

Talk Slated By Cleric

The Rev. Royal L. Peck, who knows Europe intimately, will be guest speaker at the Mt. Laki Community Presbyterian Church Sunday, March 27. His talk will follow a 6:30 p.m. family style potluck supper.

The Reverend Peck, who has just returned from Italy, has information and knowledge of Europe gathered during five years residence in Italy.

He is sponsored by the Greater Europe Mission, and as director of the interdenominational Bible Institute in Rome, he has worked closely with various Protestant leaders and churches of that land. He was accompanied abroad by Mrs. Peck and children.

"Since the close of World War II," he says, "Italy has made constant march toward complete religious freedom for all faiths. The goal has not been entirely reached, but great strides are being made in spite of obvious difficulties."

The greatest impending danger, he says, to world missions is the economic challenge of the Communist block and a united Europe. Ninety per cent of Protestant missions are manned and financed from North America. Should this nation stumble economically, the entire program of proclaiming the gospel to the ends of the earth will be threatened with collapse.

The Reverend Peck is also a foreign correspondent for Christian Life magazine. He was graduated from Wheaton College, Wheaton, Illinois, and earned a B.D. degree at Northern Baptist Seminary, Chicago. He pastored a church for five years on Chicago's west side before leaving for work in Europe. Anyone interested is invited to hear the speaker.

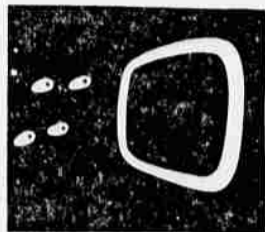
