Registration Deadline

SALEM (AP)—Rye grass seed growers in Oregon must register between March 20 and April 13 for the referendum on whether to form the proposed Oregon Rye grass Growers Seed Commission, the state Department of Agriculture said Wednesday.

The department is mailing registration forms to more than 2,000 growers, who produce 140 million pounds of seed annually.

The date of the referendum has not been set.

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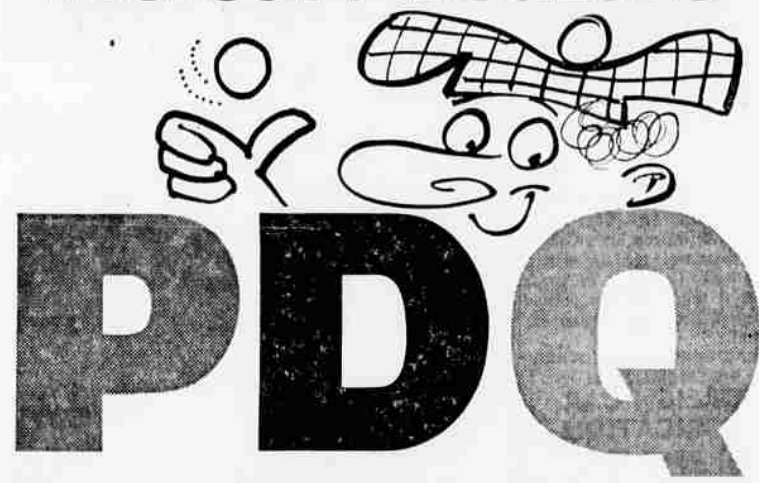
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
