Meet Held By Searchers

Information pertinent to the welfare of persons rescued in land, air and sea accidents with other observations on past experiences of rescue groups, was given a prominent place on the program of the Oregon Air Search and Rescue Conference in Salem. Conference dates were March 17-18.

Cooperative agencies are United States Air Force, Oregon State Board of Aeronautics, Mazamas and Alpeenes, mountain climbing groups, National Guard, U.S. Forest Service, Oregon State Board of Forestry, Oregon State Police, sheriff's officers, Civil Aeronautics Board, Federal Aviation Agency, Oregon Civil Defense and Explorer Scout groups.

Present from Klamath Falls, all members of the Klamath Air Search and Rescue Unit, were Les Liston, state appointed assistant air search chief, and Mrs. Liston, Ned Putnam vice president; Rex Morehouse, flight commander; Ed Adamson, ground commander, and Clea Schuler, secretary-treasurer. Spokesmen for each group gave a brief resume of facilities, capabilities and past experiences in rescue work.

Bus Operator Facing Charge

SHAVERTON, Pa. (AP)—Last Feb. 23 Michael Silick was cited by the Parent-Teacher Guild of the Gate of Heaven School for having driven more than 47,000 accident-free miles as a school bus operator.

Monday Silick's bus killed Charles Milson, 5, across the street from the boy's home. He told police he did not see the boy.

Silick was arraigned on a charge of manslaughter and released in \$2,500 bail.

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Seminar Set By Students

A creative worship seminar will be presented by students from Starr King School for the Ministry (Unitarian-Universalist), Berkeley, California, Wednesday evening at the Klamath Unitarian Fellowship.

New CBS Policy To Be Dropped

NEW YORK (AP)—CBS is dropping its new policy of saying when canned laughter or applause is used on its television programs.

The policy was adopted three months ago as part of a broad network revision that followed the quiz show scandals.

John H. Ream, CBS vice president in charge of program practices, said Monday the network believes that everyone now knows that audience approval can be artificially provided and it is unnecessary to say when it is used.

Freak Accident Fatal To Lad, 9

UNIONTOWN, Ky. (AP)—The school bus brought Donald Allen Carmon, 9, home Monday while his parents were on a shopping trip.

Finding the house locked, the boy tried to enter through a window. The window slammed down on his neck.

Ten minutes later his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Carmon, returned to find him strangled.

Howling Gang Knifes Youth

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—"All I want to do now is forget it—forget what I saw."

John Campiglia Sr. Monday found his 17-year-old son, John Jr., lying mortally wounded on the sidewalk in front of his home. He had been knifed by a howling gang of teen-agers.

Chief Inspector John J. Kelly reported early today that a 14-year-old boy admitted he was present when the gang of Negroes pounced on Campiglia, a white boy. Kelly said he gave investigators the names of several others who were at the scene.

Detectives could not immediately after a motive for the slaying and it appeared Campiglia might have been an innocent bystander.

A 10-inch blood-stained knife was found in a mattress early today in the home of one of the boys.

Young Campiglia was described by friends as a quiet individual who had no enemies and never got into trouble.
