Cruel Situation Exists In Integrated Schools

A school official says although Negroes have cracked the color barrier in Little Rock, a cruel situation exists in the integrated classrooms.

Everett Tucker Jr., school board president, told a federal judge Wednesday that the eight Negroes attending integrated high schools are shunned by their white classmates.

Negro students had protested to Dist. Judge John E. Miller the school board's use of an Arkansas pupil placement law to limit integration. The board has assigned only a few Negroes to one-white

high schools and has rejected applications of about 50.

"There is now an intangible area of attitude—of intolerance, if you will—and there is not a great deal the board can do about that," Tucker said. He said, however, that the integration picture is brighter than in 1957.

Elsewhere fights and a cross burning marked an episode at an integrated Air Force radar station near Albuquerque, N.M.

Arguments and fights erupted early Sunday at a dance at the NCO Club between white and Negro airmen. Later some of the white airmen fashioned a crude cross and set it afire.

Lt. Col. S. A. Tidwell Jr., commander of the West Mesa Radar Station where the incidents occurred, made little of the situation. But airmen reported Wednesday that friction between white and Negro airmen had been brewing for some time.

In Washington, a group of college students picketed the White House in support of Negro demonstrations against segregation of lunch counters in the South. Joseph Hernon, 23-year-old graduate student at Catholic University, implied he had help from Democrats in organizing the march.

He said he got in touch with leaders of the Democratic groups at his own school and at Georgetown, George Washington, Howard and American universities.

He led a group of about 20 Negro and white students in a parade to try to win approval by Congress of a strong civil rights bill. Picketing of downtown lunch counters continued in Houston, Tex.

The church entered the picture in Princeton, N.J., and Orono, Maine.

Approximately 150 students and townspeople attended a special service in the Princeton University Chapel "to express Christian concern of racial discrimination in the South and North."

Methodist Bishop John Wesley Lord of Boston told a church meeting in Orono that the sit-in demonstrations are a test of Christianity.

Ex-Red Boss Now Retired

MOSCOW (AP) — Usually reliable informants say former Premier Nikolai Bulganin, sick and plagued by attacks as a member of the so-called anti-party group, has been retired on a pension and is back in Moscow.

The informants said Bulganin was put out to pasture after appealing to his old traveling companion and successor, Nikita Khrushchev.

Bulganin returned to the Soviet capital from his obscure post as chairman of the Stavropol Economic Council, the informants said.

They gave this account: Bulganin went to see Khrushchev, who succeeded him as premier in March 1958, and complained that local party officials in Stavropol were making his life miserable. They continually cast up to him his confession that he was linked with former Premier Georgi Malenkov, ex-Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov and former Deputy Premier Lazar Kaganovich in the "anti-party group" that threatened Khrushchev's position.

Khrushchev listened sympathetically, then suggested that he accept a monthly pension of 3,000 rubles — \$750 at the Soviet exchange rate — and retire from active life. Bulganin accepted and is now living in a villa on the outskirts of Moscow.

GET BOOK AWARDS

The awards are sponsored by the American Book Publishers' Council, the American Booksellers' Assn. and the Book Manufacturers' Institute.

Father Watches As Son Crashes

FULLERTON, Calif. (AP) — Leon M. Boisseranc watched from the yard of his home as his son, Leon Jr., 29, circled overhead in his light plane.

Suddenly the plane's engine quit. It spiraled, plunged into a home, and exploded.

The home was that of Emil Boisseranc—the flier's uncle. He hurried his wife and three children from the burning home and tried unsuccessfully to save his 11-year-old son. The plane crashed into the house, and the house was destroyed. The uncle's hands and face were badly burned.

The death of Franklin K. Theall, 26, a tree surgeon, at the hands of a gang of young toughs who resented his efforts to stop their trouble-making spurred a community effort to cope with juvenile violence.

Theall, an Army veteran, was dragged away from a cup of coffee Monday night, beaten and stabbed in the street and left dying in a gutter.

Dist. Atty. John J. Droney, chief law officer in Middlesex, the state's most populous county, invited police chiefs of Arlington, Watertown and eight other major Boston suburbs to meet with him to organize a crackdown on young hoodlums.

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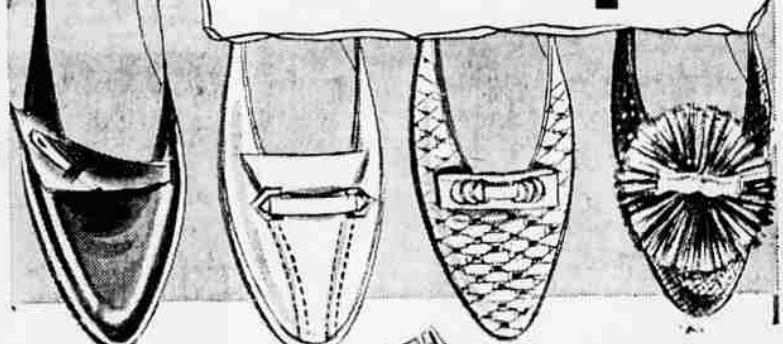
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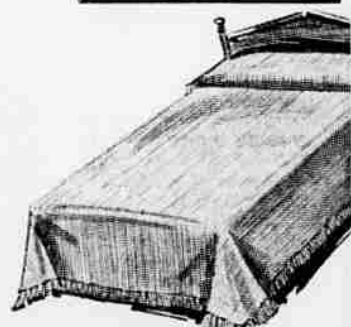
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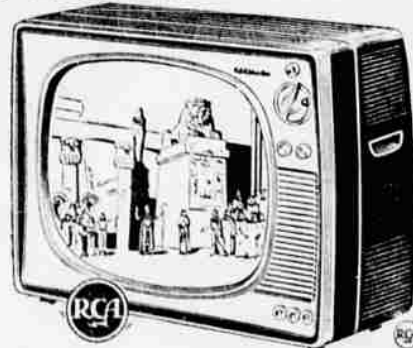
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
