Art Classes For Adults To Be Given

Two art classes for adults, sponsored by the state General Extension Division, will be offered in Klamath Falls beginning next week.

Beginning and advanced painters are invited to enroll in Painting AA 290 in the Fremont School art room. Gordon Kenner, instructor, art supervisor for city elementary schools, will cover watercolor, oil, casein and polymer media. He will give special attention to those who have never painted or who have done little of it.

The course is worth two college credits. It will begin Monday at 7 p.m. Those interested should enroll either during the first or second session.

The other course is upper college division and is tailored to both beginning and advanced students. It is worth two or three credits.

Instructor Howard Hall, KUHS art department head, will cover composition and design with emphasis on composition in painting, drawing, architecture, mural design and other art forms. Each session will offer theory, criticism and work on projects of each student's choice. The course is called Composition and Visual Theory AA 292 in the University of Oregon catalog.

The latter class will be of special interest to those who are experienced in drawing and painting and want to better their work. It will also aid those who want to learn design related to weaving, textile work, ceramics, sculpture, jewelry and commercial art. The course begins at 7 p.m. Tuesday in Room 325 at KUHS.

Both classes will meet for three hours weekly for 10 weeks.

Utility Files New Schedule

PORTLAND (AP) — New rate schedules have been filed by Portland General Electric Co. with the Oregon Public Utilities Commission.

The firm recently was authorized by the commissioner to make increases that would raise its annual gross revenue by 4.5 per cent. The new rates took effect immediately.

The company said a residential consumer using 900 or less kilowatt hours monthly will pay 15 per cent more. But during winter, when usage is heavier, the average residential bill probably will be about 95 cents higher.

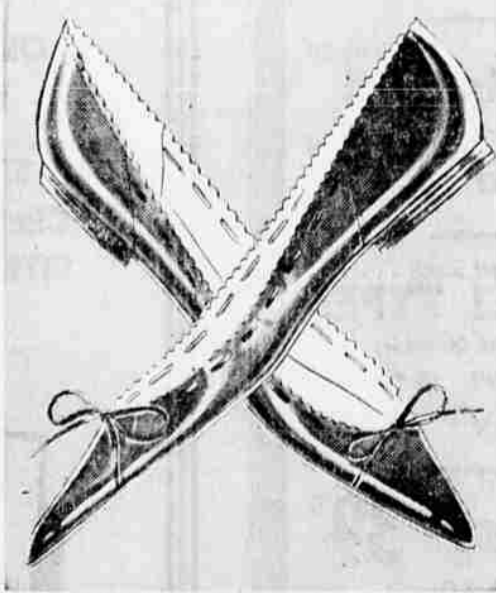

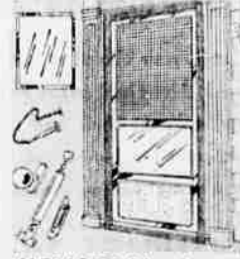
