KU students returned wearily to school Monday after enjoying a week off for spring vacation.

Many of these students took trips over the period, and a great many traveled to Eugene to support the Pelicans in the 42nd annual state basketball tournament.

This week being the last of the third nine weeks of school, they face the rush of reports, themes and projects required in certain classes, and the usual end-of-term exams and grades.

Melvin L. Derby, director of education, Oregon Council on Alcohol Problems, lectured on "Alcoholism in the United States" to biology students all day Monday.

He spoke on and answered questions on a "program that would teach students the facts about alcoholic beverages and their effects." One question he asked that students didn't come close to answering was, "How much money was spent in the United States for alcoholic beverages in 1958—over 10 billion dollars."

Student Council representatives met after school Tuesday afternoon and discussed at some length three pages of the new constitution which is being worked over by the council in preparation for the voters April 14, when they will go to the polls to consider it.

Science projects by KU students of all grade levels were displayed in the cafeteria Wednesday as part of the Science Fair sponsored by the Oregon Science Museum and Industry.

The fair was open to all high school students interested in science, with many of the projects coming from regular science courses where projects were mandatory.

Winners of the school competition will receive certificates and be automatically entered in the district, to be held here also. Top projects at the district will be sent to the state fair where the best ones that survive that elimination will earn scholarships and a chance for the even better scholarships awarded at the national show in St. Louis.

First Baptist

Plans for a Youth Week in the First Baptist Church have been made by the young people of the church. During the week of April 3-10, 46 of the young people, ages 13-24, who are members of the church, will assume various responsibilities in the church life.

The activities will begin on Saturday afternoon, April 2, with visitation followed by a youth fellowship on Saturday night. A group of Baptist students from Oregon State College will be present to lead in the fellowship.

The youth will officiate in the Sunday School and Training Union on Sunday, April 3, then will teach in these organizations the following Sunday, April 10. The Baptist Student Union group from OSC will be in charge of the morning worship service April 3. Two airmen from Kingsley Field, both planning for the ministry, will speak at the evening services on both Sundays.

Three-Day Rally To Open For Demos In Midwest

DETROIT (AP) — Democrats who run the party machinery in the Midwest open a significant three-day rally today in the nation's midlands where the hunting season still is wide open (or presidential hopefuls). The target is nearly a third of the votes at the Democratic National Convention.

Most of the party hopefuls will be showing up at the 14-state conference, to get in some speaking, glad handing and recruiting. But while the conference expects to go on record on key issues and platform planks, it isn't going to endorse a political ticket.

Still, as the conference chairman, Frank G. Thompson, puts it, "there will be quite a bit of political hay burning before it's over."

Willing To Talk, Says Cuban

HAVANA (AP)—Foreign Minister Raul Roa said Thursday night that U.S.-Cuban relations have reached a critical point but that the Castro regime is still willing to negotiate for an end to differences between the two governments.

Roa, in a television address, repeated a previous statement that negotiations with the United States would have to be based on mutual respect and U.S. recognition of Cuba's sovereignty.

However, he did not repeat Cuba's previous demand that, before negotiations, the United States must guarantee to take no action harmful to the Cuban economy. The United States rejected that condition, which obviously was intended to forestall any cut in U.S. purchases of Cuban sugar at premium prices.

Whether Prime Minister Fidel Castro's government has abandoned this requirement for negotiations was not clear. Roa said his government is willing to discuss all aspects of the problems between the two countries "without reservations of any kind."

He denied reports published in the United States that Cuba had shown no serious desire to negotiate since the return to Havana of U.S. Ambassador Philip Bonsal last Sunday. Roa said he and Bonsal discussed Cuban-American relations at their meeting since the envoy returned.

The minister blamed U.S. officials and newspapers for the state of Cuban-American relations. He read a string of anti-Cuban remarks by U.S. congressmen and other public figures and specifically named charges by Secretary of State Christian A. Herter and Allen W. Dulles, head of the Central Intelligence Agency, that there is Communist influence in Cuba.

New Member Of FCC Tells Aims

WASHINGTON (AP) — Edward K. Mills Jr., nominated to be a member of the Federal Communications Commission, hopes the caliber of broadcast programs will improve.

But he wants the improvement to come "through public demand and perhaps through a little regulatory persuasion" — not through government censorship of what goes on the air.

President Eisenhower sent Mills' nomination to the Senate Thursday. If confirmed by the Senate, the New Jersey Republican would succeed John C. Doerfer as a member of the commission. Doerfer quit under fire last week after admitting he accepted hospitality from a radio-TV executive.

Mills said Thursday there's too much gunfire and violence on TV. But he added he did not dictate what his young daughters may watch.

"Sometimes I am horrified as to how much they see, but they are not restricted," he said.

Mills said the quality of TV programs could be improved by reserving a portion of the broadcast time to educational and cultural shows. He said young people should have the opportunity "to be exposed to that type of thing."

Mills, 54, is a tall, graying lawyer. He resigned last January as deputy chief of the General Services Administration. He now lives in Washington, but still owns a home near Morristown, N.J., where he was mayor in 1949-50.

Mills was offered a place on the FCC three years ago but turned it down because he thought it would not be fair to leave the GSA less than a year after he joined it.

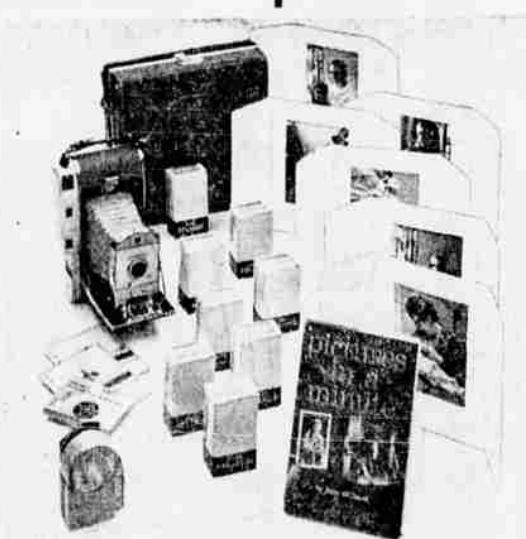

Security Council Of UN To Mull Africa Situation

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The U.N. Security Council will be called into a special session early next week to discuss the explosive South African racial conflict.

The Asian-African bloc, called for the meeting. They planned to present a formal request later today for the council to take up the situation arising from the killing of some 20 Negro demonstrators by South African police. The Asian-African letter reportedly said the South African situation was a potential threat to international peace.

U.S. Delegate Henry Cabot Lodge, Security Council president for March, told newsmen he would convey the 11-nation group "with a few days"—probably on Tuesday. He said the killings in South Africa this week were "very distressing."

Diplomats said the Asian-African bloc countries were considering asking the council to condemn the killings and to create an investigating committee.

Only seven votes are necessary to put the issue on the council's agenda, and the Asian-African request seemed certain to muster that many.

Lodge would not say how the United States would vote. But he noted that in the past the United States has held that South Africa's segregation policy—the root of the present trouble—was "a proper subject for discussion in the United Nations."

The South African government has protested and boycotted all previous U.N. debates on its white supremacy policy. The 32-nation General Assembly ruled then that it could discuss the issue but was

not competent to intervene. In Tokyo, meanwhile, U.N. Undersecretary Ralph J. Bunche said there may be need soon of a United Nations "presence" in troubled Africa. He did not say whether it should take the form of a military force, as the U.N. has stationed between Egypt and Israel, or a diplomatic mission, such as it sent to Laos last fall.

The American Negro winner of the Nobel Peace Prize, in a speech to the assembly of the International Press Institute, compared the situation in Africa to the Negro problem in the United States. But he said, "I don't doubt in the least that democracy will prevail over all other votes in my country."

Acute tension still gripped South Africa but no new violence was reported. Prime Minister Hendrik Verwoerd's government has banned all public meetings in large towns throughout the nation in an effort to forestall demonstrations.

But he is lifting the ban for his own Nationalist party so he can address a big political rally Saturday in Meyerton, only 10 miles from Sharpsville, the bloodiest area in the riots Monday and Tuesday.

Negro absenters from work continued to increase in South Africa, producing a creeping industrial paralysis. The stay-at-home movement was organized after the earlier demonstrations ended in bloodshed.

The Negroes' immediate aim is to get rid of the identification passbooks which all Negroes are required to carry outside their homes. The militant Pan-Africanist Congress first tried to flood police stations with Negroes who had left their passes at home and who demanded they be arrested. The Negroes hoped this would fill the jails to overflowing and cause a breakdown in economic life by drastically reducing the labor force.

The police have refused to arrest most of such demonstrators. And a Johannesburg court Thursday found a way to punish Negroes without passes and still keep them out of jails. It sentenced five to be caned, a common punishment in South Africa. Two of the offenders were sentenced to 10 strokes, the others to 8.

Protests against South Africa's racial laws and the shooting of Negro demonstrators continued in far corners of the world.

The Soviet Union charged it was a policy of "racial genocide" and declared "measures should be immediately taken to discontinue and prevent in the future acts of violence against the African population."

Britons were seething with indignation. London police had had trouble controlling a demonstration in front of South Africa House. They have arrested 79 persons in the last few days as the boisterous crowds reached up to 400 in number.

Prime Minister Abdul Rahman of Malaya sent a message to British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan deploring "the human brutality."

African nations and colonies joined in the chorus of denunciations. The newspaper "Voice of Ethiopia" warned of "nothing but widespread bloodshed in the years ahead" in South Africa.
