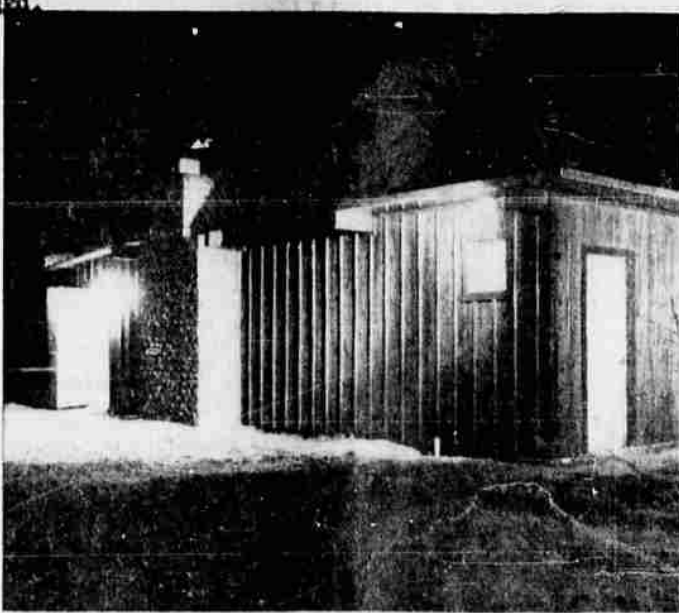

In The Day's News

Mr. K came up the other day with a proposal that is causing a lot of head scratching on our side. Under its terms, the United States, Britain and the Soviet Union would include a limited treaty enforcing a ban on most types of nuclear test explosions. At the same time, the three atomic powers would pledge not to set off small underground blasts for military experimental purposes. The Russians said they would accept SOME FORM of control over these small underground tests, but didn't spell out the inspection machinery they had in mind.

After looking it over, Western diplomatic sources commented that in his latest move Premier Khrushchev has offered either an olive branch or a steel trap. As to which it will turn out to be, they declined to offer an opinion until they have had time to give it VERY careful study.

But—
They added—
Unless this part of the proposal proves negotiable—that is to say, subject to some give and take and some further clarification in the discussions that must follow—the moratorium on small underground blasts would rest only on a gentleman's agreement.

This, they said, is a critical point which the American and British governments want to explore very carefully indeed.

On that point, I think, we can all agree.

A gentleman's word is a gentleman's WORD. How much it is worth depends on two things:
1. Is he a gentleman?
2. What is his reputation for KEEPING his word?

I suppose we shouldn't say at this critical period of world history that Russia isn't a gentleman. That would be an INSULT, and insults seldom lead to agreement on vitally important issues.

But—
We can say rather positively that Soviet Russia's reputation for keeping its word isn't good enough to inspire much confidence. There is the case of West Berlin. Russia made some rather positive agreements as to the status of West Berlin. She has broken nearly all of them—or at least she has THREATENED to break them if we don't knuckle under and do as she says.

Still—
In this perhaps most fateful negotiation since the world began, we must move with extreme care. What we are seeking is to prevent NUCLEAR WAR—which could result in the destruction of the world.

This we must remember:
Poison gas has not been used in any big way since World War I. It has been highly perfected since then. In its modern forms, it is almost as terrible as nuclear bombs. But no modern government has been willing to ACCEPT THE HORRIBLE RESPONSIBILITY OF USING IT IN WAR.

It is just possible that might be true in the case of nuclear weapons. That is why we must move so carefully in these negotiations whose hopeful purpose is to bring about a binding agreement to ban nuclear warfare.

Students Protest
PUSAN, Korea (AP)—Nine hundred high school students poured noisily through the main streets of this port city today shouting for a new presidential election.

The demonstrators were protesting the March 15 elections won by President Syngman Rhee and his vice presidential running mate Lee Ki-Poong. The opposition leveled charges of ballot stuffing and vote-buying at Rhee's Liberty Party.

Dorris Youth Building Officially Given To City

DOHRIS—In April of 1959 the Dorris Lions Club undertook the construction of a youth building for the city of Dorris. At that time the membership consisted of 13 active members, plus three members-at-large.

Lion Cy Cramer volunteered to head a committee in charge of this project and he has served in that capacity ever since.

Plans for a 20 x 36 foot building of frame construction to be set on a concrete slab were drawn

up by Cramer, and construction began in May.

The Lions Club furnished \$800, the Battle Valley Federated Women's Club donated \$286, and various other individual donations have totaled \$116. Materials were obtained by donation, barter, salvage, and by any other method, short of outright theft, to keep from purchasing everything at retail prices.

All construction work was done by Lions Club members, frequently assisted by townspeople evenings and weekends. The building today is easily worth \$7,000.

On March 23, at a well attended public ceremony, the building was turned over to the city of Dorris.

It is finished inside with panel mahogany, has kitchen and shower facilities, and a large fireplace. Membership of the Dorris Lions Club now numbers 31 active members and three members-at-large.

This increase in membership is a tribute to the Dorris Lions Club and the efforts of Lion Cy Cramer.

Rattlesnake Halts Flight

TULSA, Okla. (AP)—There they were high in the sky with a rattlesnake loose in their small two-place airplane.

Kroosh Presses For New Axis

PARIS (AP)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev pressed his campaign today for a Moscow-Paris axis to replace the growing alliance between France and West Germany.

The Soviet leader again assailed West Germany and emphasized that he believed France and the Soviet Union together could be a force to maintain peace on the Continent.

Khrushchev made his remarks in response to a toast to peace given by Premier Michel Debre at a luncheon in the Hotel Matignon, Debre's official residence.

Four Found Dead In AF Plane

ELKINS, W. Va. (AP)—Searchers shortly before noon today reached the charred wreckage of an Air Force C45 plane carrying three men and a woman. The Civil Air Patrol said all four persons were dead.

Lt. Col. Robert Gobel, deputy commander of the West Virginia CAP wing, said the plane and bodies had been identified.

The Air Force C45 was en route to Denver when last heard from about 5:30 p.m. Tuesday in a driving snowstorm.

Through the morning ground parties with snowshoes had to pick their way down a mountain-side to get to the wreckage.

Another Earthquake

CASABLANCA, Morocco (AP)—Another earthquake has further damaged several mountain villages hard hit by the Agadir quakes a month ago. No new victims were reported.

Government officials said the new tremor hit Tuesday night in the mountain area around Agadir. Two villages previously ruined and evacuated were further damaged and several nearby villages also received slight damage.

Radioactivity Scares Utah

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI)—Police evacuated more than 100 persons from their homes here early today when a truck carrying radioactive castings hit a switch train at an intersection.

However, it was determined the radioactivity was too low to be dangerous and the residents returned to their homes in less than an hour.

Lt. Robert A. McManama, who headed the police evacuation, said a count of the evacuees was not made but that 100 was a "conservative" estimate. Other police officers had estimated as high as 500 or 600.

The evacuation was from houses fronting the street for one block in each direction from the intersection.

"It was quite a commotion," said Mrs. Harry Driscoll, one of the evacuees. "When the policeman knocked on the door and told us I just grabbed the building and ran out the back door."

The residents were escorted two blocks from the scene, many of them in their nightclothes and barefoot. They waited in police cars or stood on street corners in the chilly morning darkness until allowed to return home.

All On Plane Believed Safe

CAIRO (UPI)—A missing seaplane with eight Americans and one other passenger aboard apparently has been found with all safe, the United Arab Republic air force said today.

The American Catalina was reported missing Tuesday night. It was believed to have carried seven members of the family of Thomas Kendall, LaVerne, Calif., a producer of travel films. The eighth American was identified as Raomona Shear, an employee of the Kendall film company.

A spokesman at the U.A.R. Air Force Search and Rescue Center said that a plane had been found on Saudi Arabian territory near the Gulf of Aqaba after making a forced landing. He confirmed that the passengers were all safe.

New Violence Seen In Africa

JOHANNESBURG (UPI)—Europeans today were reported buying up guns for defense against possible new violence when Africans stage a 24-hour work stoppage Monday to protest the mass shooting at nearby Sharpeville.

Chief Albert Lutuli, head of the banned African National Congress, called the work stoppage but emphasized it would not be directed against commerce or industry. Under a 1953 law, Africans are forbidden to strike.

"I call for every African man, woman, and child, and upon all other sections of the people to observe Monday as a day of mourning . . . by staying at home and not working," he said.

Pressure Hinted

HAVANA (AP)—Fidel Castro's leftist labor minister declared today the U.S. Naval base at Guantanamo in eastern Cuba is a "foreign business" subject to Cuban laws.

The assertion by Augusto Martinez Sanchez was the first official hint of pressure tactics the Castro regime might use in case of conflict over the status of the U.S.-leased base.

Rights Bill Given Okay

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House passed a five-point civil rights bill 311-109 today and the Senate quickly referred the measure to its Judiciary Committee with instructions to report it back not later than next Tuesday.

The motion to send the bill to the Judiciary Committee with a fixed deadline was made by Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas.

It was passed 86-5.
Sen. James O. Eastland (D-Miss.), chairman of the Judiciary Committee, tried to have the measure sent to his committee without any fixed time for action, but he was voted down.

The Senate rejected the Eastland move on a roll call vote 72-19.

That left Johnson's proposal as the next issue.

Under Eastland's motion, there would be no deadline for action by his committee which in the past has proved a dead end for all civil rights bills.

"I don't think the Judiciary Committee should be placed in shackles in the consideration of this bill," Eastland said in fighting Johnson's motion to require the committee to report back by next Tuesday.

The House margin in passing its bill was somewhat larger than many had expected.

On the roll call on passage, 179 Democrats and 132 Republicans voted for the bill, 94 Democrats and 15 Republicans against it. In a statement issued within minutes after the House acted, Atty. Gen. William P. Rogers called the bill "an historic step forward." He indicated it is acceptable to the administration although not fully covering the administration's proposals.

Truck Profits

SALEM (AP)—Truck lines operating in Oregon did \$519,473,515 worth of business last year, an increase of 100 million dollars over the 1958 total, Public Utility Commissioner Jonel C. Hill reported today.

Their 1959 profit was \$28,691,693, compared with \$17,192,101 in 1958.

Siege By Felons Appears On Wane

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP)—Raymond Farra, the second of two dangerous convicts holding 15 hostages in the Tennessee penitentiary, emerged from his hideaway room late this afternoon to talk with the state corrections commissioner, Keith Hampton.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP)—One of two hardened convicts agreed today to the surrender of 15 to 17 hostages they held in the Tennessee penitentiary nearly 24 hours.

The other one agreed to discuss it with authorities.

Robert Rivera, 25, came out of the room where he and Raymond Farra had been holed up with the hostages since late Wednesday.

He agreed to his part in surrendering the hostages and started trying to persuade Farra to join him. A little later a lawyer went in to see Farra, who agreed to talk later with officials.

Rivera agreed to his part in the proposal after Charles Moss, executive editor of the Nashville Banner, agreed to publish the convicts' statement when they surrendered.

Farra is described in official prison records as very dangerous, suffering from schizophrenia. The diagnosis recommended extreme care in handling Farra, a former mental patient.

Rivera's record describes him as having a psychotic personality. One hostage was released shortly before noon today.

Other prisoners, unfed since noon Wednesday, started banging on cell bars when noon passed without a meal. Two or three small fires were set but no damage done.

Jack Warrick, a prison guard and telephone operator was released to get a bottle of milk because he has stomach ulcers. Sam Broyles, a convict-hostage, was released Wednesday night for the same reason and did not return. Newsmen were unable to talk to him.

Charles Cottle, a prison psychologist, said Warrick told him the convicts have treated all their hostages well.

"Nobody has been hurt or roughed up," Warrick told the psychologist.

Warrick was not permitted to talk to newsmen at the prison and was not taken back into the room with the other hostages. He said he believed one of the convicts

was ready to come out if the other one would agree.

Other developments inside the prison led officials to hope for an early agreement to release the hostages.

Remaining 1,500 or more prisoners have not been fed since the rebellion started Wednesday. They protested Wednesday night but there was no indication today of further protest. Officials declined to say when they would be fed.

There was a flurry of activity between prison officials involving Warden Lynn Bomar, the prison psychologist, Albert Balevre, and a prisoner, Clifton Cotton, who has been studying law since his imprisonment.

Balevre and Cotton carried papers inside the room with the two convicts on at least one occasion. The convicts and hostages have been holed up in the office since Wednesday afternoon.

Bomar, one-time All-America football player at Vanderbilt University and a veteran law-enforcement officer, rushed back and forth to conferences with other state authorities. The warden said he thought prospects were bright for releasing the hostages.

Among the hostages are Assistant Deputy Warden C. S. Burns, Nashville lawyer Byron Bean and several prison employees.

Mutual Broadcasting System said at Washington it taped an interview with Charles Welfel, a guard in charge at the time of the outbreak. MBS quoted the guard as saying, "I expect a fast end to the turmoil. Things look pretty bright. They are getting to a level where they can talk to each other."

Macmillan, Chief To Hold Talks

WASHINGTON (AP)—Britain's Prime Minister Harold Macmillan will arrive in Washington this weekend for talks with President Eisenhower on the latest Soviet nuclear test ban proposal and related matters.

Announcing this today, the White House said the talks have been arranged in a move to coordinate U.S. and British positions regarding the test ban talks under way in Geneva.

Macmillan will arrive in Washington some time Saturday but he and Eisenhower will not get together for their first round of talks until Monday.

Police Await To Quiz Trucker

STARVED ROCK STATE PARK, Ill. (UPI)—Police waited today for an Iowa truck driver to awaken from a nine-day drugged sleep so they can question him about the sex murders of three women in this park.

The trucker was found in a stupor in a Rock Falls, Ill., hotel the day after three Chicago-area society matrons were trapped, beaten to death and raped 50 miles away in a scenic dead-end canyon here.

Authorities said the 39-year-old man, a psychotic, induced the coma by swallowing a packet of barbiturates. He has not awakened through his transfer from the hotel to a Sterling, Ill., hospital, then to the Veterans' Administration Hospital at Iowa City, Iowa.

Strong Swiss Quake

GENEVA (AP)—Switzerland's strongest earthquake in 14 years shook the western part of the mountainous republic early today. No serious damage was reported.

Apple-Laden Semi Rig Jackknifes On Highway 97

An immense tractor-trailer unit loaded with apples jackknifed on U.S. Highway 97 early today and pitched sideways into a roadside culvert south of Algoma.

The truck's huge cab nosed into the deep culvert and was literally broken apart by the weight of the loaded trailer forced against it.

Two men were in the cab. The driver, identified by state police as Charles Robert Johnson, 29, Rt. 4, Spokane, Washington, apparently suffered only an injured knee. A passer-by brought him to Klamath Falls, but Klamath Valley Hospital said he had not been admitted there.

The other occupant, Joseph Hensdell, 47, 5411 N. Monroe Street, Spokane, was uninjured. He was sleeping in the cab's bunk at the time.

The tractor-trailer struck a Klamath Sand and Gravel Company truck before it pitched into the deep culvert between the highway and a canal about 500 yards south of Hamilton's Cafe at Algoma. The gravel truck was not seriously damaged. Its driver, Ladd Preston Womack, 31, Rt. 3, Box 1120, Klamath Falls, was not injured.

Cause of the accident could not be determined immediately. The driver could not be reached, but

said he would return to the accident scene when released after treatment.

Hensdell said, "I was sleeping, don't ask me."

Womack said he had just had a cup of coffee at the Algoma cafe and was headed toward town. "I was doing about 40, and had just got into fourth overdrive to make the hill. I watch my mirrors pretty close. I saw this guy behind me, and expected him to be beside me pretty quick. I glanced back, and saw the side of his trailer just before he hit me."

Hensdell said the 40-ft. trailer was loaded with apples "from all over Washington." It was destined for Los Angeles. Its bulk completely blocked the southbound lane of traffic from the time of the accident, about 7:30 a.m.

The truck was registered to R. N. Haugen of Spokane.
