### Hope, Encouragement Seen For Victims Of Paralysis

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Reports from the American Academy of General Practice offer new hope and encouragement for persons suffering paralyzing and sometimes fatal diseases. Patients with malignant melanoma, a type of cancer, are being treated by a new method developed at Tulane Medical School. More than a third of the malignancies now are adjudged to be quiescent.

### Logger Hurt In Air Crash

A Willow Creek, California, logging operator well known in Klamath Falls was injured seriously Sunday in an emergency landing of a light plane.

Robert Trenholm, 38, operator of Little Twig Logging Company, sustained a broken back and facial injuries in an attempted landing at Willow Creek about 5 p.m.

A passenger with Trenholm was bruised badly.

Klamath County Deputy Sheriff Archie Davie, Trenholm's father-in-law, said motor failure apparently was cause of the accident. He said Trenholm had bought the plane Saturday in Klamath Falls. It was ferried to Redding by Robert Friesen of Klamath Falls. Trenholm had flown the plane a Piper Pacer, extensively Sunday before the crash, Davie said.

Trenholm and his passenger both were experienced flyers.

A rehabilitation institute official says a recently developed muscle relaxing drug speeds up treatment of children with cerebral palsy. "A New York City doctor reports, 'Important events are shaping up to brighten the outlook for victims of Parkinson's disease,' a degenerative disease which affects nerve centers at the base of the brain.

At the opening of the group's scientific assembly Monday, it was reported that 62 malignant melanoma patients have been treated by the new perfusion method. Malignant melanoma originates in moles or other skin tissue and can grow and spread rapidly to other parts of the body. Dr. Oscar Creech Jr., professor and chairman of the department of surgery at Tulane, said 22 of the melanoma cases treated over the past two and a half years are considered quiescent, showing no sign of growth.

But he explained that such patients cannot be considered to be cured. A cancer that appears quiescent may still have life and at some future time start growing again, he said. He said it will be several years before the long-term
