## Track, Field Mentor Sees Better Year

"If anything, we'll be improved," said Klamath Union track mentor Jim Inglesby concerning the prospects of this year's track season. With that comment the Pelican tracksters, more than 55 strong, took the field and began their year's opening workouts under a very warm and refreshing sun.

"It's pretty hard to tell at this point," Inglesby added, "but last year we sent only two to the state meet and neither one placed." The coach was referring to hurdlers Bill Santo and Bob Drace. Drace graduated last year thus leaving Santo the only veteran on the squad.

In the sprints the Pels have a transfer student whom Inglesby has not yet seen from Tucson High School, Ken Lewis, Lewis' brother, John, is a miler.

Jim Parks is a 440-yard-dash competitor along with another transfer, Bill Albert, from Henley. In the other running events, Inglesby mentioned Dale Stiles, Steve Stiles and Santo. He has not yet chosen the 880-yard relay four-

some. In the weights and field events a bright spot shines in Alan Phillips who holds the present school record of 174-feet six-inches in the javelin. Phillips already has surpassed that mark this year. Les Husted, Gary Hancock and Santo have had experience in the shot and discus.

As is the case every year, weather conditions will be a tremendous limiting factor on the success or failure of the tracksters. Inglesby canceled the meet scheduled for this Saturday because of lack of conditioning of the athletes. The meet was supposed to be with Springfield and Eugene.

This year, as in the past, Inglesby will give the junior varsity aspirants considerable practice with the county teams. The B schools will not enter into the scoring with the junior Whitebirds, but compete on an individual basis.

## Hawks' Hull Score Leader

MONTREAL (AP) — The National Hockey League's final official statistics released today showed Bobby Hull of Chicago Black Hawks as scoring champion and goalie Jacques Plante of Montreal Canadiens as winner of the Vezina Trophy.

Each carries a \$1,000 bonus from the league. A goal and an assist in his last game Sunday night gave the 21-year-old Hull 39 goals and 42 assists for 81 points and a one-point margin over Bruce Horvath of Boston Bruins. Hull gets the Art Ross Trophy.

Plante won the Vezina Trophy for the fifth consecutive season, a feat unprecedented in NHL history. The award goes to the goaltender who sees the most action for the club with the best defensive record.

The league-champion Canadiens with Plante in nets for 69 of the 70 games, yielded 178 goals. Glenn Hall and his Chicago mates allowed 180.

TOLEDO, Ohio (UPI) — Open division standings of the American Bowling Congress tournament underwent a shakeup here Monday night as Maywood Medical Center of Cleveland moved into the lead and Automobowl of Detroit rolled to fourth.

The Cleveland team posted a 3056 for the second team series over 3000 in the tournament and took a six-pin lead over Willen Refrigeration of St. Louis. The Maywood series was delayed for about 45 minutes due to a leaky ventilator when rain dripped through onto the approaches.

The team rolled games of 1010, 1071 and 975, led by anchorman Fred Huziker with a 668. Huziker's first game of 258 ended with eight strikes. Frank Halek had 641 and Glen Moeller had 622.

Automobowl moved past Ottawa Lanes of Toledo for fourth place with a total of 2974. Anchorman and Captain John Crimmins paced the team with a 605.

The Detroit News Teenmasters No. 1, whose average age is 18, rolled to seventh place with a 2952.

In the booster team division, Salay's Fine Sausages of Flint, Mich., rolled to third place with a 2721 series.

Earlier action saw Chuck Pezanos, 31, top eastern bowler for the last five years, and a bowling writer for the Paterson, N.J., Morning Call, roll a 1916 to take third place in the all-events division.

Al Faragalli, the 1958 all-events champion, and Lou Campi, from New Jersey, took ninth place in the doubles with a 1244 total, on scores of 634 and 610, respectively.

Bob Metz of Cincinnati took sixth in all-events with an 1884 on 616, 641 and 627. It was the third straight 1800 for Metz, a member of the Madison Bowl team which finished seventh last year.

The Klamath Union baseball team, after holding numerous workouts inside Pelican Court, took advantage of the warmer weather yesterday and conducted a well-nested hitting practice in Gen Stadium. The Pelican horseholders are preparing frantically to get into condition for their year's initial game with the Weed Cougars.

The Pels play the Weed nine next Saturday in a double-header at the Cougar diamond. Pelican coach Bill Mansfield plans to field a traveling squad of 20 men. The Whitebirds turn around and host the Cougars next Tuesday.

Mansfield has 13 returning lettermen forming the nucleus of the club which has more than 50 prospective ball players seeking starting positions. The Whitebirds hope to improve on last year's 12-11 season mark. However, some of the ball players who saw considerable action last year have just stepped off the basketball court.

Also, unpredictable weather conditions appear to be the club's biggest foe for the immediate future. Mansfield seems fairly well stocked with pitchers since five of the 12 returnees are flingers. They include Blake Griggs, Pat Carney, Paul Bishop, John Webb and Kent Hunsaker. Bishop, hot off the basketball team, is a crack reliever who possesses a mean curve.

Backstopping the pitching parade are lettermen Rich Moore and Dave Saks. In the infield are another five lettermen who are seeking to nail down the four open positions. At the first base slot is Dean Dunson, another hooper. Rounding out the infield are Steve Binney and Bob Yunk. Estin Kiger and Larry Bunday have had quite a bit of experience at the hot corner.

Mansfield is admittedly weak in outfielders with any amount of high school ball experience. Only one returning lettermen is there to fill one of the three gaps—Don Gressel. However seven other hopefuls are serious contenders for the pasture.

One thing is certain at this stage of the season. No positions are secured by any player, and competition is becoming intense as the week thins out and Saturday approaches.

## Lane To Get Frick Favor

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (AP) — Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick has dropped a hint he may rule in favor of Frank Lane in the Cleveland trader's running fight with Boston Red Sox General Manager Bucky Harris.

"But before I can render a decision, I'll have to have all the facts," Frick said at his temporary headquarters in Florida. The feud between Harris and Lane was touched off when Red Sox catcher Sammy White and Jim Marshall were traded to Cleveland for Russ Nixon. White announced soon afterward he would retire to devote full time to a bowling business.

Lane said the trade was off and demanded the return of Nixon. Harris refused. A heated exchange of telegrams followed.

"We have a rule in baseball," Frick said, "that in the event a traded player doesn't report to his team by 10 days after the season opens, the deal is canceled."

NEW YORK (UPI) — Roy Campanella, 41-year-old ex-Dodger catcher, is back in the Institute of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation of the New York University-Bellevue Medical Center today for treatment of nervous exhaustion.

Campanella returned to New York Monday after spending the night in St. Mary's Hospital at West Palm Beach, Fla. He was taken there Sunday when he suddenly became dizzy at the Dodgers' Vero Beach, Fla., training camp.

Campanella, confined to a wheelchair since he was critically injured in January, 1958, went to Vero Beach to help Dodger catcher John Rosebourn.

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# Greasy Neale Nominee Gridiron Hall Of Famers Eye Big List Of Athletes

NEW BRUNSWICK, N.J. (AP) — Earl (Greasy) Neale, a versatile athlete who once combined major league baseball playing with college football coaching, has been nominated to football Hall of Fame both as a player and a coach.

Neale, now retired, was one of 61 former players and eight former coaches listed as nominees Tuesday by the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame.

From these nominations, made by foundation members, nine will be chosen by the 12-man honors court for Hall of Fame membership. They will be inducted at an awards dinner next December, joining 172 players and coaches previously elected.

Neale is the only man nominated in both categories. He played end for West Virginia Wesleyan 1908 to 1910, dropping into the backfield to kick or run from a fake kick formation.

He coached at Marietta, Washington and Jefferson, West Virginia, West Virginia Wesleyan, Virginia and Yale. Then he went with the professionals and coached the Philadelphia Eagles for ten seasons.

An all-around college athlete, Neale joined the Cincinnati Reds as an outfielder in 1916 and played with that club until 1924, except for 22 games with the Phillies in 1921. He was on the Cincinnati team that beat Chicago in the 1919 World Series — the year of the "Black Sox" scandal — and made ten hits in that series.

Other coaches nominated were Lou Little of Georgetown and Columbia, the late Charles W. Caldwell Jr. of Williams and Princeton, the late Jess B. Hawley of Iowa and Dartmouth, Don Faurot, who coached at Kirksville (Mo.) Teachers, Jacksonville Navy, Iowa Pre-Flight and Missouri before becoming Missouri athletic director. George E. Gauthier of Michigan State and Ohio Wesleyan; Lombie Scott Homaker of Maryville, Southwestern Uni-

versity, Baldwin-Wallace and Lincoln College, and Preston (Putty) Overall of Tennessee Tech.

To be eligible for election to the Hall of Fame, a coach must have been retired three years before his nomination and a player must have played his last college game ten years before.

Among the players nominated were Russ Stein, who played tackle for Neale on the W. and J. Rose Bowl team, and such well-known old timers as Navy Bill Ingram, John J. McEwan, Pooley Hubert and Eugene (Shorty) Miller, who also became prominent coaches.

Nominees from the pre-1900 era included Charles Gelbert, Penn All-America halfback; Philip King, Langdon Lea and Arthur Wheeler of Princeton and Neil Snow of Michigan. Most recently active nominees are Kyle Rote, SMU 1948-50; Thurmond McGraw, Colorado State U. 1947-49; Les Horvath, Ohio State 1943-48, and Bob Fenimore, Oklahoma State 1943-45.

# Hunting For Best Big '5' Goes Free Lancing

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The Fledgling Big Five Athletic Conference will search among the best football teams in the country for its Rose Bowl opponent.

After getting the brushoff from the Big Ten, the five-school group is going free lancing, service teams included. Dr. Frank Kidner of California,

spokesman for the AAWU—Athletic Assn. of Western Universities—all but ruled out the possibility of two West Coast teams playing each other in Pasadena. It would be "most unlikely" that an independent West Coast club would be selected to meet the winner of the Big Five—California, Stanford, Southern California,

UCLA and Washington, Kidner said.

"We are going to look for an outstanding team," Kidner said after a meeting Monday of AAWU athletic directors and faculty representatives.

The Big Ten and the defunct Pacific Coast Conference had a contract for the Pasadena classic, oldest of the bowl games, since the 1947 New Year's Day game. The Midwesterners won 12 of the 14. This year they decided against renewing the contract.

Kidner said a Big Ten team would be considered should there be a change of heart against post-season competition.

The old PCC as well as the Big Ten had a no-repeat rule, but Kidner said there would be no such arrangement at present because of the size of the Big Five.

He indicated his group was considering a "two-out-of-three-year" rule, but said no action would be taken this year.

The AAWU, Kidner added, will not consider a team from a school that "compromises its academic standing deliberately to produce" a winner. He declined to name names.

# Spahn Beats Bums; 8 Year Jinx Nipped

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS They say Warren Spahn, Milwaukee's mound maestro, can't heat the Dodgers. He can—but not often.

A southpaw, Spahn has had considerable trouble against the predominantly right-handed hitting Dodgers—both Brooklyn and Los Angeles variety — during a major league career spanning 15 seasons.

Spahn, a 29-game winner 10 times, has beaten the Dodgers only 14 times in 44 lifetime decisions—and only once in the last eight years.

But the 38-year-old left-hander, who has compiled a 267-172 won-loss record since he reached the majors in 1942, turned the trick against his nemesis Monday.

The Braves' ace, giving up only two unearned runs in a six-inning workout, limited the Dodgers to five hits, struck out three, walked none and picked up the exhibition victory as the Braves registered a 4-4 triumph.

Milwaukee collected nine hits off Roger Craig and Larry Sherry, scoring two in the eighth against the World Series pitching star to win it.

In other games Monday, ex-Yankees Hank Bauer and Norm Siebern drove in seven runs

against their former New York mates in a 10-1 Kansas City romp; Stan Musial accounted for three RBIs as St. Louis beat Cincinnati 12-8, and Pittsburgh defeated the Chicago White Sox 8-5 to snap the American League champions' three-game winning streak.

Bauer knocked in five runs with a pair of doubles and three singles while Siebern brought home two with a double.

Musial had a home run and two-run double in the Cardinals 18-hit attack against the Reds, who lost their sixth game in eight outings. Jerry Lynch hit a grand-slam homer and Ed Bailey a three-run circuit blast to account for all but one of Cincinnati's runs.

The Pirates rallied for five runs in the last three innings to whip the White Sox with a 10-hit assault aided by eight walks. Minnie Minoos continued his torrid hitting for Chicago, driving in two runs with three singles. He has eight hits in his last 10 trips and a .615 spring average.
