IQ Rating Of Chessman Shows Gain

SAN QUENTIN, Calif. (AP)—Condemned Caryl Chessman has increased his superior IQ by three points after 12 death row years of fighting off gas chamber execution.

Chessman's score of 130 in an Intelligence test given him this month by San Quentin Prison psychologists ranks him among the top three per cent of the American population in mental ability. The score rates him as possessing very superior intelligence.

Chessman scored 127 on the same Wechsler-Bellevue testing scale in June, 1941. He entered the prison then on the first of two armed robbery convictions that preceded his 1948 double death sentence for kidnapping, robbing and sexually abusing two Los Angeles women.

His ninth execution date now is scheduled for May 2. He evaded the gas chamber for the eighth time last Feb. 19 when Gov. Edmund G. Brown ordered a reprieve 10 hours before the scheduled execution.

The California Legislature later rejected Brown's proposal that capital punishment be abolished.

Psychologists hold that intelligence, as measured by testing, stays constant through an individual's lifetime or actually may decline slightly after 20 years of age.

But Dr. David G. Schmidt, San Quentin's chief psychiatrist who has worked 28 years at the prison, said he regarded both Chessman's 1941 score of 127 and his 1960 score of 130 as valid.

HIT-RUN SHIP
NEW YORK (UPI)—The U. S. Coast Guard has joined New York police in their campaign to end this city's rash of hit-run accidents.

The Coast Guard reported Wednesday that earlier in the month a hit-run ship damaged four barges and sank a small tug boat.

GARDEN CITY, Kan. (AP)—Novelist Truman Capote was uninvited from a courtroom here Wednesday and searched by Sheriff Earl Robinson.
Robinson said he received an anonymous tip that Capote had smuggled a camera into the courtroom. Photographers have been barred from the trial of two ex-

convicts charged with killing farmer Herb Clutter, his wife and two of his children.

The sheriff found no camera on Capote, who is covering the trial for the New Yorker magazine.

"Who would be the rat who would blurt inform on me?" asked Capote. "Here I am, the only writer from a publication that doesn't use pictures."

No Choice

TRENTON, N.J. (AP)—New Jersey's voters will not be able to express any choice for president in the April 19 primary election.
Secretary of State Edward J. Patren Jr. Wednesday wired county clerks and election superintendents not to leave any column or space for a presidential popularity poll, even for write-ins, since no one had filed to enter such a contest.

Poll Planned On Rate Boost

SALEM (AP)—Public Utility Commissioner Jonel Hill Wednesday asked the Gervais Cooperative Telephone Assn. to poll its members on whether they would accept higher telephone rates.
The association asks that business rates be boosted 25 to 50 cents a month, and that residential rates be increased 25 cents to \$1.
The cooperative operates in the Gervais area, 17 miles north of Salem.

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Installation Set For Power Line

COOS BAY (AP)—Coos-Curry Electric Cooperative officials said Wednesday the remote Rogue River communities of Agness and Hialeah will have their first electric power line now that the coop has received a \$1,630,000 federal loan.
They said it is not yet certain whether the line will follow the river or be over an inland route. The loan also will cover other improvements and power line extensions.

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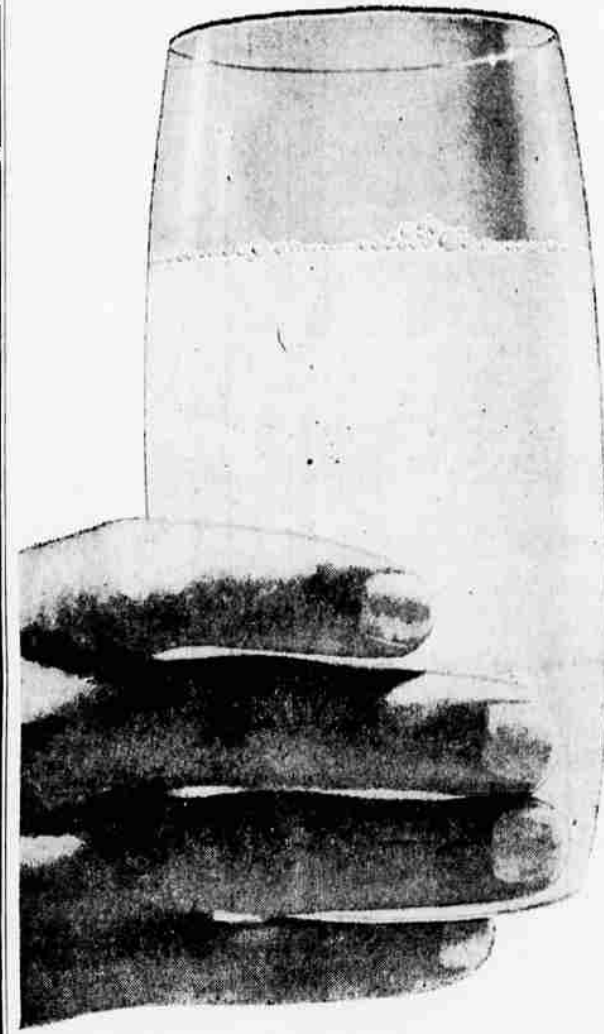
