandfather," he explained in his soft, quiet voice. "But this is in Andalusia, where they raise the finest bulls in the world, and ever since I could lift a cape I have wanted nothing but to fight toro."

Cincy Boss Counts On McLish, Henry

TAMPA, Fla. (AP)—Freddie Hutchinson counts on Cal McLish and Bill Henry to bolster a weak Cincinnati pitching staff that last year gave up more runs than his sluggers could drive home.

Hutchinson, an old pitcher, didn't need to have its value driven home as forcefully as his Cincinnati staff did in 1959.

"It seemed every time we took a lead into the late innings, we couldn't hold them off," he said. "That is why Gabe (General Manager Gabe Paul) went out and got us some pitching. We had to give up something to get it but we think we have improved our staff."

Hutchinson sacrificed a brilliant second baseman and a strong bat. He sent Johnny Tamm to Cleveland but he got McLish, second baseman Billy Martin and rookie first baseman Gordon Coleman.

To get Henry, a superior left-handed relief man, and handyman Lee Walls from Chicago, he gave up home run potential in Frank Thomas, who struggled through a bad season in 1959.

Cincinnati has a fine crop of rookies who figure for the future. One or two might make the grade this year, Hutchinson is high on Tony Gonzalez, a Cuban outfielder who hit 300 for Havana last season.

Shortstop Chico Cardenas and first baseman Rogelio Alvarez, both Cuban rookies from the Havana farm, have impressed their new boss.

Coleman (.353 at Mobile) is a key man. If he makes it at first base, Frank Robinson (.311) can stay in left field. If not, Robinson will have to return to first against his wishes.

Martin (.260 at Cleveland) will team with Roy McMillan (.264) as the second base combination with Willie Jones (.357) and Eddie Kaso (.283) probably splitting the work at third, Young Elio Chacon (.255 at Havana) can fill in any place.

The outfield packs a solid punch with Robinson in left, talented Vada Pinson (.316) in center and Gus Bell (.293) in right, backed up by Walls (.257 at Chicago), Jerry Lynch (.269) and Pete Whisenand (.239).

Ed Bailey (.264) is the No. 1 catcher with help from Dutch Dotterer (.267) and Frank House (.236 at Kansas City).

Hutchinson's starting pitchers figure to be Don Newcombe (.343), Joe Nuxhall (.9-9), Bob Purkey (.13-14) and McLish (.19-8 at Cleveland). Claude Osteen (.8-12 at Seattle), Jay Hook (.5-3) and Jim O'Toole (.5-8) are fighting for the other starting job. Ed Palmquist (.9-12 at St. Paul) is also highly regarded as is Orlando Pena (.5-9). Jim Brosnan (.9-6) will do double duty spot starting and relieving.

The bullpen will be in the capable hands of Henry (.9-6 in 65 games with the Cubs), Cuban Ray Sanchez (.11-5 at Havana) probably will do the right-handed relief work along with Brooks Lawrence (.7-12).

Celtic Crew Is Favored Over Philly

BOSTON (AP)—The Boston Celtics, back home and facing a Philadelphia team that features an injured Wilt Chamberlain, rate as solid favorites to wrap up National Basketball Assn. Eastern Division playoffs tonight.

Local wagers favored the defending champion Celtics by 9½ points.

The spread was built up by: 1. The fact that Celtics have lost only two games this season at Boston, site of tonight's fifth game.

2. Boston has won three of four in the best-of-seven series and would like to wrap it up early to provide a rest before going against the winner of the Minneapolis-St. Louis Western Division playoff.

3. Most importantly, Chamberlain, Philadelphia's one-man physical force, is in doubtful physical shape.

The 7-foot-1 rookie wonder has been sub-par since he injured his hand during a scuffle with Boston's Tommy Heinsohn in the second game of the playoffs.

Philadelphia team physician Simon Hall, however, said that Chamberlain's hand is mending well and that the Warriors' big man may be ready tonight.

Duke Snider Predicts His Best Year Coming

Duke Snider, still eager to make it big before his hometown Los Angeles fans, predicted today that he'll have his best season since the Dodgers went West.

"I believe I can hit 30 home runs and drive in 100 runs," said the 33-year-old center fielder after Thursday's workout at Vero Beach, Fla. "The way I feel now, I have nothing but confidence."

Snider, one of the great players of the Dodgers in the old days in Brooklyn, has had two so-so years in Los Angeles. He hit only 13 homers and drove in only 58 runs in 1958 and he lifted those figures to 23 and 88 last season.

Snider, who was forced to rest his ailing knees frequently last season, took knee bending exercises for the first time in three weeks.
